Transferred to Dallas

Another unexpected turn in the more or less complicated situation in Brownwood following the arrest of Milton T. Shafer and Fred C. Simmons, two alleged representatives of a California bonding house, early Tuesday morning by local officers upon the request of the Dallas county sheriff was taken shortly after noon today, when a telegram was received from Milton T. Shafer, who is now in Dallas facing charges of kidnaping Carroll Creighton Compton of that city Monday night.

Habeas Corpus

H. A. Keller, Dallas attorney here representing Compton immediately filed an application for a habeas corpus hearing for the purpose of obtaining Compton's liberty, the application to be heard this morning by Judge J. O. Woodward, of the 33rd judicial district court.

Armed with Warrants

Armed with warrants on Dallas county grand jury indictments charging Milton T. Shafer and Fred C. Simmons, representatives of a Los Angeles bonding company of kidnaping Carroll Creighton Compton from Dallas Monday night, Deputy Sheriff Pat Richardson and Hilliard Britz reached Brownwood late Wednesday afternoon and immediately placed their men under arrest and returned to Dallas.

Evil Mae Cooper, 18, Sweetheart of the slain youth, testified that he showed her a pair of brass knucks on the night of the killing.

SALE OF FRY FIELD LEASE IS REPORTED

It is understood on good authority that Tower & McKanna have sold their lease on the Shores tract to Bailey, McCarty & Peterson of Wichita Falls, the sale to date from the first of this month, but the final consummation awaiting certain details now being attended to.

The price has not been announced, but knowing the lease to be what it is, it readily may be surmised that the price is one of considerable magnitude.

The lease consists of 70 acres and has now 16 producing wells, with a daily production of around 4,000 barrels.

The first well on the lease was brought in just a little over two months ago.

Had Little Money Young Keith had only his week's wages, about \$35 or \$40, with him at the time he left Ardmore, it was stated.

He weighs about 150 pounds, has light hair and blue eyes, and is of medium height, probably about 5 feet 9 inches. He was wearing, at the time of his disappearance, a light summer suit, tan brimmed Panama hat and tan low-quarter shoes.

Mr. Keith broadcasted over the Fort Worth radio station asking for information and is also advertising in newspapers.

Foul play is feared, Mr. Keith stated.

WOODWARD IN CHARGE ASKS ENFORCEMENT

"It will not be long now until the sun will set on many of us who are here today. I have been here a long time and I thank my God that I have done my duty as best I could. But as long as I am here I want a strict enforcement of the law and the time has come when law violation must be stopped," were the opening words of Judge J. O. Woodward in making his charge to the grand jury empaneled today.

"You have 19 cases of law violations, some of which are for murder, some for forgery, some for criminal assault, theft, making intoxicating liquors, possession of liquor and sale of liquor, driving a car while drunk and so forth, that are to be investigated by you at this time. I think that Brown county has as good officers as any county in my district and if a man has violated a law and has been arrested by these officers and the evidence in the case justifies an indictment it is your duty to indict him. Let no outside influence affect your investigations. Leave no stones unturned in your investigations of all law violations in the county. If a man comes before you and says I am guilty of selling beer do not let your sympathies control your action, but right to the line and enforce the law where they may. Search your own conscience and let it be your guide and as long as you do what you absolutely think is right then no man will censure your actions."

Firm Hand Needed "Law enforcement can be easily compared to a man who is head of a family. As long as that man as head of the family deals with a firm hand his family is a well regulated household and little discipline is needed, while on the other hand the man who turns his family loose in an automobile does not know where they are and will meet with trouble. Deal firmly with all law violators and the time will soon come that the lawless element will learn that they must pay the penalty when a law is violated."

"Here comes a man charged with criminal assault. I know nothing of the charge or the particulars of the case, but if he is guilty he should be indicted and serve the rest of his days in the penitentiary. Here comes a man charged with making so called 'choc' beer home brew. There is no provision made to have the stuff analyzed and you cannot force your prosecuting officers to spend their money for this purpose, but something must be done about this. I have seen merchants, who have beer bottles for sale, capping machines and the ingredients for making the stuff in their stores and yet Sunday morning you will see these same merchants in the 'Amen corner' of their church. Such procedure is merely encouraging the making of home brew."

Judge Woodward closed his charge to the grand jury by urging them to make thorough investigations of all cases that come before them.

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WATER BOARD PLANS FOR FINAL HEARING SLATED FOR JUNE 22

At a meeting of the board of directors of the Brown County Water Improvement District No. 1 together with the original water committee of 25 Monday night in the Chamber of Commerce rooms plans were discussed for the next hearing before the state water board in Austin June 22. All who were present last night were of one accord in the belief that the Brownwood needs and must have an additional water supply.

One of the most important moves decided upon last night was that through the local Chamber of Commerce the support of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce is to be solicited in helping Brownwood and Brown county obtain this additional water supply that is so badly needed to meet the demands of one of the fastest growing cities in Texas.

The Brownwood project will be placed before the Heart of Texas Chamber of Commerce committee of 16 counties, at their scheduled meeting here June 15.

To Go to Austin In addition to this it was planned to take some 40 or 50 representatives from Brownwood to Austin for the June 22 hearing, so that the state water board will know that not only does Brownwood need an additional water supply, but that Brownwood must and will have the supply that they need.

Another interesting fact brought out last night is that the water shed that the Syndicate Power Company claims to have water rights for covers an area of 37,000 square miles, which is more territory than is covered by some states. Brownwood and Brown county are asking for only four per cent of this territory and the four per cent of the entire shed will not give four per cent of the water carried down the Colorado in this territory. This grant to the power company was made about one year ago and their grant gives them 9 per cent of the work on their proposed project so unless Brownwood can set aside their grant in some way the city will suffer on account of a water shortage. It was stated last night.

TRANS-ATLANTIC SERVICE LEVINE'S DREAM

BERLIN, June 9.—(AP)—Charles A. D. Levine declared today that he and Clarence D. Chamberlin planned a regular trans-Atlantic aerial service, using multi-motored machines capable of carrying 2,000 pounds each.

Levine stated that he was ready to put \$2,000,000 into the scheme, and that both he and Chamberlin thought it could become operative within a year.

The plans envisaged by the two men who spanned the Atlantic from New York to Germany in the Belzanca monoplane Columbia would provide for regular trans-oceanic lines from America to various parts in Europe.

Chamberlin said: "The machine we intend to have built is unlike anything known here in Germany." As part of the development of

trans-Atlantic aerial lines, Chamberlin thinks floating landing places anchored in various parts of the ocean may be desirable for emergency landings, but he doesn't seem to attach prime importance to that, which has been discussed

in the European press as an absolute necessity. "The main thing," he said today, "is the constant development of more efficient machines which can carry a greater useful load in proportion to their weight."

CROPS ARE HELPED AS BIG RAINS FALL THROUGHOUT COUNTY

Although the total rain fall in Brownwood since Saturday noon amounts to only .47 of an inch, good rains are reported in both the north and south parts of the county. May and vicinity had a good rain Sunday afternoon and Sunday night as did Indian Creek and that part of the county. Bangs and Santa Anna reported light rains as did Blanket. Zephyr reported a big rain Sunday night and it seems that the rain extended east along the route of the Santa Fe. Mullen, Lampasas and Goldthwaite reported big rains. Fort Worth reported no rain, but Dublin and Comanche on the Frisco between Brownwood and Ft.

Worth reported heavy rains as did Hamilton and all cities between Hamilton and Waco.

To the west, Ballinger and Coleman reported light rains but San Angelo and Snyder reports state that heavy rains fell in that section of the state. Abilene reported no rains but Sweetwater and Stamford had light showers. The above reports were obtained through the courtesy of the West Texas Telephone Company.

Crops in the May and Indian Creek communities, or rather in those two sections of the county will be greatly benefited by Sunday night's rains and some benefit to growing crops will be noticed in other parts of the county where only light showers fell, according to the statement of County Farm Demonstration Agent O. P. Griffin and others.

Very little damage has been done to crops in the county by the recent hot and dry weather although in some sections of the county rain was

badly needed. The hot winds during the last few days of May damaged the crops more than the hot weather.

BOY, 13, ARRESTED ON LIQUOR CHARGES SATURDAY AFTERNOON

Jesse Lovelace, of Belle Plain avenue is also in the county jail facing charges of possession of intoxicating liquor after being arrested Saturday by members of the city police force after a raid was made on his home and 96 bottles of home brew were found.

Son and Lilton Davis, two local colored men, were arrested Sunday by members of the city police force on liquor law violation charges, one half pint of whiskey being found in their car. They are being held in the county jail pending action of the Brown county grand jury that was empaneled this afternoon.
