Memorial Service Is Postponed to Await Open Date

Politics is getting hot in California. When Rockefeller and Lodge went into cahoots a few days ago they claimed it was a deal to work together first in the California Republican primary and again in the party convention. Rather absurdly, they denied that it was a special effort to stop Goldwater.

They will have a hard time selling that denial to the public. Records show that Goldwater already has a big lead in convention support and can practically cinch the nomination by winning in California. So the obvious strategy for liberals now is to keep Barry from winning. If it isn't a stop Goldwater movement, what is it?

As a last chance maneuver it is not surprising. And very possibly it may not make a great deal of difference in the long run. People know that the election is a contest to determine whether conservative or liberal elements will take charge of the party. Rocky and Lodge may as well pool their strength now as later.

Of course, the nation anxiously awaits the outcome of the California race. As many political analysts see it, a win by Goldwater makes him a near cinch at the convention. And even loss would still leave him the strongest individual, though perhaps not strong enough to overcome the combined opposition of several liberals. In other words, California can possibly tell who the GOP standard bearer will be. Likewise it can possibly tell whether the coming presidential campaign will offer a choice of conservative and liberal issues or just a choice between two liberal candidates.

If Republicans will take a tip from President Johnson they will give their support to Goldwater. LBJ stated he hopes it will be Barry, a remark which might be intended to influence the party's selection of some other man. It must be remembered that political statements are made primarily for political effect. Could be that the Democrats actually consider Goldwater as the strongest man the GOP could select.

Whether or not he is the man who can win for the party is a tremendous question. In fact, a much bigger question is whether any Republican can beat the present administration. But another very important point also deserves attention. Regardless of outcome, the country should get more good out of the coming campaign than just the selection of the next president. It should have the opportunity to hear a thorough airing of issues such as can be expected when a dedicated conservative like Goldwater attacks the liberal policies that have been in effect for so many years.

People should be given an opportunity to learn more about the basic political philosophy of conservatism and liberalism and decide for themselves which is best for the country. They will not have that opportunity to learn or to choose when they are permitted only to pick between two liberals.

Even as a loser Goldwater could render a greater service to this country than a liberal Republican could as a winner. Ideas spread by his campaigning would leave a lasting impression on many people resulting in more effective resistance to socialistic and bureaucratic trends. On the other hand a successful GOP liberal would bring only a change in person but little change of national policy. People who say the Democrats have it in the bag would do well to consider that angle a bit. Do they want to continue the present unhampered trend toward welfare statism, or do they want to see the brakes applied a little? The answer to that could induce them to like Goldwater better.

Incidentally, what's wrong with Goldwater as a winner? What's wrong with bringing back some conservative practices like a balanced budget, reduction of national debt, less government snooping, and a will to win in the struggle with communism.

Muenster Gets on Nation's Air Map

Effective this week Muenster is on the nation's air map. Bruno Fleitman's field just east of town has been officially designated as a landing field, according to a report received by Muenster Jaycees from the Federal Aviation Agency.

The designation resulted from efforts during the past year by the Muenster Jaycees through cooperation of the Piper Aircraft Corp. It will be shown on the next official air map published by FAA. In the meantime all licensed pilots will receive instructions on marking the field on their present maps.

Sprinkler Going And Lawn Seeded At the Hospital

Basic work in establishing a lawn on the hospital grounds is finished, and Garden Club ladies are hoping that the next several weeks will bring out a good turf.

Bermuda was seeded Wednesday on clean ground and the automatic sprinkler system is getting a bountiful supply of lake water. All factors needed for good growth are believed to be there. To begin, weeds and native grasses will show more progress but the Bermuda is expected to gradually take over as the other vegetation is kept mowed.

Most of the yard work was done within the past ten days. Early last week Garden Club ladies and volunteer helpers started clearing out the weeds and grasses that sprang up since ground was leveled and sprinkling system installed. The object was to have clean ground for seeding Bermuda, which was given by Tony's Seed Store.

The pump to supply lake water for the sprinklers arrived Tuesday, was installed Wednesday morning and the seed was scattered and watered Wednesday afternoon.

There were two reasons for installing a special pump to use lake water for the lawn. First the natural water gets better results than the treated city water. And it costs less.

The sprinkler system includes about 250 sprinkler heads divided in 23 sections over the grounds. An automatic timing device waters each section for 15 minutes until the full course 23 sections has been watered.

The outfit for pumping lake water consists of a float made from four barrel shaped floats of styrofoam to support the submersible pump. Water at the spot is about 10 feet deep and the pump is 4 1/2 feet below the surface. The entire rig rises and falls with the level of the lake and is secured to the shore by a 30 foot framework of pipe.

The pump is powered by a 3.5 h.p. motor, has a capacity of 75 gallons per minute.

Swimming Pool To Open May 30

Muenster's municipal swimming pool will open on Saturday, May 30, members of the city council decided Monday night. They also named Karen Endres as assistant manager of the pool, helping James Polk, and voted to send both of them to Fort Worth Saturday for a one-day course on management and operation of swimming pools.

This year's pool schedule will be the same as last year. It will be open every day but Mondays from 2 to 9 p.m. No one will be admitted after 8 p.m. and if no one happens to be there at that time the pool will close then.

City Considers Improvements in Sewer Operation

Methods of improving the operation of Muenster's sewer system received special attention Tuesday when Bill Luke, sanitation commissioner, and Steve Moster, city superintendent, spent several hours studying the sewer system of Burkburnett.

The plant there was specially favored because of a new method of purifying water by aeration and also because plant capacity is about equal to that required here. Wastes from the NTPA milk plant demand local treatment facilities for a population equivalent of more than 5,000.

Luke and Moster got red carpet treatment from Jess Watley, city manager, and Haskell Draper, waterworks and sewer superintendent.

Howard Mollenkopf Gets Assistantship

Howard Mollenkopf, a senior at North Texas State University, has been awarded an assistantship for graduate study in physics at NTSU. The son of Mrs. George Mollenkopf Sr. of Muenster, he is a member of the American Institute of Physics.

The organizing meeting for this season's Little League baseball will be held Monday night of next week at 7 o'clock in the ball park. The meeting originally scheduled for Wednesday was postponed because of conflicting activities.

All boys wanting to play this season should be at Monday's meeting with the slip signed by a parent indicating permission to play and relieving the sponsors of liability in case of injury.

This year's Little League program will be similar to last year's. Jaycees will be the sponsors. Boys 9-11 will play in the pee wee division. Boys 12-14 will play in the advanced division.

Enrollment for Over 65 Insurance Will Resume Soon

H. Lewis Rietz, of Houston, president of the Texas 65 Health Insurance Association, has announced that the executive committee of the voluntary health insurance association has authorized an additional open enrollment period for Texans 65 years of age and past.

The dates for the next open enrollment are expected to be announced within the next ten days, Rietz stated.

Over 50,000 Texans over the age of 65 took advantage of the first Texas 65 enrollment last October. However, it is now apparent that many more of our senior citizens wish to avail themselves of the advantages of Texas 65," Rietz stated.

Benefits of the program are underwritten by 64 insurance companies doing business in Texas. The unique health insurance program offers three plans of voluntary health insurance for the senior citizen.

The basic plan pays a maximum of \$12 per day for a hospital room up to 31 days, a part of the costs of doctor's hospital visits, surgical fees up to \$200 and miscellaneous hospital charges up to \$125. Monthly premiums for this plan are \$9.

The major medical plan pays hospital expenses up to \$5,000 during any calendar year, or about 80 per cent of all hospital, surgical and nursing home expenses after the first \$75.

The major medical plan costs \$10 per month. It is designed primarily for those who have basic health insurance coverage, or who are able to meet the cost of basic coverage. The third Texas 65 plan is a combination of both the basic and major medical plans and costs \$19 per month.

Texas 65 will again be available from any insurance agent licensed to sell health insurance in Texas.
