## IT HAPPENED 25 YEARS AGO

**June 2, 1939**  
 One hundred land owners endorse petition for soil conservation district. Death claims Andrew Zimmerman, 88, pioneer Lindsay resident. First graduates of Sacred Heart High receive diplomas: Catherine Swirczynski, Lorena Fisher and

Johnny Wimmer. Rain helps row crops but delays harvesting. Joe Trachta takes over Henry Walterscheid's drug store. Della Fette and Herman Hartman marry Monday. Magdalenne Flusche and Ramond Zimmerman marry. Mrs. Jake Kuhn is recovering from a heart attack. Public school students and teachers make bus trip to Carlsbad Caverns.

**June 9, 1939**  
 Rain assures fair crop of corn but delays harvesting with

no damage to uncut grain. Lindsay's first wheat of the season is brought in by Jake Bezner. Muenster Knights of Columbus re-elect Rev. Francis Zimmerman as grand knight. Drilling activity in south Muenster field is booming. Mrs. Ben Luke escapes injury in car-truck crash. Cooke County Co-op now serves 337 customers with electricity. Tony Mae Friske has appendicitis operation. Andy Flusche marries Marie Mueller of Pilot Point. Construction begins on a new home for the J. H. Horns.

## 20 YEARS AGO

**June 2, 1944**  
 Both local schools close with graduation exercises. Sacred Heart has 12 high and 29 grade students; Public School has seven high and two grade school graduates. Military funeral is held at Lindsay for Cadet Ray Berend, plane crash victim. Henrietta Wieman and Pvt. Melvin Fisch marry. Sister Leonarda will present music pupils in annual recital Sunday. Pfc. Val Fuhrmann has been transferred from the island of Attu for duty in Alaska. Lt. Patrick Stelzer receives oak leaf cluster in the South Pacific area.

**June 9, 1944**  
 Funeral services are held for John Sturm, 85, pioneer Lindsay resident. Harvesting is in progress with grain above average. Muenster's first horse show draws big attendance. John Hoffman will come here in September to head the public school as superintendent after teaching at Rhineland the past several years. Frank Hennigan is among graduates at Subiaco Academy. Dr. Gilbert, former Gainesville dentist, dies in Austin. Mr. and Mrs. C. B. Fowler return to Muenster to reside after being away about two years. Pat Hennigan is at home on leave.

## 15 YEARS AGO

**June 3, 1949**  
 Death claims Mrs. J. P. Fisch, 88, resident here 42 years. Cemetery collection on Memorial Day adds \$240 to cemetery fund. Long awaited Main Street paving job is finished. Largest class in SH. High history is graduated with 23 seniors receiving diplomas. Felix Yosten is recovering from ruptured appendix operation performed in Harlingen where he was working. Alvin Fuhrman is dismissed from hospital but is a shut-in on account of a broken left leg. J. M. Weinzapfel has returned from Dallas where he underwent major surgery May 21. Raymond Hermes of Lindsay is graduated from Subiaco Academy.

**June 10, 1949**  
 City Council urges clean-up and spraying as precaution against polio. Myra voters approve \$75,000 school bond. Death ends illness of Mrs. Emma Morrison. Community begins annual grain harvest with yields below average. Lawrence Baumhardt is re-elected grand knight of local Knights of Columbus. Community Lumber completes move from St. Jo to Muenster. Pfc. Buddy Yosten writes his folks that he has arrived safely in Japan. Roy Baumhardt has enlisted in the Air Force. J. W. Hess buys farm from the Joe Tischlers who are making plans to move to Pilot Point. The Leonard Yosten family of Wilson, Okla., visited here during the weekend. Loretta Hartman and Emily Fette receive nursing diplomas at St. Paul's Hospital in Dallas.

## 10 YEARS AGO

**June 4, 1954**  
 Grain is better than average but short of last year's bumper crop. Cecil Welch of Hood delivers first wheat here. Wheat loans will be available in spite of storage problems.

Dr. T. S. Myrick is elected president of Lions Club. Knights of Columbus re-elect officers headed by J. P. Flusche as grand knight. Meinrad Yosten has enlisted in the Marine Corps and left this week for training in San Diego. Community buys \$145.80 worth of buddy poppies. Julia Wolf joins staff at Muenster State Bank. Dorothy Rohmer and Morton Wright marry in Dallas. Ray Luke is among graduates at Subiaco Academy in Arkansas.

## 5 YEARS AGO

**June 5, 1959**  
 Rains have both good and bad effect on local crops. Swimming pool opened Sunday with large attendance. First of three swim classes begin Monday. Pat Hennigan is re-elected grand knight of Muenster KC council. VFW and Auxiliary conduct annual memorial services. Mary Jane Block and Herbert Fleitman marry. The Rudy Hellmans leave on European trip. Mrs. Joe Sicking of Gainesville is recovering from a broken hip. Fifty-five children report for pre-school registration in first grade at parochial school. Thirty-five children will be graduated from Vacation Bible School at local Baptist Church Friday.

**June 11, 1954**  
 Pouring gasoline on fire is fatal to Douglas Fleitman, 8-year-old son of the Albert Fleitmans. City council okays city census and survey. Benefits of rain more than offset delay in harvest; 1.8 inches falls this week. Wheat reports at mid-harvest are better than first estimates; average is over 20 bushels. Fred Hoedebecks are honored on 54th wedding anniversary. Mary Nell Hellman and Lorine Fleitman have made arrangements to enter business college at Wichita Falls. Mrs. Joe Bezner is back at Lindsay after spending about four months with her children in Dallas where she was recovering from a broken leg sustained there on a visit. Father Bruno Fuhrmann and Father Nicholas Fuhrmann, newly ordained priests, return to Subiaco after visits with their families at Lindsay.

**June 12, 1959**  
 Clothing factory awaits survey of local labor available. Wet vote is expected here soon as result of new court ruling that a wet precinct or town can be legally established in a dry county. Grain floods local elevators at harvest peak. Ervin Hamric has surgery for acute appendicitis. Fourth Degree Knights re-elect John Mosman faithful navigator. Parish contributes \$297 for cemetery. Patsy Endres and Kathy McGannon, SH 4-H team, win third in A&M state contest. Jeanette Haverkamp and Travis Wickliffe marry.
