

Governor Asks For Re-evaluation Of Water Planning

Gov. Preston Smith has called for re-evaluation of Texas' water planning and proposed in 1968.

Smith told Chairman Marlast year for topographic mapping, water studies and investigations. About a third is obigated under contracts.

Governor Smith called atvoters rejected the \$3.5 billion bond issue on August 5, 1969, that was designed to pay the state's share of the project's

"In view of the critical shortage of state funds, additional expenditures for water studies and investigations we know that they would suppursue," said Smith in a letter to Shurbet. "Accordingly it ernor's office to support concourse in water resource planning."

One source said Smith feels hat a long-range plan would get more support if citizens could see some concrete, shortterm aecomplishments in water development.

Smith reportedly may ask he Legislature to submit to the voters a bond program to finance aid to cities for sewage treatment.
