Forged by Suffering

If it is true that suffering and oppression creates great writers, this would explain why some of the greatest literary works of our time are now being forged by fate on the anvil of pain behind the Iron Curtain.

"Dr. Zhivago" by Boris Pasternak; "On the Edge of the Volcano" by Joseph Pesti; "My Testimony" by Anatoly Marchenko, the collection of letters to Pavel Litvinov in "Dear Comrade"; "One Day in the Life of Ivan Denisovich" and "The First Circle" by Solzhenitsyn; these and others smuggled out from the prison of nations bear the stamp of greatness. Hundreds of talented Russian and captive nation writers are today in prisons, slave labor camps, or insane asylums. Those who remain "free" must write as communist party hacks or suffer the same fate.

When compared with the very real oppression waged today by the Soviet dictatorship against the people in the captive nations, the bleating of the Abbie Hoffmans and the Jerry Rubins and the Eldridge Cleavers about alleged "oppression" in the United States is a cruel hoax. If they want to find out what oppression is really all about, let them try a little free speech in Moscow.

Truth or Consequences

Add to the disgraceful crime picture in our Nation's Capital one more black eye. It has just been revealed that Washington now has the highest syphilis incidence rate in the nation, and is in fourth highest position of other venereal diseases. The statistics were compiled by the American Social Health Association in cooperation with six leading public health and medical organizations, including the American Medical Association.

Of the various diseases loosely termed "VD," syphilis is the deadliest and most horrifying killer of them all. Because syphilis is almost entirely contacted by immoral or sexual contact, it is seldom mentioned. People die from heart attack, cancer, or TB—but when did you ever see a death notice "Died from VD"?

Within a matter of hours after sexual contact, the deadly spirochete enters the bloodstream and spreads throughout the body. It may take from ten days to ten weeks for any visible sign of the death-dealing germ to appear. Because it is painless, it is easy to miss, but unless destroyed by medical treatment, it will remain alive longer than the victim.

The second stage symptoms begin to appear in about six

weeks—headaches, pains in bones and joints, sore throat, and/or a barely detectable skin rash.

Now, the spirochete is ready to strike—to incapacitate or kill. The microbe may attack the spinal cord, the nerves, the heart, the brain, the eyes, the bones, or a combination of them. Doctors bluntly state: "The prognosis of cardiovascular syphilis is poor, and sudden death is not uncommon." In plain language, if syphilis hits your heart, chances are you are dead brother. But maybe those who die quickly are the lucky ones. Syphilis literally destroys the brain, bringing about insanity, loss of memory, delusions, deafness, blindness, convulsions, extreme and/or continual pain.

THERE IS NO CURE. Even if quick action is taken and the microbe is killed by medical treatment, there is no cure to any damage already done to the body and mind—that is permanent.

The only sensible solution is to teach our young people and others through legitimate sex education that pre-marital and extra-marital sex is wrong—and if they are not strong enough to resist it, they may have to pay the consequences; a living horror for the rest of their lives.

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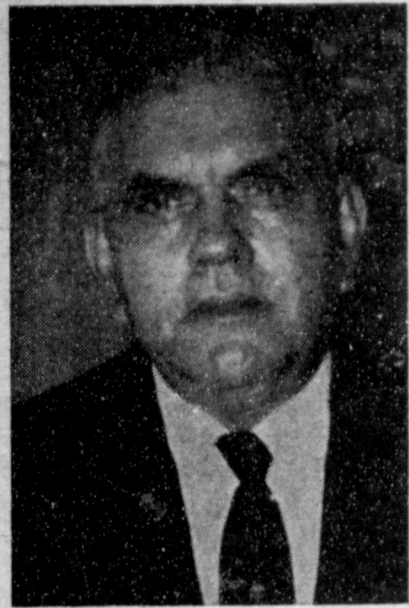
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Local News BRIEFS

Lindsay girls took over in a big way at the District 4 Girls Track and Field Meet held in Gainesville last week Wednesday. They were strong first place winners in both the high school and the elementary divisions.

Team scores in the senior events were Lindsay, 191, Whitesboro 111, Nocona 89, Howe 50, Sadler-Southmayd 40, Collinsville 24, Gunter 14, Van Alstyne 2. In junior events the scores were Lindsay 183, Howe 106, Nocona 101½, Whitesboro 59, Van Alstyne 8, Collinsville 7½.

First and second place winners of the senior events are eligible to compete in a regional meet in Mount Pleasant, and winners of the first two places there will qualify for the state meet in Abilene.

Lindsay's girls won four firsts and 9 seconds in the senior meet. Jane Fuhrmann led the scoring with firsts in the triple jump, shot and discus. Other girls eligible for the regional are Sharon Metzler, Kathy Bezner, Carol Fuhrmann, Christine Bengfort, Janie Zimmerman, Marilyn Stofels and Marilyn Hundt. Also eligible are other girls who are on the relay teams. Lindsay won a first and two seconds in the three relay races. Elementary girls do not go to the regional. Lindsay had seven firsts and five seconds in that division. Margie Stofels was top scorer with firsts in triple jump, long jump and 440 run. Donna Zimmerer had firsts in the 60 and 220 dashes and third in the 100 yard dash.
