Red Angus Bull of Colonial Acres Gets Record Price

The sale of one third interest in the top Red Angus bull at Colonial Acres Farm for \$37,000 has been announced by Gene Riggs, farm manager.

The purchase was made by James S. Melton of Arlington, Va. According to Riggs, the price set a new record high for the

scendants of those pioneers. Red Angus breed. The young bull, named Red Comanche OB, is outstanding in both pedigree and record. It was born Sept. 22, 1965, sired by WB Comanche OB, that died accidentally last year at Colonial Acres, and is out of a famous show cow, JK's Red Lottie, with grand champion Red Angus awards from San Antonio, Fort Worth, Portland and several other big shows.

Red Comanche OB weighed 628 when weaned, slightly over 1000 pounds at 1 year, and now over 1300. He was grand champion at the South Texas Fair in Beaumont and reserve champion at the Pan American Livestock Exposition of the State Fair in Dallas. Red Comanche will remain at Colonial Acres Farm.

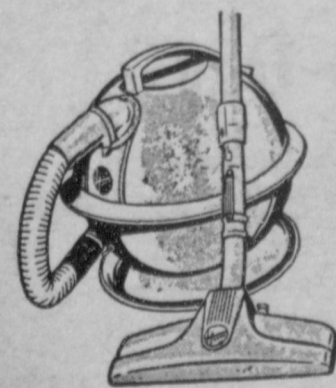

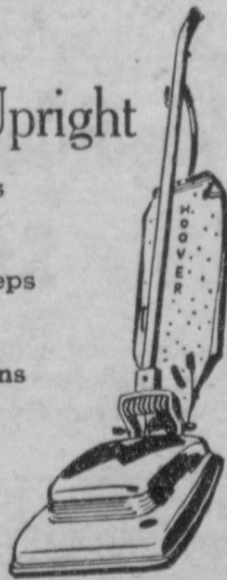

You Can't Cure A Cold, Says AMA

This is the season of the year when the American Medical Association reminds once again that you can't cure a cold.

And if anyone tries to sell you on the latest version of a so-called "cold cure" you can save your money.

Many of the classic diseases of history have succumbed in the 20th century to new medical skills and modern drugs. But the cold virus still successfully resists the best efforts of the world's combined medical research talent.

As the years go by more and more is being learned about colds and their causes.

A number of viruses produce the symptoms that most of us call a cold, possibly as many

as a hundred. The true cold is an infection with one or more viruses. Bacteria are believed to be purely secondary infections.

Current research seems to indicate that colds are harder to spread than has been thought. Fresh colds appear to be more contagious than older ones. Children's colds probably are more contagious than those of adults. There still is much discussion among experts as to the relationship of becoming chilled or exposure to dampness to "catching" a cold.

What can you do for a cold?

No specific treatment, so far available, is effective against the cold virus. Any treatment is directed toward relief of the discomfort of runny nose, watering eyes, sore throat, slight fever and other symptoms of the cold. Penicillin does not stop the virus,

but may be prescribed by your physician for secondary bacterial infections. Bed rest, or at least inactivity, is helpful. Your physician may suggest mild medication to help relieve the discomfort.

Cold vaccines have yet to be proved of much value. There is no evidence that any particular foods, vitamin supplements, special clothing or exposure to sunlight or fresh air have any effect on colds.

If a cold persists or seems unusually severe, see your doctor. Colds are great imitators and the early symptoms can mimic those of other more serious infections. Recurring colds may not be colds at all, but may be allergic attacks that require medical attention.

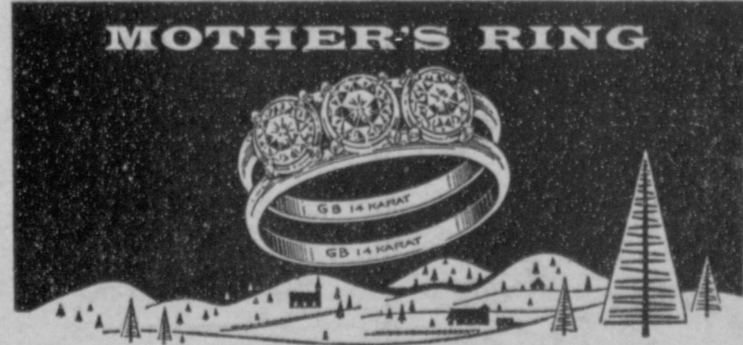

SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

OUR SOIL ★ OUR STRENGTH

Lawrence Zimmerer has had conservation plans on his farm revised and updated. He has plans for additional pasture establishment and one or more new farm ponds to supply additional livestock water.

Zimmerer reports good results from his conservation cropping system which is mainly fertilized small grains in rotation with alfalfa and winter peas. He uses approximately 150 pounds of a commercial fertilizer mixture per acre at planting time, then topdresses in late February or early March with 100 pounds of 30-0-0 per acre.

He mulches all his crop residues back into the soil for land improvement. Most of his land is terraced and from this cropping system he has built average wheat yields up to 33 bushels per acre and oats to 55 bushels per acre. In addition to high grain yields he usually gets two months of grazing from small grains.

New terrace lines have been run on the Tony Hermes farm at Lindsay. These terraces outlet on a Bermuda Grass pasture and replace some old terraces considered worthless. A maintainer was used to build

New terraces are being constructed on the Alvin Loerwald farm with a maintainer doing the work. The field has been in alfalfa for several years and is being terraced and plowed to ready it for sowing to oats. Loerwald built a new terrace on another farm earlier in the year.

A new terrace has been completed on the Julius Hermes farm near Hood. The farm was terraced several years ago, but Hermes and his son, William, who operates the farm, decided they needed another terrace at the foot of a slope below another terrace. The new terrace was constructed with a disc plow.

Frank Neu, Upper Elm-Red District cooperater in the Valley View Community, is having some repair work done on old terraces this week. He is using a bulldozer to do the work, and plans to smooth up old fence rows, level in some gullies and clear fairly heavy timber along a creek.


