## Memorial Sunday For Deceased of Armed Forces

Deceased service men of Muenster will be remembered Sunday in the annual memorial service conducted by the VFW Post and Auxiliary in cooperation with the pastor of Sacred Heart Church.

It will follow the 7:30 a.m. Mass and will begin with a procession from church to the cemetery. A color guard and a rifle detail from the post will take the lead.

Also in the procession will be officers of the Auxiliary with wreaths to be placed on the monuments and Cub Scouts with floral tributes to be placed on service men's graves.

Special places of honor and special flowers — corsages for the ladies and boutonnières for the men — will be given to Gold Star Parents. There are nine: Mr. and Mrs. Albert Fleitman, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Bayer, Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Weinzapfel and Mrs. R. R. Endres, John Felderhoff and Theresa Moster.

The procession's first stop in the cemetery will be at the crucifixion group in the center where the pastor will lead in prayer for all deceased of the community and one of the wreaths will be deposited.

Procession will continue to the service men's graves where Auxiliary officers and Cub Scouts will place their flowers, the pastor will lead in prayer and deliver the Memorial address, and the veterans will conduct the traditional military services consisting of a three-volley rifle salute and taps.

Following all services Sunday Auxiliary members will accept contributions in the annual buddy poppy campaign.

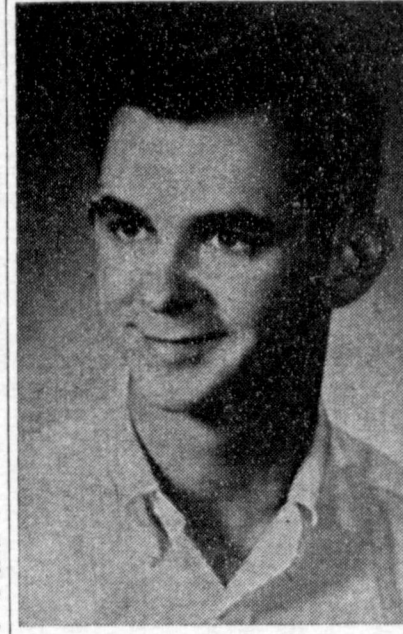
They were pronounced dead on arrival at Muenster Memorial Hospital and were believed to be dead at the scene of the accident.

Two companions, Miss Joyce Alene Sicking, 18, of Myra, and Billy Ray Hardesty, 19, of

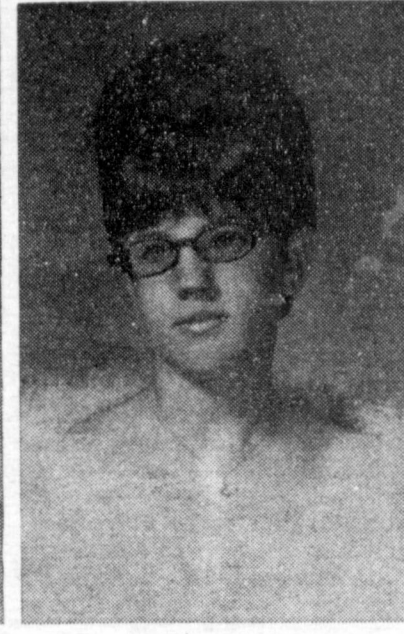

## Sermon on Mount Is Subject of SH Graduation Talk

The commencement message to Sacred Heart School graduates Sunday night was taken from a speech by the greatest teacher of all time, the man who taught for only three years and has a greater influence on civilization than any other person.

Father Benedict Buergler, former local teacher and assistant pastor, said he recommended the Sermon on the Mount as the best way to happiness. And he added that, in the final analysis, happiness is the goal we all really seek for.

He said the complete formula for happiness is in the Beatitudes.

Father Benedict also reminded the graduates of their duty to observe God's will as they pursue their own goals through life. "The world needs men and women who will stand and be counted as Christians, who by word and example will continue spreading the good word of Christ's teachings. More people need to know that the Savior's advice referred to temporal as well as eternal happiness."

## Homsley Speaks At Muenster High Commencement

Success, the goal that all graduates seek for, is difficult to describe but it was apparent in an ex-Marine several days ago as he guarded the US flag against about 150 demonstrators who threatened to desecrate it.

"That man is a success," H. Howard Homlesley, former superintendent of Muenster Public School, told the MHS graduates at their commencement services last Friday night. He said that success can not be bought, borrowed or stolen, it has to be earned. Nor can it be measured in dollars and cents. It is a spiritual value, the satisfaction of living up to ideals.

To attain success, the speaker recommended faith . . . in one's self and other people, and especially faith in God.

Homsley also reminded the graduates that this is the time when they cease to be students. They are adults facing problems they did not cause but must help solve. They will be concerned with war, pollution, dissection, crime. As they go to college they will probably encounter demonstrations, and it's good to remember that students don't get hurt when they stick to their studies.

The service opened as Miss Bettye Dodds played the professional for entry of forty three high graduates and twenty nine grade school graduates. She also played for the recessional ending the service.

## Tuesday Rainfall Measured 1.27 in.

A short downpour Tuesday, beginning about 1 o'clock and lasting hardly fifteen minutes, accounts for about half of this community's rain to date in May.

Steve Moster's rain gauge Wednesday morning read 1.27, almost all of it falling in the quarter hour. Small hail, about pea size, fell during the first few minutes.

Other rain recorded for the month was .62 on the 24th, .46 on the 15th and .11 on the 1st. The combined measure is 2.46 inches, which is approximately half of the normal total for May. The year's total to now 14.05, slightly below the average for this time of the year.

Wednesday night's rain improved the moisture condition by .63 inch. That brings the month's total to 3.09 inches and the year's total to 14.68.

## Hospital Adopts \$385,754 Budget

The budget of Muenster Hospital District for the 1971 fiscal year is \$385,754. That figure was adopted by the hospital directors in their regular monthly meeting Wednesday night of last week.

Included in that amount is a portion of \$37,912 for paying interest on hospital bonds and retiring the bonds which come due. It is provided by a tax of 65 cents per \$100 of valuation within the hospital district. None of the tax collected is used for hospital operation.

The other portion of the budget is \$347,842 for hospital operation, reflecting an expected increase of about \$30,000. This estimate is based on an expected patient load of 18 per day or a total of 6570 patient days. The hospital had 5582 patient days last year.

Major sources of estimated income are \$177,000 for room and board, \$39,000 for X-Ray, \$37,000 for drugs, \$38,000 for operating room and anesthetics, and the balance for other charges.

Principal expense of the hospital is its payroll, which is estimated at \$173,000. Next major expense group includes utilities, drugs, food, insurance, depreciation, etc., and is estimated at \$127,000. Another group is supplies, including X-Ray film, dressings, laundry, oxygen and other items needed for patients care, at an estimated total of \$47,000.

David Bright, hospital administrator, also pointed out that over 75 per cent of the money spent by the hospital is spent locally. He estimated that \$270,000 of the \$347,842 operation cost will be for salaries and locally purchased items. He said that the hospital payroll is one of the largest of the community. The same applies to debt service costs. Since all bonds are locally owned all payments stay in the community.

## Co-op to Receive 4-H State Award

Cooke County Electric Cooperative has been named to receive an award from the Texas 4-H Youth Development Foundation, June 3, for its contributions to 4-H Club work.

The award will be presented at the first general assembly meeting of the 1970 State 4-H Roundup. Foundation Chairman Larry Baker, Orange, will present the recipient with a specially designed plaque and outline the co-op's contributions to 4-H in the 5:30 p.m. assembly to be held in G. Rolie White Coliseum on the Texas A&M University campus.

The Cooke County Electric Cooperative has sponsored the 4-H Achievement Banquet for Cooke and Montague counties for seven years. A representative from the cooperative has also served as a judge in the District 4-H Contest since 1965.

The cooperative has sponsored the Government in Action Tour to Washington, D.C. for 4-H Clubs of Montague and Cooke Counties, and also assisted the Extension county staffs in conducting 4-H electric study groups, involving more than 150 members.

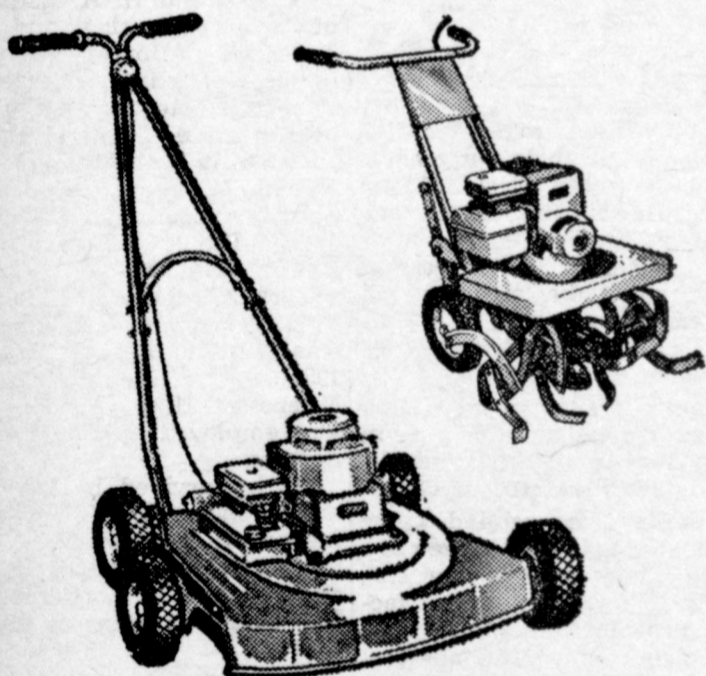

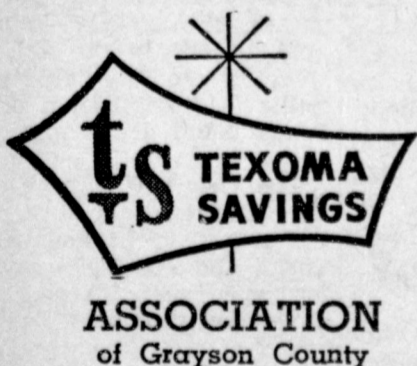

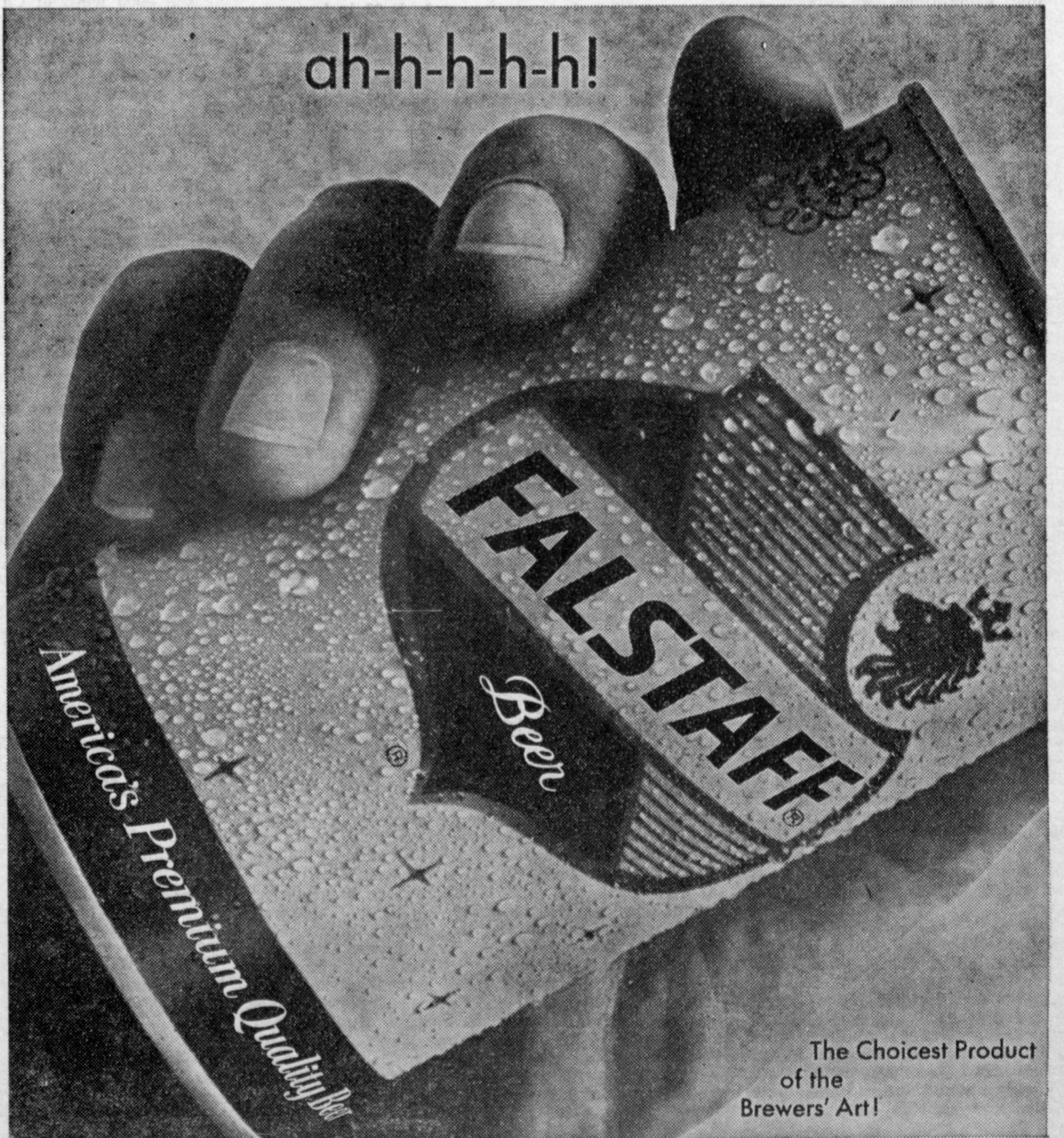

 Now is the time to spray pecan trees for the Pecan Nut Casebearer. Trees should be sprayed as soon as possible to assure good control of the insect. **AN ORDINANCE**  
An ordinance declaring the necessity for and ordering the paving and improvement, including curbs and gutters of certain streets or portions thereof in the City of Muenster, approving the plans and specifications for such work, authorizing the City Superintendent and/or mayor to advertise for bids directing the preparation or estimates, invoking the procedure previously adopted by the City Council of the City of Muenster, determining that a part of the costs shall be borne by the abutting property and the owners of such property providing for the assessments of the portion of the cost to be borne by the property owners, and fixing of a lien to secure the payment of such costs, directing the City Secretary to cause a Notice of the enactment of this Ordinance to be filed in the mortgage lien or deed of trust records of Cooke County, Texas, and calling and issuing NOTICE OF HEARING, and declaring an emergency, as specified, and in accordance with article 1105b of the revised civil statutes of Texas.

**BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MUESTER:**

SECTION I. That a necessity exists for the permanent improvement of those certain streets or portions of public streets herein described or listed by excavating, grading and paving the same, by the installation of drainage facilities herein, and by construction of curbs and gutters where adequate curbs and gutters are not now existing or in place, and such improvements are hereby ordered; the public streets and/or portions thereof to be so improved being designated and defined by Street Units as follows:

(A) On Ninth Street, from the boundary line of Maple Street to Cedar Street.

(B) On Cedar Street, from the boundary line of Ninth Street to the Farm-to-Market Highway No. 373.

SECTION II. Streets will be paved from curb to curb; curbs and gutters will be constructed where none now exist and all necessary drainage facilities will be installed. In instance where there is now some existing pavement which may be adequate, such pavement, if possible, will not be removed, but repaired, and all necessary work and material will be done upon said street units in order to effect a good and sufficient paving, from curb to curb, and the plans and specifications for said improvements heretofore prepared by the City and/or its agent and now on file with the City Council are hereby in all its entirety approved.

SECTION III. The City Superintendent, and/or the Mayor is hereby authorized and directed to advertise for bids for the improvements and work herein described; the advertising, and opening of such bids to be handled in a manner prescribed by law, upon receipt and opening of such bids for such improvement work, the City Water and Sewer Superintendent and/or the City Secretary is directed to prepare and file with the City Council an estimate of the total cost of the improvements herein ordered and the total amount of the part of the cost of the improvements herein ordered which is to be paid by the City of Muenster.

SECTION IV. The City Council of the City of Muenster deems it advisable and hereby determines to proceed under and in exercise of the powers, terms and provisions of Chapter 106, of the First called Session of the Legislature of Texas, as prescribed in Article 1105b, R.C.S. of the State of Texas and all subsequent revisions and amendments thereto.

SECTION V. The cost of said improvements shall be paid as follows:

(a) The City shall pay the cost of surveying the proper boundary lines of said streets and shall take responsibility to make all drainage installations wherever same is necessary or wherever same is located, and some of the base preparation and paving, within the street and alley intersections, and not less than 20 per cent of the cost of excavation, base preparation and paving of all other portions of street units involved. The remaining street unit and costs thereof of all such improvements shall be paid by the property owner of the property abutting said street and shall be assessed against the said owner of the property abutting said street.

(b) The City shall proceed to accept bids and/or make provisions required to be done on said improvements, and the pro rata share to be paid by the abutting property owner and same shall be submitted to such owners of the abutting property showing the portion due on said pro rata basis for such improvements.

(c) The remaining pro rata share cost of such improvements shall be assessed against the re-

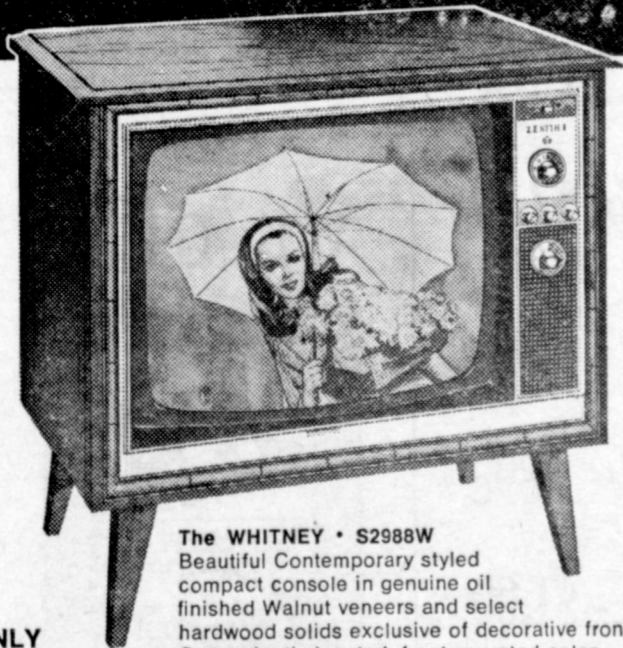

makes better use of available plant food? Would the same fertilizer investment yield more in Triticale than in wheat? Or does it mean that wheat can use up to a certain amount of fertilizer but Triticale can use more? And will our normal moisture supply be adequate for the big yields?

Problems like that are fascinating and most likely will eventually lead to better production in all crops. Even more fascinating is the thought that this ray of hope shines out just as the world is beginning to worry about a coming food shortage.

It is interesting to note in this regard that some worries on the subject were voiced a couple of decades ago. That was about the time when people realized that some land was being lost by erosion and other land was simply losing its fertility.

Then came soil conservation practices. Erosion was slowed down, soil fertility was restored with fertilizers and crop rotation. Yields started increasing. Food production kept comfortably ahead of population increase. But now again the economists estimate that food demand is gaining on supply, and people are getting concerned. The story of Triticale potential is especially gratifying at this time.

Meanwhile we can take assurance from past progress that other ways will be found to continue the increase of food production. Yields will keep going up. More by-products will be processed. More marginal and idle land will be used. Vegetation will be harvested from the sea. Human ingenuity will find ways to push back the food crisis for a long time.
