Another horrible example of biased legislation was last week's action by the House Judiciary Committee approving an extended time period for ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment.

By a count of 17-16 the panel voted to extend the final date for ratification by three fourths of the states to June 30, 1982, instead of the present deadline date of March 22, 1979.

Of course the committee's action is a far cry from actual postponement of the deadline. It is only the recommendation of a small group and will need approving votes in both the House and the Senate to become official.

And even then the amendment still has to be approved by three of the remaining 15 states to become a part of the U S Constitution. In view of the phengling and political arm twisting that has been going on, it is very possible that the remaining states will be too disgusted to cooperate.

When the Congress submitted ERA to the states for ratification it specified a 7 year deadline as had been set for the final approval date of all previous amendments. It meant that the amendment would become a part of the U S Constitution if legislatures of three fourths of the states . . . a total of 38 states . . . would vote their approval before March 22, 1979. For a while the ratifications came fast, but then the idea soured, with the result that ERA supporters have all but admitted that they cannot sign up the necessary three states in the next eight months.

In every day language this means that they can't win the game by playing according to the rules, so they change the rules to favor themselves. After a long time of inactivity by the 15 remaining states, the ERA people now feel that they need more time for applying pressure.

To make matters worse, their way of changing the rule was definitely out of harmony with the U S Constitution. The committee's extension of deadline was approved by the slim majority of only 17-16, whereas a two thirds majority was originally required to submit the amendment for ratification. Jack Brooks, one of three Texans on the committee, made an issue of this point, saying "If we're going to change the Constitution, we ought to do it by the Constitution." But his logic was wasted on the biased committee.

Another detail that seems to violate logic or the Constitution, or both, was the committee's 13-21 rejection of an amendment giving each state an opportunity during the extension period to rescind any prior ERA ratification.

From the beginning there have been questions about a state's right to change its mind and rescind its ratification. The idea seems very reasonable, but the people running the show succeeded in keeping it ruled out. But now we come to another situation. Each state's ratification up to now has been in accordance with the originally submitted proposition, which limited the ratification deadline to seven years. One would think that the state's obligation to abide by its choice would end when the deadline expires.

Sam Hall, another Texan on the Judiciary Committee, shared the opinion that ERA ought to be washed up when its ratification period expired. He said that "the founding fathers did not intend for a ratification period to be extended."

Supporters of ERA were delighted by the committee's recommendation to extend the ratification period, but they are still a long way from success in their venture. This is only a last desperate effort to revive an issue that has been dormant for 18 months, and doesn't mean a thing unless the two houses of Congress will approve the deadline extension. When the legislators start considering the proposal they will recall not only the shabby procedure in bringing back the issue but the widespread opposition to ERA all over the country.

In the first place the extension of deadline is far from assured. And even if it is approved there is little reason to

Project Replacing Overpass Begins

The project of replacing Muenster's two lane overpass on Highway 82 with a four lane surface road got underway Monday as workmen started on the additional two lanes at the Elm Creek bridge.

The project is being supervised by Charlie Hildebrand of the Gainesville office of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation. The contractor is Orval Hall of Fort Worth on a bid of \$747,153.09. With an estimated work schedule of 225 working days, the half mile project is expected to be finished about July 1, 1979.

The job begins with providing the detour for use while the road is being built, and the bridge started Monday is the first stage of detour work. It will be the west end of the detour and also become a part of the completed four lane road.

The detour will begin at the intersection of Main Street and U.S. 82, go about a block south to Cross Street and two blocks west to Maple, then north to the north side of the project's right of way. There it will turn west and follow the right of way to the bridge which will exit on the highway. The detour will be an asphalt paved street, remaining afterward as a bonus benefit of the project. According to schedule, the detour work should be finished in about three months allowing demolition of the overpass about November 1.

That job is to be done in two stages, leaving the west span until last so that traffic over the detour can continue while other sections are knocked down and the debris cleared away. And finally traffic will be briefly routed over the cleared area while the last span is removed.

When all of that has been done the working crew will start from scratch on the road building job. That will consist first of all of establishing the desired grade, which includes removing the deep fill between bridge and overpass, so that the bridge and Maple Street intersection will be at about the same level. The span from Maple to Main will generally follow the natural incline of the terrain, however some additional dirt-fill will be needed. The road will

rise some 21 feet in the 1100 feet between Maple and Main. After the base work has been finished curb and gutter along with other drainage control will be installed, then the base will be shaped and packed to make ready for the asphalt surface.

The overpass has served Muenster for approximately one half of the community's 89 years. It was built in the mid thirties, along with Highway 82, as a crossing over the MK&T Railroad, which had thriving passenger and freight traffic through Muenster. However the railroad's decline gradually led to discontinuation of service and eventual removal of tracks.

Since then the two lane road has become a bottleneck for the four lane road at both sides.
