Take a simple sentence: Mr. Jones is the father of two boys." Now try it this way: "Mr. Jones is the so-called father of two so-called boys. In this second sentence it's quite obvious we think poorly of Mr. Jones and his boys. but we aren't straight-forward enough to say it or to explain our reasons for it.

"So-called" is a snide, sneaky expression, and we don't like it. That is our opinion. But we realize that some other socalled persons have their own so-called opinions and they won't pay any attention at all to this so-called line of reason-

Can he possibly think the American public gullible enough to swallow such patent hogwash?


