After eight years of complaints and ill feeling about the Supreme Court's ruling on prayer in public schools, it begins to seem that public displeasure was mostly a case of misunderstanding.

The editorial of this week's US News and World Report presents an article by Louis Cassels, religion writer of United Press International, which states that the Court did not ban prayer and Bible reading from public school classrooms. School authorities and the millions of concerned parents who got that idea have been wrong.

The writer says the Court has made two rulings on the subject, and only two. The Engel v. Vitale decision in 1962 held that "a public school may not require the recitation of an officially sponsored prayer as part of a classroom religious exercise." The following year, in Abington School District v. Schempp, the Court said that "a public school may not require the reading of a portion of the Bible or the recitation of the Lord's Prayer as part of a classroom religious exercise."

These passages contain a few key words which reveal the Court's intention to limit the extent of its ruling. They are "may not require," implying that voluntary prayer is not banned; "officially sponsored," implying that someone other than school officials may choose the prayer; "as part of a classroom religious exercise," which rules out prayer during regular class time.

In keeping with those restrictions, it appears that the Court's ruling allows voluntary prayer chosen by a student, or perhaps a minister, recited before class time, or some other free time during the day.

Despite many harsh criticisms of the Supreme Court on this subject, one must, in fairness, concede that its decision was more reasonable than the average person admitted. It ruled that a practice followed in many schools infringing on the religious liberty of persons who objected, and transgressed the line of separation between church and state. However its choice of words suggested that there was a way of having prayers without infringing and without transgressing. The unfortunate fact is that people did not grasp the significance of the choice of words. They assumed that the court banned prayer whereas it only banned a method of praying.

Another interesting ruling on the subject was handed down by a federal court in New Jersey. It concerned reading of prayers before school time under supervision of school board employees. The judge said it violated the first amendment, and added that the amendment merely forbids a law respecting the establishment of religion or prohibiting the free exercise thereof. "Thus I make no ruling of what effect, if any, the free actions of children meeting on their own time and of their own volition even though on school premises would have."

From that statement one might imply that such prayer is not only permissible, but also that banning it violates constitutional rights by prohibiting free exercise of religion. This kind of thinking harmonizes with the convictions of millions of people and indicates that few objectors, if any, know what the court ruling actually allowed. The real issue these several years was not a ban on prayer but on the method of praying.

The US News and World Report article further states that the Court went out of its way to emphasize that there is no objection to any of the following activities in public schools:

Use of the Bible as a reference work for teaching secular subjects.

Study of the Bible for its literary and historic qualities. Objective instruction in comparative religion.

Study of the history of religion and its role in the advancement of civilization.

Reciting historical documents, such as the Declaration of Independence, which contain reference to God.

Singing the National Anthem or patriotic hymns, which include the composers' profession of faith in God.

Referring to God in patriotic or ceremonial occasion.

Dreary Weather Fails to Spoil FFA Stock Show

In spite of miserable weather the Muenster FFA boys had a fine project show Tuesday. And every member is deeply grateful to Mr. and Mrs. Charles Bartush whose help made the big difference.

Instead of their cold and muddy project pens at school the boys used the big Bartush show barns. It was solid comfort for the animals, the members and the visitors.

The only drawback, according to Edgar Dyer, ag teacher, is that the weather did not permit bringing a number of the project animals. Hogs and sheep were all left at home. The same was true of some show cattle where loading conditions were especially bad.

Twenty six animals were shown, 9 fat steers and 17 stock calves, with Kevin Sicking's steer being judged the grand champion and Gerry Cash's the reserve champion.

The two champs were selected the best in a group of five which had been classified as blues by Tommy Davidson, ag teacher at Cooke County Junior College. The other three blue ribbon steers belonged to Carl Bayer, Allen Fleitman and Jim Endres. The remaining four steers were classified as reds, two being shown by Lonnie Hellman and one each by Charles Fisher and Roger Harrison.

Making up the group of 17 stock calves were 9 feeder calves, 5 dairy heifers and 3 beef heifers shown by eight students and classified as follows:

Claude Klement, 1 red and 1 yellow feeder calves; Ronnie Flusche, 1 red feeder calf; Jerry Eckart, 1 red and 1 yellow feeder calves; Terry Miller, 2 red feeder calves; Alan Miller, 1 red feeder calf; Steve Sicking, 1 blue dairy heifer; Leon Klement, 1 red and 3 yellow dairy heifers. Tim Hartman, 2 blue and 1 red beef heifers and 1 yellow feeder calf.

Along with their ribbon awards all the participating boys received cash awards from a special appropriation by the United Fund for 4-H and FFA boys of the county.

Next the steers of this project show will be entered in the 4-H and FFA Fat Stock Show Friday in Gainesville.

Workers Wanted For Taking Census

An appeal for census takers has been sent out by the Wichita Falls office of the Census Bureau.

Richard R. Newton, district manager, said that the census project needs people who can work three to five weeks in April and May visiting homes and interviewing. He said every effort will be made to assign workers to their own neighborhoods or those nearby.

Pay is on a piece rate basis intended to average \$2.00 an hour, however earnings will depend on diligence. Some workers will earn more than the average, others less, the director said.

To qualify for the job a person must be a US citizen, 18 or older, and must pass a written test demonstrating ability to understand and follow printed instructions and do simple arithmetic. Home telephone and a car are desired but not required.

3 Year Sentence Set for Burglary Of Medical Center

William Cuzick of Fort Worth was sentenced last Friday, March 13, to three years in the state penitentiary for the burglary of Muenster Medical Center in June, 1969.

In that burglary Doctors Martin Kralicke and Alfredo Antonetti lost a number of items, principally a silver trimmed saddle, a deer rifle, a movie camera, two other cameras, a stamp collection and a transistor radio.

Cuzick was arrested and charged for the crime on August 5 and has been held in the Cooke County jail until last Friday when he pleaded guilty before District Judge W. C. Boyd and received the three year sentence.

That is not the full extent of his sentence, however. Sheriff Bill Pratt said that Cuzick was on probation for burglary in Denton County and the probation has been revoked because of the second conviction. The Denton County sentence, believed to be three years, is added to the Cooke County sentence.

4-H, FFA to Have Livestock Show And Sale Friday

The big day for 4-H and FFA stock raisers of the county will arrive Friday, when they take their project animals to the fat stock show. The event is open to all members of the two organizations within Cooke County.

It will be held at the Gainesville fairgrounds with judging in the pony barn to begin at 1:30 p.m. Judges will be John Holland in the swine division, Hank Morgan for lambs and Ferrill Bratcher for steers.

Before judging, animals will be kept and groomed in the livestock building. Again after judging they will be in the livestock building where many will receive more grooming for the sale starting at 6:30.

Entries will be judged according to quality rather than competitively and will be classified as blue, red or white. After that the blues of each division will be judged competitively for the honors of grand champ and reserve champ.

The sale, beginning at 6:30 in the pony barn, ranks close to the show in member interest. It determines the monetary return on each project from combined commercial and premium sale. Each animal is auctioned first on the open market and the selling price becomes the set-in price for the premium auction. The premium buyer may keep the animal or pay the premium and allow the animal to go back to original buyer.

A special feature of the stock show, for the first time this year, is a livestock judging contest for students. They will judge animals entered in the show, and awards will be trophies to the top three teams and ribbons to the three high individuals. Entries for the Muenster FFA chapter are Tim Hartman, John Schneider, Mike Jaska and John Monday.

There will also be a special feature following the show. Carcasses of the show steers slaughtered in Gainesville will be entered in a carcass show Monday night, the 23rd, at the Gainesville Livestock Auction.

"Drive Friendly" Slogan Adopted in Governor's Traffic Safety Program

Governor Preston Smith is continuing an all out effort on traffic safety with use of "Drive Friendly" to make an impact on Texas drivers. "Drive Friendly" was officially introduced by the Governor March 9 in Austin.

"I am deeply concerned over the ever increasing trend of death, injury and economic losses on our streets and highways from traffic crashes and I intend to apply all the influence and prestige of the Governor's Office to do something about it," he said in Austin today at an official introduction of "Drive Friendly".

"Texas now, for the first time, has a coordinated traffic safety program aimed at one target - the citizens of this State who operate motor vehicles. This program has but one objective - to keep Texans from killing and maiming themselves and each other at a rate which staggers the imagination," he continued.

"1969 witnessed an all time high of over 3,500 dead citizens, 250,000 injured at a cost approaching one billion dollars. The most distressing part of this is the tragedy and heartbreak which resulted, but an equally disturbing aspect of this record is the fact that nearly half of these cases involved a drinking driver.

"I am convinced Texas citizens can do something about this, because I have utmost faith in the people of this State. So, I am appealing to every motorist to follow what "Drive Friendly" means.

"Drive Friendly" simply means:

Operating your vehicle as a responsible citizen.

Obeying all traffic laws.

Respecting state and local police officers who patrol streets and highways for our benefit.

Being generous with your right of way. If in doubt, give it to the other driver. It's not worth dying over.

Keeping your vehicle in good operating condition.

Not driving when in an unfit condition - particularly while drinking.

"I strongly urge all news media, private employers, local governments, civic clubs, women's groups and all other community organizations to get behind "Drive Friendly", and I appeal to all law enforcement agencies and traffic courts to be as strict and firm as the law allows to convince errant drivers that "Drive Friendly" has a real meaning.

"If "Drive Friendly" is seen and heard enough around this state, I believe an impact can be made and these needless tragedies will not strike the homes and citizens of Texas in such appalling proportions", the Governor concluded.

Over 400,000 "Drive Friendly" dashboard, window and bumper stickers are already in use in Texas. They are used on state vehicles, driver education cars and school buses. SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS



OUR SOIL ★ OUR STRENGTH
 By Eual Davis
 Livestock raisers who are considering pasture and range seeding this spring should consider Ermelo lovegrass, suggests Dr. C. L. Lundell, Director of Texas Research Foundation at Renner.

Ranchers have been telling about expanding uses of the grass this year, Dr. Lundell says. They're cutting winter hay bills way down grazing it during the winter months.

Ermelo lovegrass can be called a double-duty forage. It can be grazed early in the spring and in the fall, or fall growth can be retained for winter grazing. Ermelo greens up early, and normally furnishes grazing four to six weeks earlier than other warm-season species, including Coastal Bermuda grass, says the director. Under good soil fertility conditions, beef yields have surpassed 500 pounds an acre at Renner.

Grazing can begin in late-March or April. Winter maintenance of beef cattle on Ermelo reduces the necessity for hay making and hay feeding, he explained. The fall growth of forage cures well when left in the field, normally carrying some green growth into the winter months. Cattlemen can plan for a virtual "hayless" winter when Ermelo is established.

The best planting time is about April 15. Use two pounds per acre when seeding in rows and three pounds when broadcast. Seed should not be planted more than one-half inch deep in a well prepared seedbed. Take care not to exceed the recommended depth, he advised. The soil should be firmed with a packer or roller prior to planting.

Grain sorghum can turn into extra profit about as efficiently as any major crop a farmer grows today. Renner scientists are recommending 60 to 100 pounds of nitrogen plus phosphorous on milo in 1970.

Several factors support the use of high rates of fertilizer on grain sorghums this year, says Dr. C. L. Lundell, Director of research at Renner. One factor is the favorable market outlook for grain with exploding feedlot capacity in Texas, Dr. Lundell points out. Sorghum grain is in demand as never before.

Another factor is the abundant moisture available as planting time approaches. A third reason for stepping up plant food usage is the generally lower unit-cost for fertilizer. We suggest that farmers use from 60 to 100 pounds of nitrogen and 40 to 50 pounds of phosphorous to the acre.

Renner research continues to show that six pounds is the ideal seeding rate for either single or double-row plantings. Broadcast seedings should not exceed eight pounds per acre.

Planting date varies from around March 1 in the southern blacklands to April 1 in counties along the Red River. Plant early for your region and seed locally-adapted hybrids, the director advises.
