ROCKSPRINGS, Texas, April 13.-Improvised morgues and emergency hospitals today held 62 dead and 170 wounded, victims of an insane snout of horror which whipped and twisted this isolated Southwest Texas county seat town into wreckage last night during the worst tornado in the section's history.

Twenty of the wounded are expected to die before night. Only 33 of the dead had been identified. Most of the others are Mexicans. Swollen streams and bad roads hampered efforts at relief measures already made difficult by Rocksprings' situation, 37 miles from the nearest railroad, a narrow gauge lumber affair, terminating at Campwood, where a theater has been turned into a hospital.

### WASHINGTON TUBBS II SOLDIER PRESIDENT OF PORTUGAL PREFERS BARRACKS TO PALACE

### (Associated Press Correspondent) ISBON, Portugal.—(AP)—The most

L prominent personality in Portu-gal today, President Oscar Carmona, was almost unknown a years ago. Fate lifted him from the obscurity of a remote military post to the lime light of the presidency within a few onths

About a year ago, when he played a prominent part in the courtmar-tial of the officers implicated in an ansuccessful military rising, he turn-ed the scale in their favor in spite of the influence of the political parof the influence of the political par-ties then governing Porcugal. When the military movement which broke out in May was in preparation he was offered the supreine command of the troops on the south of Por-tugal. After occupying the post of min-lister of war and later that of pres-ident of the council in the new mil-itary government, he was proclaim-

itary government, he was proclaim-cd president of the republic by the "junta." This junta, or military council, formed of commanding offi-cers of the various army corps, is really the guiding force in the dic-tatorship.

President Carmona, who is of a retiring nature, was reluctant to ac-cept the position and refuses to accept the position and refuses to ac-cept anything beyond his general's pay, nor will he inhabit the palace of Belem, where all his predecessors have lived. Instead he occupies bare, comfortless quarters with his wife in the Second Cavalary barracks, in-stalled in a dependency of an old royal palace.




