Who's wearing the mask in this biggest robbery in history? That question is asked in a Warner and Swasey advertising classic, which goes on to explain how inflation robs us as surely as any hijacker.

"A million dollar robbery rightly stirs public wrath and the demand the money be found and the culprits punished. Yet Americans with savings in banks and in life insurance were robbed of 60 BILLION dollars last year because of inflation — 60 billion dollars which does no one any good, which can never assure independence for the old people who saved it, 60 billion which can never build homes for young people, nor gifts for schools and hospitals — 60 evaporated BILLIONS.

"Who's to blame? All governments, Federal and local, who spend more than they take in; all agencies who waste your money on boondoggling and vote getting; all bureaus more interested in saving their jobs than in saving this country's solvency. AND EVERY AMERICAN who wants more than he's willing to produce and pay for.

"Instead of writing your government to GIVE you something, write them to SAVE it."

The word robbery in this article is well chosen. It applies just as surely as if a hold-up man had poked a gun in your ribs and taken your personal share of that \$60 billion loss. It represents that much of your saving which you will never be able to use.

And bear in mind, we are referring here to just one year's loss. Now think how long inflation has been in effect and what you have lost during those many years. This explains why millions of old folks who worked hard for many years to provide for their retirement discovered they did not have enough to make ends meet. It explains why an insurance policy taken out twenty years ago does not provide the protection that was intended. It explains why a government savings bond at maturity has less buying value than the original investment had.

Furthermore, this explains why our government is straining under its present ridiculous welfare program. Repeated increases in social security benefits have been necessary because actual value of benefits has been repeatedly shrunk by inflation. More and bigger handouts became necessary because people could not live on what they had.

This monstrous injustice affects all of us. Those whose current income is geared to current expense are hurting less, but they too are losers where savings are concerned. It's ironic that thrift has always been considered a virtue that is due a definite reward, but we of the world's foremost economic nation have adopted an economic policy which penalizes thrift. It seems absurd. It seems incredible that smart men, the leaders of government, business and finance, would have permitted the robbery to get started, or that those now at the top aren't doing more to get it stopped.

Last week's horror story about conditions in a South Vietnam prison was another regrettable incident in sabotaging this country's war effort. The implication was plain, that South Vietnamese are beasts on whom we are wasting men and resources. It did not say that a few brutal prison officials are responsible for the torture, nor that our concern is for the millions of other natives we are trying to save from a similar fate if the reds take charge.

It was just another version of the old line which seeks to make our country look bad, which provides more material for communist propagandists to use against us.

It's similar to the indictment of our soldiers in the My Lai incident, in which far too little attention is given to the circumstances which could have caused our soldiers to become trigger happy. This column for one does not believe the story is so one sided nor that the victims were all innocent civilians.

Instead of that stuff there are lots of stories which deserve more emphasis, and which will help morale rather than wreck it.

## Building Notes

The Henry Pattersons, new residents who recently moved here from California, are about half finished on their new home on North Cedar Street. It will be a three bedroom house with bath and a half, attached garage, brick veneer, central heating and air conditioning.

## \$6475 Received For First Quarter Of City Sales Tax

The city of Muenster has received \$6,475.06 from the State Treasurer, the amount realized in its one per cent sales tax for the first quarter of this year.

The check is somewhat smaller than that for the last quarter of 1969, which amounted to \$7,680 and reflected Christmas business and a tax on alcoholic drinks. However this is the second largest check since the sales tax started, a gain of almost \$1900 over the first quarter payment last year, which did not include a tax for alcoholic drinks. That amount was \$4,576.

## Bro. Thomas Sees European Shrines And Passion Play

His first stop with the group of 41 pilgrims was at Lisbon, Portugal to visit the birthplace of St. Anthony, monasteries and churches. Next was Fatima to tour the village and places associated with the lives of the three children to whom the Blessed Virgin appeared in 1917.

Two days in Madrid were filled with tours of religious and historic places, museums and castles. At Madrid Brother Thomas left the group for Oberammergau to have more time there while the rest visited Rome where he had already spent considerable time on a previous tour.

Next was Munich with sight-seeing including the 500 year old Frauenkirche, Cathedral of Our Lady, New Townhall, Glockenspiel and Residential Palace and Radio Free Europe.

At Lisieux, France, it was the shrine of the Little Flower, the Carmelite convent, the basilica, the home of the Martin family and other places connected with the life of St. Therese.

Three days in Paris gave time to visit all the places of tourist interest, religious, civic and historic highlighted by the Shrine of the Miraculous Medal where the Blessed Mother appeared to St. Catherine Labourer. Viewing her incorrupt body, the Eiffel tower, Napoleon's Tomb, Arch of Triumph, Opera House, Luxembourg Gardens and Louvre. Brother Thomas saw the opera Carmen and a ballet at the Opera House. ## Katy Tells How It Will Dispose of Right of Way

The method of disposition of the Missouri, Kansas and Texas railroad right of way between Whitesboro and Wichita Falls, after the company completes its current salvage operation, was revealed last week by J. L. Boots, land and tax commissioner of MK&T.

The salvage crew, headquartered at Nocona, is now in the process of picking up ties and other salvage items from the line which was abandoned early this year. When that job is finished, according to Boots, the disposition of the right of way will be as follows:

"(1) It is our policy on dis-

positions of abandoned rights of way to afford the abutting owner of land first choice or refusal to purchase right of way in which we hold fee title, at an agreed consideration. Conveyances will be made by Quitclaim Deed with mineral rights reserved.

(2) Portions of right of way acquired by Easement, upon abandonment and removal of the track, in most instances revert to the adjacent owner. Where the abutting property owner has land on one side of the right of way only, he would acquire to the center line of the right of way which is normally 100 feet in width. If land is owned on both sides, he would acquire the entire width to the extent of his ownership. Upon request from parties owning property adjacent to right of way acquired by Easement, the railroad will issue a Quitclaim Deed to Easement property a charge of \$100.00 is made."

Inquiries of parties interested in acquiring the right of way should be directed to the Land and Tax Department Office, 701 Commerce Street, Dallas 75202. No deeds will be issued until the tracks have been removed.

## Muenster Butane Builds Addition

An addition which will enlarge the appliance department of Muenster Butane Co. Inc., by 1400 square feet got under way last week. It is being built in front of the present building, the front wall of which will be removed so that most of the new area can become part of an enlarged display room.

A special feature will be a concrete wall erected in sections. It will have a surface of brown pebbles and the seams joining the sections will be painted brown. It will be used on the three sides except some 20 feet of glass door and plate glass front and a double size service door at the east.

Preparation for pouring the wall sections was in progress Monday with construction of angle iron forms criss-crossed with re-inforcing iron. A layer of pebbles was to be spread on the floor inside the forms and the concrete to be poured over it, the bottom of that slab to become the outside of the wall. The concrete is made of a special light aggregate which has an insulating quality. The outside edge of each section will be the angle iron form which will be attached by welding to the adjoining section.

The expansion includes a number of other changes. Gasoline tanks are removed from the front. Butane and propane tanks will be moved from the west side and the space used for shrubbery and parking area. Space in front of the building will be more parking area. Butane and propane tanks will be moved to the now vacant space east of the building.

Changes inside, besides more display space, include separate service facilities for TV and other appliances and change of location for office, parts department, and warehouse.

Farm Accidents Take Heavy Toll

Accidental deaths in agriculture are second only to those of the construction industry, according to recent statistics. This is a tragic record for agriculture. President Nixon has designated the week of July 19, 1970, as National Farm Safety Week.

He has asked "all farm families, and every person and group allied with agriculture, to make every effort to reduce the number of accidents which occur at work, in homes, at recreation, and on the roadways." We owe it to ourselves to work and live safely. And, as employees of the Soil Conservation Service, each of us has an obligation to carry the

message of accident prevention and safety to others, particularly to those in the rural community, with whom we are associated in our daily work. We urge everyone to work toward the goals of National Farm Safety Week throughout the year.

A Fallacy Of Our Time

Too many American workers are living in a dream world. They believe that an honest day's work has become a sucker proposition. They think they "have it made."

On March 13, Time Magazine published an article that is little short of amazing, entitled "America The Inefficient." It is a remarkable wrap-up of the situation.

If it wasn't so dreadful it would be funny. The auto pair man cheats both of them, the plumber cheats the auto mechanic; the television repair man cheats both of them, and is cheated in return.

There is also trouble in factories. According to James Roche, Chairman of General Motors, absenteeism doubled in the last ten years, hurting production quality so badly that some GM output "is worse than no output at all."

Virgil Boyd, President of Chrysler, said, "One of the biggest problems is Monday morning absenteeism — the fellow who works two weeks and decides to take a long weekend." Time continues; "Detroit's worst lemons are usually found among cars built on Monday because they are often put together by inexperienced substitute workers and veterans nursing hangovers."

What has gone wrong? Too much money? Too much job security? Or something else? That something else was suggested by a distinguished Harvard Business School professor, Abraham Zaleznik, when he said, "People are no longer turned on by the Protestant Ethic (that hard work is a virtue for its own sake). This principle appears to have been replaced by the "Mediterranean Spirit," a spreading belief that men should work no more than they must.

Lane Kirkland, Secretary-Treasurer of the AFL-CIO, is quoted: "There has been a steady and consistent reduction in the commitment of men to work as a way of life. That movement has accelerated in recent times. The expansion of paid leisure time will continue and there may well be a greater tendency to choose leisure over additions to income."

In an effort to offset poor work, management frequently tightens up in discipline. As Time puts it, "In offices, executives frequently mistakes the appearance of efficiency for its reality." Eric Larrabee, a college administrator, points out that "the informal office that serves as a social circle looks sloppy but is usually quite efficient." Its employees, he reasons, "develop a community spirit, learn one another's strengths and weaknesses," and "adapt a kind of rhythm that enables them to produce more quickly with a minimum of fuss."

The trouble with rigid discipline is that it destroys people's natural desire to be recognized as respected individuals and to figure out the work methods best suited to

them. When people get their backs up, they can actually use the rigid rules to sabotage efficiency. The result of the "great American goofoff" is that American productivity, prices and product quality have become poor compared to hard-working nations such as Japan and Germany who are making a determined bid for our markets.

Japan, for example, has since 1963, increased its gross national product from \$68-billion to about \$200 billion. If we permitted it, the Japanese textile industry could provide the entire American market. They make practically all the barbed wire used in the United States. By 1975 they could become the world's largest steelmaker. They are now the third largest producers of automobiles.

This list could go on and on, and it should be a reminder that economic competition is economic warfare. Every nation wants the markets of other nations because markets mean jobs, and jobs mean income.

America would not be the first great nation to become non-great because its people lost their will to work because of easy prosperity. Add to this our loss of pride in the work we do, and you have the makings of crisis and hardship.

The answer is discouragingly simple. It lies in the conscience of millions of us Americans who know we are doing wrong, but "don't care."

Perhaps crisis and hardship are the only things that will jolt us into reality, and by that time the road back might be a rocky one.

"A dramatic example of the difference between private operated railroads and those run by the government is shown in the United States' experience in World War I and World War II," observes the Michigan Railroads Association. "The railroads were taken over by the government in World War I. Their losses totaled \$2,000,000 A DAY. And no taxes were paid. In the second big conflict the railroads paid \$4,000,000 A DAY in taxes. That is a difference of \$2,190,000 a year without even considering the amount of taxes lost in World War I."

**Contour Gardening Leaflet Available**

District Conservationist Eual Davis of the Muenster SCS office, said the 8-fold leaflet, titled "Gardening on the Contour," outlines ways to control erosion in a backyard garden. It tells, for example, how rows can be laid out on the contour using a carpenter's level mounted on a 2 by 4. The leaflet also explains how rainwater which drains from a neighbor's property might be diverted away from your garden.

"Some of our gardeners in Cooke and Montague counties are excellent conservationists," Davis said. "Many use mulches on the soil surface to help reduce erosion and to improve soil fertility similar to the way conservation farmers use crop residues. Preventing erosion in a garden is just as important to a gardener as it is to any other land user," the conservationist pointed out.

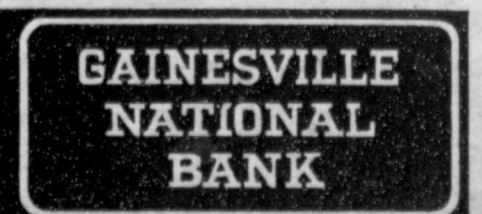

**27 Cooke County Families Receive \$307,250 in FHA Loans in 1969**

Families in Cooke County borrowed \$307,250.00 from the Farmers Home Administration t o build and improve homes during calendar 1969, the Federal agency's county supervisor, John D. Cunningham, reported.

"These funds, advanced under the Farmers Home Administration rural housing program, provided better and more comfortable homes for more than 27 Cooke County families," Cunningham said.

He quoted James V. Smith, National Administrator of the Farmers Home Administration, as reporting that more than 61,500 rural families across the nation participated in the rural housing program last year, borrowing a record \$587.9 million. More than 250,000 persons are living in better homes because of the program.

"We are attempting to keep housing credit flowing into our small towns despite the tight money situation and the national general housing construction slump," FHA County Supervisor Cunningham said. "At the same time, we are encouraging builders and developers to step up their efforts to invest in rural America by increasing the volume of rural home completions."

Mr. Cunningham noted that local banks and lending institutions participate in providing loan funds which are insured by his agency. He added that nationally more than 98 percent of individual family rural housing loan funds were provided by private investors.

"An important fringe benefit to rural America," Cunningham said, is that the rural housing loan program is creating more than 35,000 man-

years of employment, contributing directly to the income of rural people."

Farmers Home Administration housing loans are made only to applicants unable to obtain credit from other sources, and who live in communities of not more than 5,500 population. The Cooke County office, located in the Post Office Building, in Gainesville, Texas is one of 1,700 offices serving the 3,000 counties of rural America.





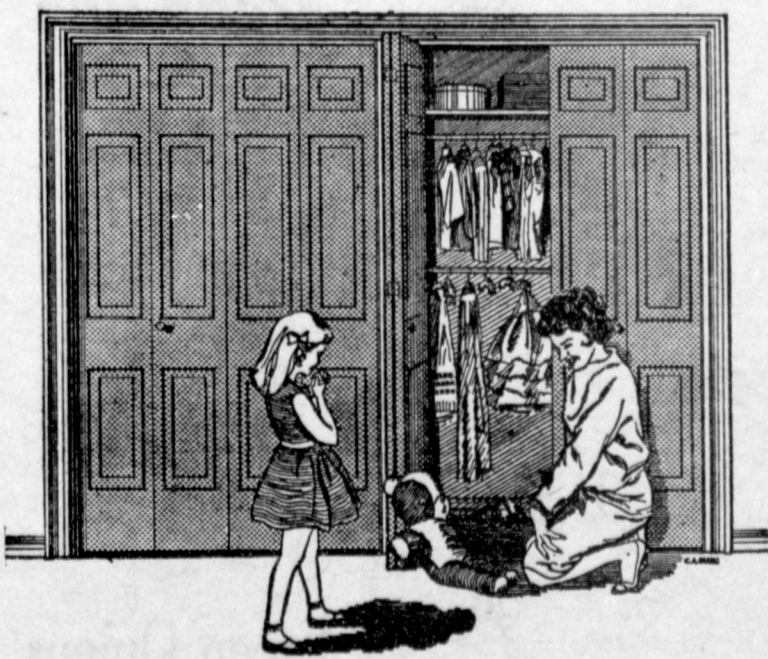
