Drugs in Our Community

Much has been printed about the drug abuse problem in Texas. It is felt by many experts that to combat this problem a program of Drug Education should be placed in the school curriculum. There are many ideas as to how this should be done. Each school is faced with a unique problem, and the schools of Muenster are no exception.

On October 12 through 15, 1970, Mr. James C. Snyder, a consultant in Drug Education for Region XI of the Texas Education Agency, was in charge of a 4-day workshop at the Birdville Coliseum in Haltom City. Region XI consists of the following counties: Somervell, Erath, Hood, Johnson, Palo Pinto, Parker, Tarrant, Wise, Denton, and Cooke. The registered participants at this 4-day workshop numbered 405, and a representative from each of our schools was present for each session.

To assist the local schools, Mr. Snyder has been invited to Muenster on Tuesday, November 17, by Sacred Heart and Muenster Public Schools for an all-day conference. The schedule for the day will be:



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
