With refreshing candor, Schickel describes the motion picture as "loathsome," "repellent," and "morally disgusting.

With "perhaps two of its 106 minutes . . . given over to plot," writes Mr. Schickel, "it is the most disgusting, the most completely worthless film I have seen since I began reviewing."






