Refreshments will be served.


Girl Scouts to register Monday night at the hut

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Curtis Shelburne

Shelburne finalist for Texas clergy award

Curtis Shelburne, a Muleshoe minister and MISD School Board member, has been nominated as Texas Rural Minister of the Year.

Shelburne, who is pastor of the Church of Christ at 16th Street and Avenue D, is among 26 ministers nominated for the award.

It will be presented at the Town

and Country Church Conference Oct 2-3 on the campus of Texas A&M University.

He is serving his eighth year and third term as a member of the school board and will be on his way back from the school board convention in Houston when the recipient of the award is announced.

The program is sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the pub-

lishers of Progressive Farmer.

It provides an opportunity for others to learn about the outstanding work done by ministers in small towns and rural communities.

Shelburne was nominated for the award by John Gulley and Pat Moore of Muleshoe.

To be eligible, a minister must have spent at least two years serving a congregation in a rural community with a

population of 10,000 or less.

Last Easter marked Shelburne's 10th year at his church in Muleshoe, where he is pastor, youth minister and music minister. "I am the staff," Shelburne said. "I get to wear all the hats."

Ministers nominated for the award are evaluated on how they have encouraged congre-



Pirates steamroll Muleshoe, 41-21

Randy Adair thinks of his team as an adopted family.

And like any parent, he suffers as he watches his "kids" go through growing pains.

Friday night, he was near tears after watching Lubbock Cooper run over and through his young defense and spoil Muleshoe's homecoming by beating the Mules 41-21 before a large crowd at Benny Douglass Stadium.

The loss drops Muleshoe to 0-3.

"I'm proud of the kids, not in the manner in which we played, but the intangible things," Adair said. "They showed that they're genuinely concerned about who their teammates are, who their coaches are, and about the future of the program."

"We going to work hard and find a way to win. We're not going to go belly-up or roll over. We're going to make better decisions, play better and we are going to win," said Adair as he started to get some of his energy back after the emotionally draining loss.

Lubbock Cooper (2-1) took the game to Muleshoe, rushing for 397 yards against a defense that starts five sophomores.

Brice McCasland rushed for

213 yards and two touchdowns, including an 84-yard run on the first play from scrimmage to give the Pirates a 6-0 lead. Manuel DeLaCruz added 102 yards and two touchdowns.

"We didn't attack," Adair said. "Instead of being aggressive, we were taking on the blocks at our positions instead of in the hole."

Throw in five turnovers and tackling in the secondary that looked more like trying to catch a greased pig, and it's surprising that the Mules were in the game until backup running back Eric Morrison scored on a 18-yard run with a little more than two minutes left.

Leading 14-7 at the half, the Pirates scored twice in the first 4 1/2 minutes to take a 28-7 lead.

DeLaCruz cover 19 yards in two rushes for the first score after the second of three interceptions by linebacker Jason Gonzalez. Then following a Muleshoe punt and a 17-yard return that gave Lubbock Cooper the ball near midfield, McCasland scampered 47 yards through the right side of the Mule defense.

But Muleshoe, as they did all game, responded.

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Temps slow cotton crop; freeze avoided — for now

Thursday was a good night for a bonfire. The expected cold snap materialized, sending temperatures down to 37 degrees in town, according to R.G. Bennett, Muleshoe's National Weather Service reporter.

Bennett said his records showed the high for the previous 24 hours was 42 in Muleshoe.

But Bailey County Extension Agent Curtis Preston said the low in the country outside Muleshoe was reported at 35 degrees Thursday night.

He said cotton farmers in the area may suffer a setback, depending on the stage of their crops, because of the cold snap that brought snow to Dalhart and sleet to Muleshoe.

At such low temperatures, photosynthesis can't take place to "feed the bolls," he explained. But he said every field is different, containing either formed, developing or immature bolls.

"The immature bolls will open up and make low grade, low "mic" cotton. (A mic is a measurement of fiber thickness.) Fiber thickness is needed for strength," he said.

So the result of Thursday night's possible damage to the cotton crops has yet to be assessed, Preston said.

When asked about the difference between rural and city temperatures, Preston said temperatures in town often are slightly higher than in the country because the buildings, pavement and concrete retain some of the day's heat.

Stegall tops Power Points grid contest



The statewide winner was Juan Villarreal, Sr. of Seguin, who was perfect with 136



Jerrell Otwell scored two touchdowns to lead the Watson Junior High School seventh graders to a 20-6 win over Lubbock Cooper Thursday in its season opener.

Otwell scored on from 10 yards out on a sweep around the right end in the second quarter and added a 12-yard run in the third quarter to give the Mules a 20-0 lead.

Fullback Darrell Lewis rambled 36 yards through the

heart of the Cooper defense for a touchdown in the first quarter and also ran for the two-point conversion.

The defense, led by Manuel Flores, Raymond Toscano, Tyler Black and Stephen Woodard, held Lubbock Cooper scoreless until late in the fourth quarter.

WOLFFORTH—Despite missing two of its top five runners, the Muleshoe High School girls' cross country team tied for sixth here last Saturday in a meet featuring several 4A and 5A teams.

Lubbock Coronado won the 11-team meet with 48 points. Muleshoe, the top finisher among 3A or smaller teams, scored 128 points. Fellow District 2-3A member Shallowater was eighth with 132 points.

the kickoff 46 yards to the Pirates' 46. Gonzales capped the five-play driving by finding Daniel Garbarino all alone in the corner of the end zone for a three-yard touchdown pass to make it 28-14 with five minutes left in the third quarter. Gonzales split the middle of Pirate defense for a 40-yard gain to the three.

Muleshoe got the ball back again inside its 20 at the start of

the fourth quarter, but Lubbock Cooper's Jason Gonzalez intercepted Alfredo Gonzales' errant pass and returned it 28 yards for a touchdown.

"It seemed like every time they were about to turn it around, we'd come up with a big play," Pirate head coach Bill Pitts said.

"We just went back to the basics," said Pitts about the Pirates loss to District 2-3A

member Shallowater 29-6 last week. "We weren't ready to play and I'll take the blame for that. But tonight, the offensive line really got after them."

Jake Adair, whose one-yard run gave Muleshoe a 7-6 lead in the first quarter, rushed for 140 yards. The senior tailback added a 17-yard touchdown run in the fourth quarter as Muleshoe rushed for 253 yards.

But Gonzales, hurried all

night by a blitzing Pirate defense, was 6-of-21 for 53 yards and was intercepted four times.

"We wanted them to run the football," Pitts said. "If they were going to beat us, they were going to beat us throwing the ball. We tried to put pressure on (Gonzales) and not let him sit back there and pick us apart."

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
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Copley, Hurd wed in ceremony in Lubbock


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MHS students profile system's new teachers



He attended the University of Iowa and received his bachelor of arts in English literature.


He taught in the military for six years, then decided to move to Muleshoe because of a job offer and to "experience small town life."

be tamer because of his family—not so willing to take chances.







Cotton growers get glimpse into future

Bailey County cotton growers will have a chance Sept. 26 to see firsthand the latest cotton varieties produced using traditional breeding and biotechnology.

The new cotton varieties will be displayed at a Cotton Variety and Biotechnology Field Day at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center.

"Cotton growers are at the start of the most exciting changes in farming since the development of the mechanical harvester," said Kater Hake, cotton agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension service at Lubbock.

Bailey County Extension Agent Curtis Preston said, "The

introduction of biotechnology to farming will revolutionize our production system in ways we can't yet imagine."

Even the biotechnology traits that will be available to cotton producers over the next two years—herbicide tolerance and worm tolerance—will offer tremendous benefits, the county agent said.

The field day will begin with registration at 8:30 a.m. and continue until noon.

Local experts on cotton biotechnology from Texas A&M and the USDA Plant Stress Laboratory will provide an update on current and upcoming varieties developed through both traditional breeding and biotechnology.
