Muenster is a member of the Red River Red Cross which is a part of the nation wide Red Cross system, with an extension of the banking system allowing transfer from one center to another as the need demands.

Forty five member communities are included in the Wichita Falls center. The quota of each is determined by its estimated need, and frequency of bloodmobile visits is scheduled accordingly. Some larger communities have collections every month. Smaller ones have one or two collections a year. Muenster's fees, which did not need to quota is 100 units a year and two collections are scheduled. Experience of the first six months bears out the estimate almost exactly. Fifty one units have been used.

New Regulation on Meat Inspection Effective July 1

Beginning July 1 a new state regulation requiring inspection of animals before slaughtering and of carcasses after slaughtering will become effective here.

The only business concerned is Fisher's Meat Market, however, according to J. Fisher, a number of their customers as well as themselves will have to make adjustments.

Fisher's can no longer slaughter at their convenience. They'll have to go on schedule as agreed with the state inspector who will be on hand to examine the live animals and later the carcasses. The same schedule applies to customers who bring their animals for slaughter. Fisher's will announce the schedule as soon as it is set up.

Health Department Warns of Hazards In Water Sports

The season of fishing and boating enthusiasm is now in full swing. But those enjoyable occasions out at the lake or stream could turn into catastrophe unless a few simple rules are followed. The Texas weed and brush control very State Department of Health reminds you that a safe summer of excitement and fun is in your hands.

All fishermen and novices alike - should know how to swim, should know basic first aid, and have a first aid kit with them. Since fish hooks sometimes "catch' anglers as well as fish, carry needlenose pliers, wire cutters, and pocket knife in your tackle box. Always keep hooks in covered containers. Always look before casting, and make certain you have room to do so without hooking someone else. Use an overhead cast when in a boat with others. It's much safer to fish with a companion, but when fishing alone, always leave word where you will be and when you plan to return. Wear thick soled boots in densely wooded or marshy areas. Do not wear waders while in a boat. Wade cautiously to avoid slipping on unseen rocks or stepping suddenly into deep water. Stay in open areas. Avoid swimmers, water skiers, and skin and scuba divers. Learn how to hold a fish pro-
