Action begins both mornings at 9 o'clock and ends with checking in the day's catch at 6 p.m. Catches of the two days are combined to determine each hunter's record.

Prizes consist of a trophy and \$25 in cash for the largest snake, a trophy and \$25 for the most snakes and a trophy only for the smallest snake. Largest scheid announced this week and smallest snakes are determined by length, and the record for the most snakes will be determined by weight.

Standard precautions are because of the hazard of possible ricochets in the rocks. Jaycees will be in circulation to give whatever help is needed and will also be in contact with headquarters by radio or mobile phone. And they'll have snake bite kits just in case.

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



March 31 is Last Chance to Enroll In Medicare

Most people 65 and over have ong since signed up for the doctor bill insurance part of Medicare. But Gus Jones, social security district manager, warns that for some who have not, March 31 of this year is the final deadline.

"If you were born after October 1, 1902, but before October 2, 1903," Jones says, "this is your very last chance to get this valuable protection. Also, if you were born in the last three months of 1903, or in 1904, or 1905, and missed an earlier opportunity to enroll, this general enrollment period s open to you.'

Jones explained that every person reaching age 65 can sign up for the medical insurance part of Medicare, which is paid for by a monthly premium, during a period starting three months before his birthday month and ending three months after that birthday churches and the hill of month. 

Many people have been aware that up to now. part of the meat marketed in Texas was not inspected at all. Federal law required certification only if meat was moved across state lines; and local packers with local markets were not subject to any kind of inspection they did not request.

Federal inspection has an interesting sidelight. Many of have to either remodel their facilities or face closure. Dr. Texas relatives. Uvacek estimates that many small meat packers are not even aware of the law and will continue to operate until they are inspected by federal employees and given the choice of improving their plants or going out of business. Oftentimes, these small plants do not have enough business to make remodeling possible; and will probably be closed permanently. 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
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
