Congratulations are in order to the community's boys and girls who will receive their high school diplomas this week. Graduation is a definite achievement. It signifies the completion of specified academic work, the attainment of knowledge which will help in making a living and assuming a place of responsibility in society. It marks an important stage in the process of growing up.

There's a good reason why the ceremony of graduation is customarily called commencement. As the word implies, it is really the beginning of adult life. It is a time of decision, when most young people start preparing for the careers they expect to follow through life.

Nowadays, thanks to opportunities our society offers to rich and poor alike, this means going to college to qualify for more useful and rewarding positions. The records show that the additional time spent in study is a good investment, furthermore that the returns are usually better for those who make better use of their time.

Despite the general rule, however, it is also a fact that many people are successful without going to college. Many careers do not demand a degree. Youngsters who have trouble with academic work have the satisfaction of knowing that the way to a good life is still open to them. Nevertheless, one ingredient cannot be overlooked. In study or on the job, it takes work to get along. Dedication to duty is the best assurance of happiness regardless of what circumstances happen to help or hinder one's effort.

While setting sights on personal careers and achievements, our graduates also have a few other important points to ponder. Their growth so far has been in a complex and confused world. Their continued growth will encounter a great deal more complexity and confusion. Their future depends primarily on their success in overcoming those problems so as to restore old time qualities like order, justice and thrift.

The very first requirement is belief in the wisdom and goodness of Almighty God. He gave us a magnificent world to live in, as testified by the sophisticated discoveries of science and the wonderful orderly facts of nature which have been evident to observant people for thousands of years. Present problems are not His fault but the doings of people. Those problems can be solved only by observing His rules in our relation with each other and natural environment.

As regards human behavior, we have to get back to the ten commandments — respect for God and for other human beings. It's as simple as that. One can hardly imagine a social problem which can not be cleared up by the right attitude. Morality, race relations, labor relations, poverty, international troubles can all be solved by doing to others as we would have them do to us.

Moreover, reform is a two way undertaking. People who claim that society owes them a better deal should understand that they need to cooperate. Both sides have to try in order to stop racism. The poor have to help themselves while they are being helped. Slum clearance must be accompanied by stopping the neglect and vandalism which create slums — along with some clean-up and fix-up by the persons concerned. Pollution, which threatens human existence, calls for huge projects but also for a general clean-up of people's habits. We'd be well on our way toward improving the world if the people demanding reforms would first reform themselves.

Another point to appreciate is that our forefathers founded the best government of all history. No other nation has matched us in freedom, opportunity, justice and living standard. The faults that have developed are the result of departure from original principles. The way to restore our old blessings is to eliminate the faults, not to tear down the principles, as loud mouth revolutionaries are preaching. Smart people do not burn buildings to get rid of rats.

Dan Hamric is the pool manager with David Fette and Janell Stoffels as his assistants. Admission charges again are 40 cents and 20 cents. The pool will be open every day except Monday and the hours are 2 to 9 p.m.

The Red Cross swimming classes for beginners and intermediates is on the program again. Hamric expects them to begin early in July, when there is less chill in the early morning air.

Current work to prepare for the opening includes new paint for the pool's bottom, paint on the building, new benches, cleaning, repairing and painting the filter.

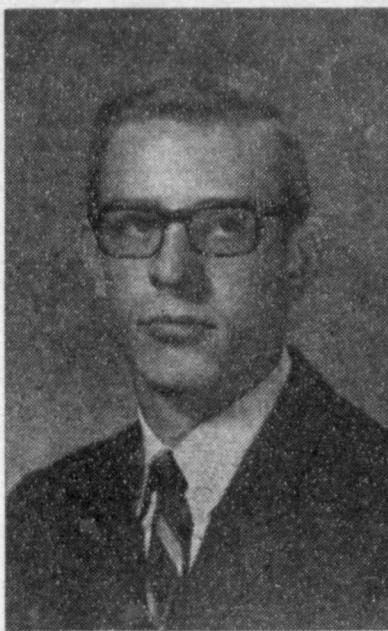
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Optimists Select John Felderhoff Boy of the Month

Antonettis Get US Citizenship

Dr. and Mrs. Alfredo Antonetti and Alfredo Jr. are citizens of the United States. They received the honor in naturalization ceremonies Monday in the federal court in Tyler.

The Antonettis have been looking forward to the occasion since they came to this country seven years ago to escape the communist rule of Castro in their native Cuba. Before Castro took over, Dr. Antonetti along with his father and brother owned and operated a large hospital in Havana.

The Antonettis established their permanent residence in this country in 1964 and became eligible to apply for citizenship five years after that. The time arrived in October last year. They filed their application in October, took a citizenship test in January and attended the first ceremony after being notified that they passed the test. They came to Muenster in March 1968.

Dr. and Mrs. Alfredo Antonetti have three sons. Alfredo Jr., a medical student at Oklahoma City was naturalized along with his parents. His wife and child were with him at the ceremony. Roberto, a student at Midwestern and Emilio, at a private school in Miami, are under age for naturalization and will have to wait.

Eighteen persons were in the group receiving citizenship. After the ceremony the Tyler chapter of Daughters of the American Revolution served refreshments to all and presented each with a flag and a souvenir calendar featuring important dates in the country's history.

Open House Shows Equipment in SH Weight Program

Coach Tom Joy and his Sacred Heart Tigers showed and demonstrated their recently completed weight program equipment to about 150 visitors Tuesday night.

The facility, located in the old class building north of the Sister's home, consists of ten types of muscle building equipment. There are three units of each type providing exercises for 30 athletes at a time. Each type is specialized for exercising specific muscles, especially the back, chest, arms, knees and thighs.

An over-all special feature of the program is safety. Every unit requiring the use of weight consists of framework on which the weights are loaded and secured. Weights cannot fall and cause injury. Coach Joy explained the purpose of each unit and the SH athletes demonstrated.
