Another disappointment in the reporting of news by this country's media comes out of Nicaragua where Marxist guerrillas are currently trying to overthrow the government of President Somoza. Papers over here have told that the country's national guard is using women and children as shields in its skirmishes with the rebel troops, also that the national guard has shot down children.

First reaction to the charge is that this kind of savagery is more typical of the reds than the legitimate government of Nicaragua. If however the statement can be reliably documented it most likely can be explained as a precaution against rebel treachery. It could be like some episodes reported in the Vietnam war when American soldiers were booby trapped by children loaded with explosives. Experience with communists for many years all over the world has shown that treachery invariably originates on their side. No matter what the media says, that's a good way to bet in the Nicaragua stories also.

According to an article by Reed Irvine in last week's Human Events, "it seems that the major media of the US has a knack for aiding Communist attacks on governments that are friendly to us. They did it in China in the late 1940s, in Cuba in the 1950s, in Vietnam, Cambodia and Laos in the 1970s. There is solid evidence that our news media played an important role in the triumph of communism in all of these countries."

"The pattern was remarkably similar in each case. The pro-American government was pictured as tyrannical and corrupt, unworthy of American support. The opposition was portrayed as honest, democratic and heroic. Their triumph would usher in a better life for most."

That was the kind of story told by the New York Times just before the Communist takeover of Cambodia. The big headline over the Phnom Penh release read: Indochina Without Americans. Life will be better for Most. More reliable publications, like Reader's Digest, have told us since that about two million Cambodian lives have been snuffed out and life for the survivors defies the average person's imagination.

The current media target is Nicaragua and its president, Anastasio Somoza, a graduate of West Point and a long time friend of the U.S. The country provided a base for the unfortunate Bay of Pigs invasion of Cuba in 1961, and offered troops to help U.S. in the Korean and Vietnam wars. It has consistently supported our positions in UN and international conferences. And now, since our giveaway of the Panama Canal, its friendship becomes all the more important because the country is the acceptable site of another canal in case it is needed. Any media aid toward turning this potential asset over to the Communists can be regarded as a grave disservice to the U.S. Still the campaign continues to oust Somoza and turn the country over to the Reds.

A typical case of bias was the publicity following the assassination of Pedro Chamorro, publisher of the country's largest newspaper and an outspoken political opponent of Somoza. The killers, promptly caught and jailed, admitted that they had been hired by a personal enemy of the publisher and there was no political involvement whatever. Nevertheless the biased media continues pointing the finger at Somoza and claim that most Nicaraguans feel that he was responsible. Solid evidence is ignored while unfounded accusation continues to circulate.

At the same time derogatory remarks continue about Somoza, being the most notorious strong man of Latin America but say nothing about the dictators Castro of Cuba and Torrijos of Panama. Those people happen to have seized power the Communist way whereas Somoza was duly elected.

Still another detail overlooked in the biased reporting is the fact that the principal publication, hostile to the president, was allowed to continue in business whereas a dictator of the type Somoza was accused of being would

MHS Rolls Over Era 37-6

Muenster High Hornets made good use of their muscle advantage and the speed of fleet footed Randy Serna Friday night to subdue Era's spunky Hornets 37-6 before a delighted MHS homecoming crowd.

Another big factor was the team's best passing record to date: six completions out of seven tries by David Felderhoff for a total of 187 yards.

In the rushing department Serna accounted for 228 of Muenster's 295 yards and Mike Nash was the big asset to his team with 137 out of the total 187 yards on the ground.

Muenster set the trend on its first possession by moving 80 yards and also overcoming a 5 yard penalty. They used 13 plays of which Serna carried nine times and the scoring play was a quarterback sneak by David Felderhoff as the clock read 6:29.

Era responded with gains of 29 before punting from midfield and MHS started its second drive with 89 yards to go. Serna was the workhorse again capping his job with a 41 yard scoring romp.

For the second time, the try for extra point failed. In fact, the Hornets scored the bonus point only once out of six opportunities. They missed on three kicks and two passes.

After Muenster's second TD, Era made its only score on the biggest play of the night. Nash faked a handoff, around left end and headed goalward. He was well on his way for a 91 yard sprint before the defense saw what was happening. The

Stinson was proud of the Hornets in last week's game, especially their passing which they put together for the first time this season. And again offense and defense did an over all good job, and Randy Serna's running was sensational.

Tigers to Tangle With Panthers at Saint Jo Friday

Still looking for their first victory, Sacred Heart's Tigers are getting set this week for a big tussle with their long time rivals of Saint Jo.

As seen by Coach Eddie Stock the assignment looks as a big one. The Tigers' first concern is breaking the jinx that has kept them from putting points on the board when they earned them by leading in statistics. Had it gone that way the Tigers now would be 3-0 instead of 0-3.

Another concern, of course, is the Saint Jo team which is vastly improved over last year and a good prospect for the district 7-B title. They have 11 starting seniors and good size... not sensational but a sturdy team that has been tough on both offense and defense. They have a 2-1 standing, their loss being 12-6 to Lindsay, which compares to the Tigers' 9-6 loss. From that standpoint the game rates as a toss up.

Physically, Sacred Heart still has problems. Joe Bartush, the blue chip holdover from last year's state runner-up team, is nursing a knee injury received before the first game. Also, Phil Walterscheid, who was out with an injury last week, will be doubtful this time. Likewise ailing and doubtful are Paul Bartush and Greg Rohmer.

The game will be played at Saint Jo Friday night, starting at 8 p.m.

Knights Tame Tigers 9-6

Calamity continued to plague the Sacred Heart Tigers through the third game of their season, and again they came away at the unhappy end of a football score. Theirs were 9-6 victims of Lindsay's Knights last Friday on the Lindsay field.

Their first misfortune was the absence of Joe Bartush and Phil Walterscheid, their No. 1 and No. 2 backs, both because of injuries. Another was the inability to gain where it counts as well as in mid-field. They were inside the 12 three times and failed to go on.

Still another possible factor is Lindsay's magic in getting the unexpected points. This time Tom Haverkamp, who had not kicked as much as a one pointer before, booted a 21 yard field goal. A week before the Knight fumbled over the goal line and recovered for the winning TD.

To begin, all looked great for SH. Mark Nasche returned the kickoff 28 yards to the 43 and two plays later Kenny Hartman's pass to Angelo Nasche got to the 10. Three more tries reached the 2, then Lindsay defense rose up and smeared the next play for an 11 yard setback.

Lindsay had to kick ending the next series and action was confined to midfield for the remainder of the quarter.

Early in the second period after a Tiger punt into the end zone, Lindsay was penalized back to its 10 for holding, they went 90 big yards in just 2 plays for its first score. First McCord hit Noggler for 7, then Andy Bezner, who was in the clear for an 83 yard dash to the goal. A kick for extra points failed. The score was 6-0 at 8:15 in the second period.

Highway Crash Kills Ricky Walterscheid

Richard Joe (Ricky) Walterscheid, 21, was one of two victims who died instantly last Friday, September 22, in a pair of related crashes on Highway 82 about 5 miles west of Muenster. The other was Archie Dan Umstead, 36, of Collinsville.

The tragedy occurred in two steps in heavy rain about 3 a.m. As related by State Trooper Richard Payeur, a tractor and trailer rig loaded with cattle and driven by Umstead collided almost head on with the east bound pickup driven by Walterscheid. The pickup, with the driver's side crushed, was found near the south side of the road.

After impact the tractor-trailer, apparently out of control, continued west some 200 yards and plunged into a creek bed at the right, colliding with a bridge abutment and causing the trailer with some 40 cattle to crush and cover the cab. Most of the animals were killed on impact or had to be destroyed.

Payeur described the accident as one of the worst in the county's history. The truck's cab was not pulled

Stock Protests 'Poor Officiating' At Lindsay Game

Regarding the field goal which decided the outcome, he said that it was at least doubtful and the official who called it was not in the proper position to see clearly. His charge is especially critical of penalizing the Tigers on vital plays.

And honorary pallbearers were members of the Muenster Police Department with whom Ricky served as a deputy. They were Mike Liddell, Rick Dillard, Johnny Robertson and David Province.

Ricky Walterscheid was born in Muenster on March 27, 1957, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Norbert Walterscheid. He attended Sacred Heart School, was a member of the Tiger team, and graduated in 1975. Since then he has done oil field work and farming and ranching and recently became associated with his father in operating an oil lease. He was also a deputy with the Muenster Police Department, on special duty for large crowds or emergencies.

Survivors are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Norbert Walterscheid, and two sisters, Susan and Sandra, both of the home.

This minimum, officially set by the government, is a more generous representation than our own government, in which the minority party has only a third of the total.

Briefly stated, this country's friends are being kicked in the face by our avowed enemy, and our government doesn't even bother to set the record safe.

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
