The past winter has seen acre after acre being sodded to bermudagrass in the Upper Elm-Red Soil and Water Conservation District. With additional acres being put to improved grasses each year, the responsibility of management also increases. The sole pur-

pose of sodding bermudagrass is to produce income. This income is two fold; first in the realm of saving the soil which is priceless, and second by harvesting the forage through cattle or mechanical means. Yet, without management neither of the objectives can become realities.

Management practices are well known by the farmers and ranchers and also well ignored. Management costs so little yet returns so much that it is one of the best investments cattlemen can make. When we take the pencil and figure net income from grass which is properly managed in comparison with grass which is not, we find definitely that management pays. We need to think in terms of the number of net dollars instead of the number of cattle run if our livestock enterprise is to be profitable.

The trend of thinking common among us is that the more cattle we run, the more income. Our thinking should be, the more forage produced the more income. Stocking rates reach a point of diminishing returns on a given area and we only deceive ourselves by thinking we make more money by running more cattle. The largest net incomes are realized when forage production is in balance with livestock numbers. Soil Conservation Service technicians will be glad to assist you in securing this balance.

The Upper Elm-Red Soil and Water Conservation District is dedicated to the task of conserving our soil, and we accomplish this most economically through the medium of grass management.

Over 4.2 Million Workers in Texas

Texas Employment Commission reports that during April the civilian labor force in Texas continued to expand with an increase of 37,000, boosting the total to 4,204,300 at mid-month.

Non-farm employment reached 3,784,400, a record for April; and agricultural employment rose 16,800 — to 307,400.

There were 110,000 unemployed in mid-April, 4,000 less than were unemployed in mid-March. This put unemployment at 2.6 per cent of the total labor force.

Suggestions Given On Killing Wasps

Wasps, as a rule, are beneficial insects, but they can become "tough customers" when disturbed. This often happens, says Phil Hamman, assistant Extension entomologist at Texas A&M University, when the insects build nests in such close proximity to the house, or even in the house, to make the area too confined for both insects and man.

Polistes, hornets, yellow jackets, mud daubers and the cicada killer are all wasps and as a group are beneficial insects. They destroy harmful insects found around homes and in gardens, but they can also attack people. Mud daubers and cicada killers usually will not sting unless touched or get caught in a person's clothing. But stay clear of

the nests of hornets, yellow jackets and Polistes, warns Hamman.

A wasp stings by driving its needle-like ovipositor into the flesh and injecting a venomous fluid into the wound. This causes a painful swelling that may last for several days. In some people, a wasp sting results in severe illness or even death, says the entomologist. Because of the probability of serious trouble, Hamman suggests that a sharp lookout be maintained for the insects and especially for their nests.

Nests and insects can be destroyed by applying recommended insecticides. Do the control work at night, he says, when wasps are less active and most are in the nest. Since many nests are found in trees and shrubbery or on the house, Hamman suggests using a water based spray containing DDT, chlordane or dieldrin. If the wasps are nesting in the ground, the same materials in a dust form are recommended.

Numerous ready-to-use formulations and aerosol bombs are readily available and will give good results, says Hamman. But, he warns that regardless of the material used, label instructions should be carefully followed. Local county agents, he adds, can supply information on recommended insecticides, including rates of application and directions for mixing and using the materials.

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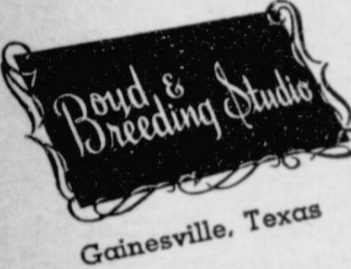

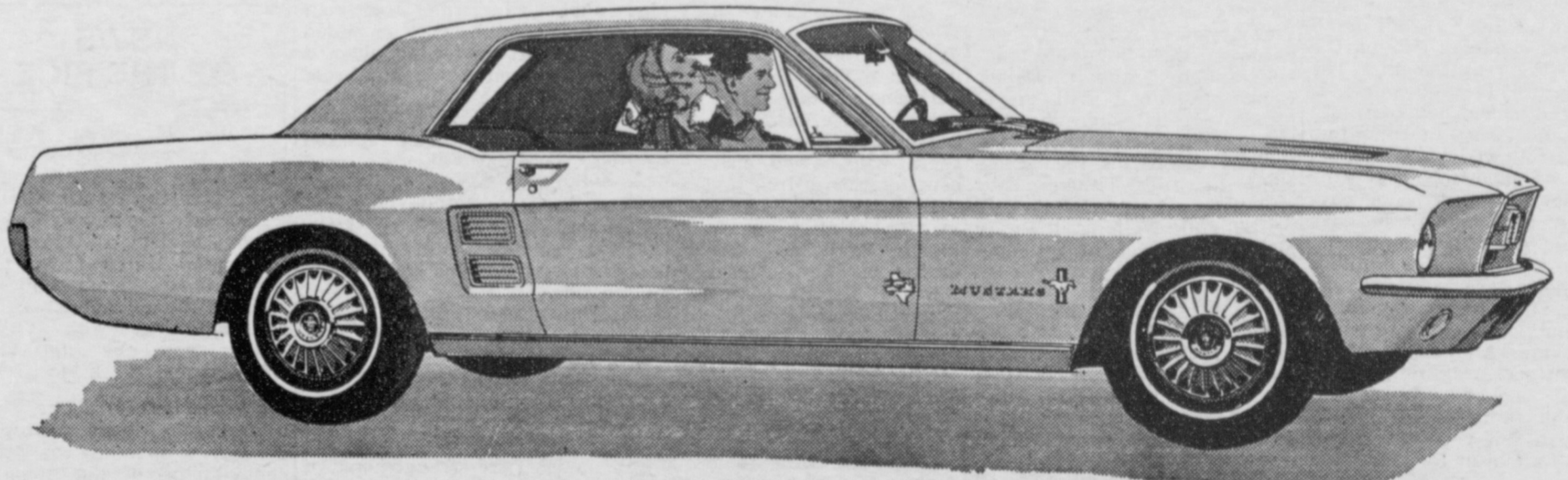

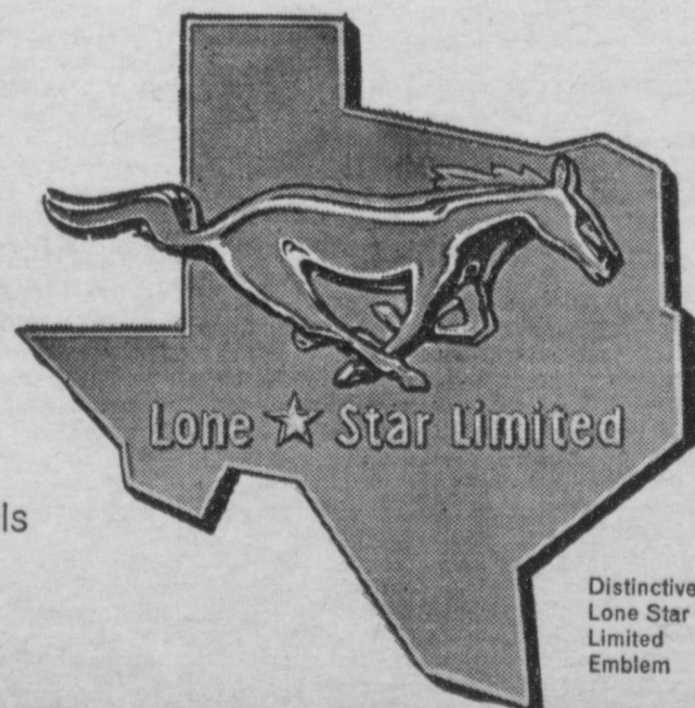


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CYC Group Plans For Coming Events

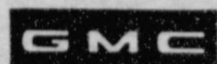
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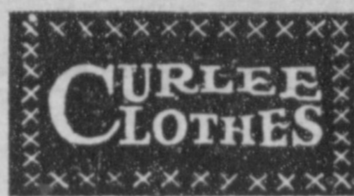

June 30 Set for Fruit Field Day at Montague Station

MONTAGUE — More than 110 different varieties of peaches, believe it or not, have been studied since 1939 here at the Fruit Research-Demonstration Station.

And several hundred guests will see many of these varieties when they take part June 30 in the annual field day at the station.

In addition to seeing the peaches, the guests will inspect the current progress of research in grapes, berries, plums and pears.

The June 30 program will be in two parts: —Tours of the station, beginning at 8 a.m., with stops for inspection and discussion at eight sites.

—General session under the famous Grape Arbor at 11 a.m., when specialists will talk about numerous problems facing the North Texas fruit growers today. The program ends at noon.

(Most prolific grape at the station in the Beacon, a juicy-type variety of purplish color which has produced an average of 4½ tons per acre for 15 years.)

Host for the day will be the longtime superintendent of the station, U. A. Randolph, horticulturist with the Agricultural Experiment Station of Texas A&M University.

Program chairman will be Ted Martin of Denton, district agent for the Agricultural Extension Service of Texas A&M University, and vice chairman, Frank Bumpus, Montague County agent.

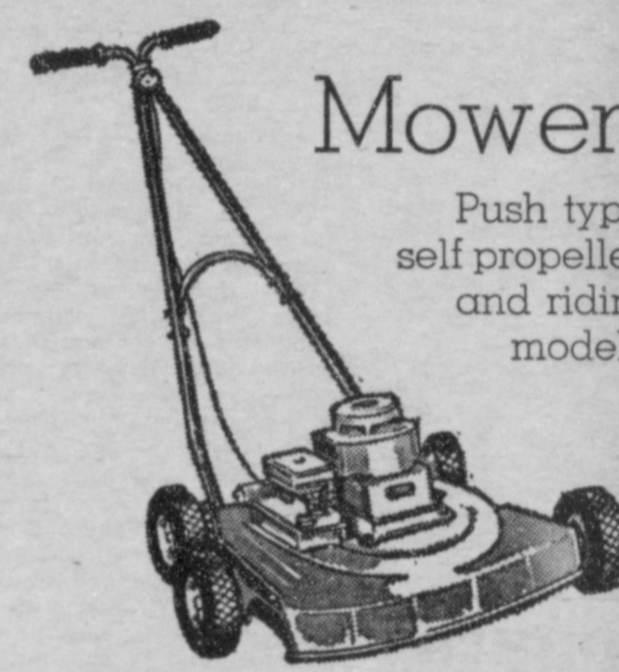
The station is located 2½ miles southwest of Montague, just off a county road intersecting State Hwy. 59.

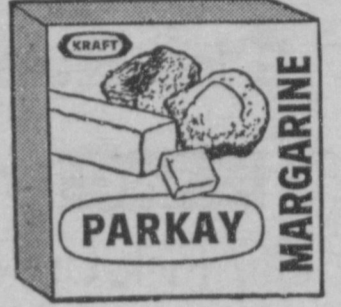

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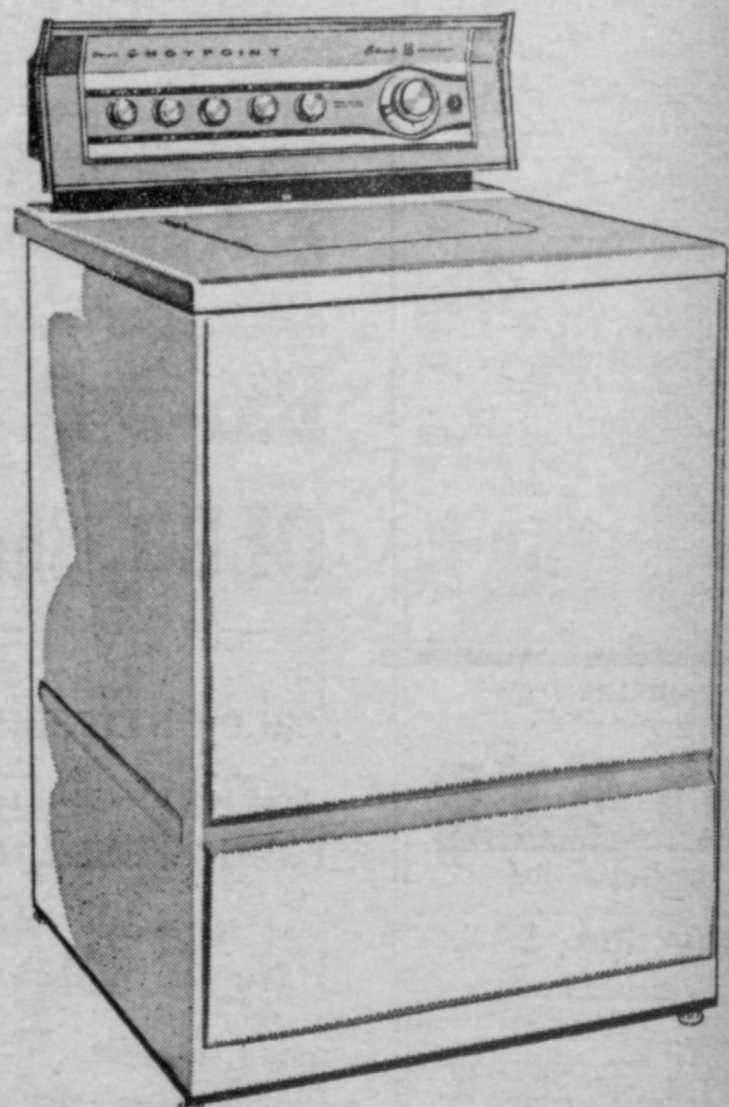

New study concludes that large scale desalting in the Lower Rio Grande Valley can provide a dependable source of good municipal water at costs comparable to that of conventional production. Study for Texas Water Development Board and U.S. Department of Interior said water could be made available to a metropolitan district for about 25 to 31 cents per 1,000 gallons at a desalination plant. Cost of delivery to individual cities in the Lower Valley would increase from one to two cents per 1,000.

But then the plan exploded. Israel's retaliation was sudden and decisive. The underdog mauled Moscow's favorite and pushed it back, occupying a sizeable area of Arab real estate. Immediately Arabs and Soviets started howling, charging aggression.

So what's demanded now? Soviets insist that Israel move back to its original boundaries. How's that as a twist of the Red's own policy? During all the years of communist expansion we've seen them taking land and refusing to give it up. That's been the Soviet rule all along, but the rule must change when it applies to the other side. Needless to say there are also demands for economic and political sanctions. Since the war failed the Soviets will try other ways to wreck Israel.

If UN action were guided by justice, we'd have no worries about the present session. But unfortunately the organization does not operate that way. Facts are meaningless in the final decision. All the talking is only so much pretense at presenting the case but final judgement will not be decided on the merits of the several charges. It will be decided rather by the alliances that Russia has been courting.

Many of the smaller UN countries will not judge according to right or wrong. They are influenced by hatred of the West or fear of Russia.

Only one hope remains open in the final voting. Soviet prestige took a hard fall in the Arab fiasco. There is the chance that some countries are having second thoughts about the might of Russia and will vote the other way.
