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## TOUGH TOP COP

Miami, Florida's tough top cop is gone. Walter Headley, Chief of the Miami Police Department, passed away in a hospital bed a couple of weeks ago.

Chief Headley's name leaped into headlines all across the country last January. Miami's Negro districts experienced an outbreak of crime without precedent. Families were afraid to venture outdoors after dark. Storekeepers were intimidated by threats and mounting incidents of robbery and bodily harm. The flood of violence made news across the nation.

Chief Headley responded in kind. He blanketed the area with police personnel armed with shotguns and assisted by well-trained police dogs. He further armed his men with orders to shoot to kill if it would prevent the completion of a felony in progress. The chief was quoted as saying: "Felons will learn they cannot be bonded out from the morgue."

There were screams of course, but most of them came from places other than Miami. In that troubled city most of the Negro population agreed with Chief Headley's action, or were silent in waiting to see if his solution would work. It did. The crime wave dropped off and so did the cries of outrage from across the country.

Chief Headley was on vacation in August when the Republican national conven-

tion was in progress and a band of militants proceeded to raise Cain. But he refused to rush back to the city. He said that his men knew their orders and could manage the situation. They did, order was restored, and the charges of police brutality died quickly, too. State officials were in general agreement that the Miami police had done well, with minimal force and reasonable restraint.

Chief Headley started his police career as a patrolman in 1937. He was a good cop and a onetime president of the International Association of Chiefs of Police. We wish Miami well in filling his shoes.

It will be a tough act to follow. While his critics were charging him with police brutality, he told the press: "I've let the word filter down that when the looting starts, the shooting starts."

He faced up to critics and criminals with equal courage. May he Rest In Peace.

## Texas DPS Predicts 33 Traffic Deaths During Holidays

AUSTIN — A warning that 33 persons may die in traffic accidents in Texas during the Christmas and New Year's holiday period was issued today by Colonel Wilson E. (Pat) Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Speir said the DPS will activate a special "Operation Motorcade" in an effort to remove unsafe drivers from the roads and lower the holiday traffic death toll. As part of this program, all available DPS officers will be on duty during the two holiday periods. In addition, Speir noted that the Department will make full use of radar, helicopters and VASCAR as enforcement aids to officers.

"Operation Motorcade will be in effect from 6 p.m. Tuesday, December 24 to midnight Wednesday, December 25, and from 6 p.m. Tuesday, December 31 to midnight Wednesday, January 1," Speir said. "DPS Statistical Services estimates that 19 persons will be killed in traffic accidents in the state during the Christmas period, with 14 fatalities estimated for the New Year's period," he added.

VASCAR, which stands for "visual average speed computer and recorder," is a computerized device carried in some Highway Patrol cars which enables the patrolman to accurately clock speeders moving in any direction, even while the patrol car is in motion.

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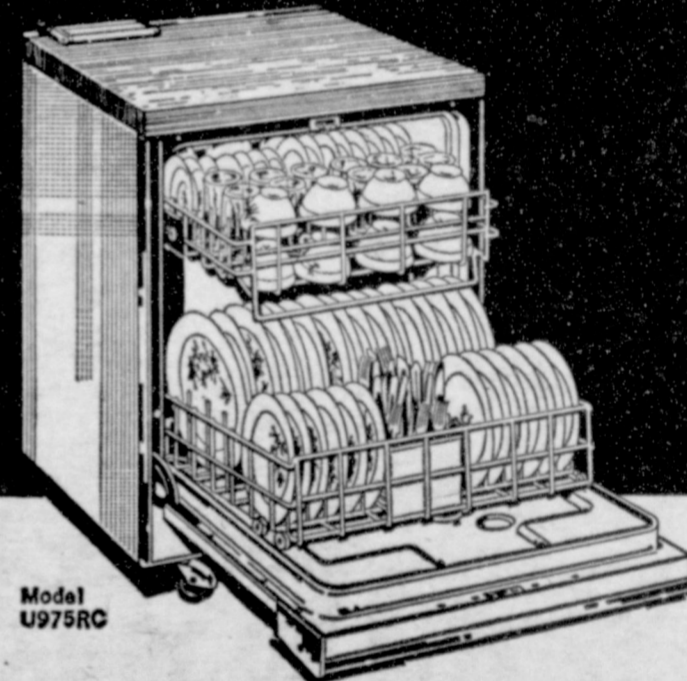
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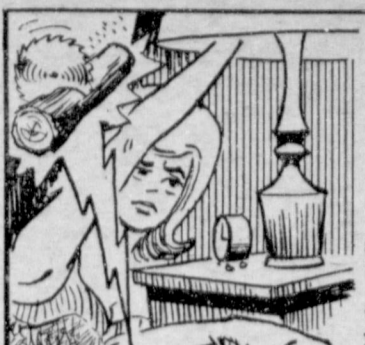


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**SNORING**

It's Time to Pick Christmas Trees

There's no substitute for the beauty of a natural Christmas tree if it's wisely purchased and safely used, says Bill Smith, Extension forester at Texas A&M University.

Texas imports over 3 million trees annually with some coming from as far away as Western Canada, he pointed out. As a result, the trees are stored in boxcars and undergo temperature extremes. Those undergoing warm temperatures for a period of several weeks may already have dried out by the time they're put on our Texas markets, Smith said. He makes the following suggestions to help keep a Christmas tree fresh and green:

- 1. Buy your tree early. This will enable you to be selective in the purchase of a reasonably fresh tree. Check for signs of needle shedding and brittleness. These indicate excessive drying.
2. Store the tree outdoors in the shade until ready for use and spray it frequently with water. When it's brought indoors, make a diagonal cut removing 1 to 2 inches of the base.
3. Stand the tree in water and keep it in water until it's discarded. Check the water level daily.
For further information on Christmas tree care, contact your local county agent's office for a copy of L-722, "Safe Use of Christmas Trees," suggests Smith.

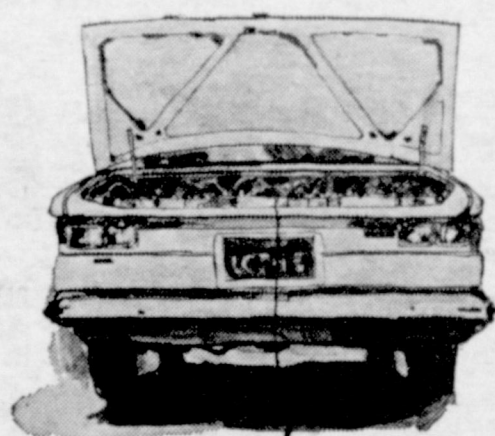

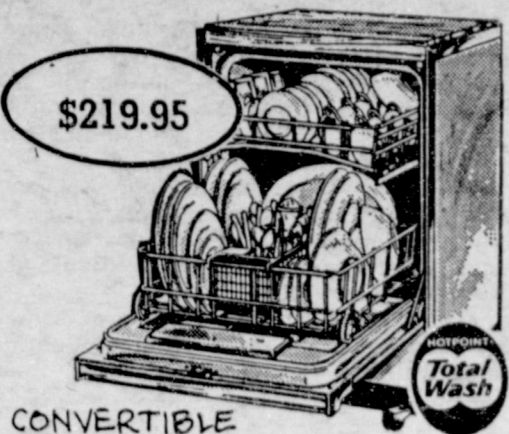

Nowhere else in this world is there so much private generosity as in the United States. Every Christmas, scores of towns and cities have private or church-sponsored drives to raise money to aid the poor. Civic groups and firemen in many communities collect toys and repair them as gifts. These stem from a warm, human feeling for the genuinely needy. But the radicals who are organizing welfare recipients disdain true charity, generosity and good feeling. These organizers of protest are worse than ungrateful; they are poisoners of community feelings. They are fomenters of strife and promoters of bitterness.

The good citizens of this country will err if they sim-

ply ignore the organizers of welfare recipients who try to create ill-will. It is necessary, for the well-being of the nation, for responsible citizens to condemn the radical organizers in the strongest terms and to use all legal means of checking their growth and influence.

The welfare organizers must be taught, first of all, that their shabby arguments won't get them anywhere. They must learn that there won't be any successful "National Get It" weeks. There must be strict enforcement of rules and regulations governing welfare.

If a welfare recipient spends his relief check in a deliberately irresponsible and provocative manner, he must discover that no more money will be forthcoming. Those who refuse to pay their utility bills must suffer the loss of the utilities they enjoy. To adopt any other policy, to conciliate the welfare organizers, would be to launch a new era of ugliness and tragedy in America. Demagogues cannot be permitted to rule this nation.
