Most persons who are required to file this report will receive a reporting card from their social security payment will include instructions on its completion, with an envelope nice fellow from down the for its return to the payment center. However, Jones said that persons who do not receive the card by April 1 but think they are required to report their earnings should contact their social security

Jones said that anyone can get assistance in completing their report by calling or visiting the social security office. Generally, the necessary information is on the person's 1972 W-2 Forms, or his tax

Recent amendments to the Social Security Act have increased the amount a person can earn before he suffers a deduction in his social security checks. In 1972, a person was allowed to earn \$1680 without losing any benefits. If he earned between \$1680 and 2880, he had one dollar of his social security benefits withheld for each two dollars he earned over \$1680. For earnings over \$2880, one dollar of his social security benefits was withheld for each dollar he earned. (However, Jones said, that a person could receive a social security check for any month in which he neither earned over \$140 nor performed substantial services in self-employment, regardless of his income).

Under the new rules, a person is allowed to earn \$2100 a year (beginning with 1973) without penalty. For every two dollars over this amount, one dollar of his social security benefits will be deducted. The "one-for-two" rule will apply to all earnings over \$2100. In addition, Jones said, beneficiaries can receive a check for any month in which they neither earn over \$175 or perform substantial services in self-employment.

Jones emphasized that persons who need assistance or want more information can receive it by calling any social security office.

The office in Sherman is located at 810 N. Travis and office hours are 8:30 a.m. to 4:45 p.m. Monday through Friday. A representative may also be contacted in Gainesville each Tuesday and Thursday from 9:30 a.m. to 12:00 noon in the Federal Building.

Rep. Allen says Department of Public Safety officials tell him "almost a third of all fatal rural accidents were the direct result of drunk drivers. Statewide figures are almost as high."

"Over 700 people were killed on the highways of Texas by drunk drivers in 1971. Consider that nearly 200,000 accidents during that same year were caused by drinking and driving and that the rates go up every year, and you get a good idea of the size of the problem," says Al-
