Dear Sir: In the past couple of weeks, the Catholics of the United States have been accosted with two very serious statements from Washington. One of them was the statement by Presi-

dent Nixon concerning amnesty for draft dodgers and the other was the Supreme Court's decision on Abortion. Some of the very fundamental ideals of Catholicism are being tested by these decisions.

Firstly, the amnesty issue. Did not Christ have as one of his central themes brotherly love? Did he not forgive a prostitute, tax collectors and the men who put him to death? Why is it then that a nation that is supposably based on Christian principles would tolerate the statement by President Nixon that there will be no amnesty for draft dodgers? This attitude closely parallels the statements of Friedrich Nietzche, long ago a staunch anti-christian, that the bellicose are the people to emulate.

When Nixon makes all of his gestures of good will among nations, even with the communists, would it be too much to ask of him to begin at home? Is it nobler to fight and kill rather than forgive and pardon? Truly those who died should be commended for giving their lives. But to treat those, who could no longer tolerate hostilities between mankind, as tyrants, is beyond any concept of Christianity.

Let us look at the Bible: Luke 6, 27-42, Luke 15, 11-32, Matthew 14,6, and James 2,13. Probably most of us will have to answer for enough without being accused as merciless on Judgment Day.

Concerning Abortion. From the beginning of Christianity, it was taught to respect human life. Now it is becoming possible to have an abortion on demand. The Second Vatican council has decreed:

"For God, the Lord of Life, has conferred on men the surpassing ministry of safeguarding life — a ministry which must be fulfilled in a manner which is worthy of man."

Then too — "The council exhorts all to beware against solutions contradicting moral law, solutions which have been both publicly and privately promoted. The question of how many children should belong to the judgment of parents. The question can in no way be committed to the decision of government!"

(The preceding quotes were from The Documents of Vatican II.)

When one reads about such a decision in the papers, one can easily think of Huxley's Bruce New World. A couple in that Novel were punished for having chilldren! Do you think that in a few years it will be against the law to have children? Is that something to think about? It is my opinion that these two decisions be reviewed by all Christians and then see if we still need Nixon "More than ever."
