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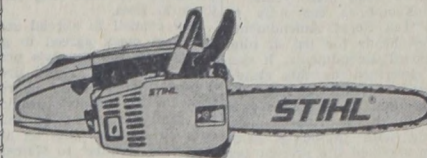

OPINION

MARSHALL, J.
This is a case of first impression, founded upon the provisions of Texas Code Crim. Proc. art. 32A.02, commonly known as "The Texas Speedy Trial Act," the effective date of which was July 1, 1978. On the 7th day of October, 1978, came on to be heard the above cause wherein the Defendant was charged with the offense of speeding in violation of Tex. Rev. Civ. Stat. Ann. art. 6701d Sec. 166, a misdemeanor punishable by fine only within the jurisdiction of this Court. The complaint, duly filed on September 21, 1978, alleged the offense to have occurred on August 23, 1978. The State announced ready.

the following reasons:
a. Allow the Defendant to determine how he should prepare his defense, if any is to be made.
b. Allow the Clerk of the Court to prepare the docket.
There are more than thirty calendar days between August 23 and October 7.
No demand for an earlier setting that was requested by Defendant or his counsel appears in the record.
Tex. Code Crim. Proc. art. 32A.02 states in material part:
"Section 1. A court SHALL GRANT a motion to set aside an indictment, information, or complaint if the state is not ready for trial within:
(4) 30 days of the COMMENCEMENT of a criminal action if the defendant is ACCUSED of a misdemeanor punishable by a fine only.
Sec 2 (a) ... a criminal action COMMENCES upon the filing of an indictment, information, or complaint against the defendant in court, unless prior to the filing the defendant is released on bail or PERSONAL BOND to answer in which event the criminal action commences when he is ARRESTED.
Sec 4. In computing the time by which the state must be ready for trial, the following periods shall be excluded:
(10) Any other reasonable period justified by EXCEPTIONAL circumstances." Emphasis added by the Court.
The Sixth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States reads in material part:
"In all criminal prosecutions, the ACCUSED shall enjoy the right to a SPEEDY and public trial." Emphasis supplied by the Court.
The right to a speedy trial is as fundamental as any of the rights secured by the Sixth Amendment. KLOPPER V. NORTH CAROLINA, 386 U.S. 213, 1966, at 223. As such, this right is applied to the case at bar by virtue of the decision in ARGER-SINGH V. HALLIN, 407 U.S. 25 (1972). This Court is, therefore, presented squarely with the question of whether Tex. Code Crim. Proc. art. 32A.02, by virtue of the time limits and exceptions thereto enumerated therein, provides a constitutionally valid criterion by which the Court may grant the motion to set aside the indictment or information. The Court is of the opinion that it does not.
"Speedy trial," as used in the Constitution, is designed to protect three basic demands of criminal justice in the Anglo-American legal system: (1) to prevent undue and oppressive incarceration prior to trial, (2) to minimize anxiety and concern accompanying public accusation and (3) to limit the possibilities that long delay will impair the ability of an accused to defend himself. U.S. V. EWELL, 383 U.S. 116 (1966), at 130; SMITH V. HOONEY, 393 U.S. 374 (1969) citing KLOPPER V. NORTH CAROLINA, SUPRA. In the instant case, of course, there was no incarceration, and any anxiety of the Defendant certainly was not manifested to the Court by an assertion of his right. The Court is, therefore, principally concerned with the third aim, that of prejudice to the Defendant by virtue of the delay.
To determine the issue of denial of the speedy trial right, this Court is bound to apply the so-called "balancing test" of BARKER V. WINGO, 407 U.S. 514 (1972). Four factors must be considered: length of delay, reason for the delay, assertion of the right by the Defendant, and the prejudice to the Defendant. The Legislature of the State of Texas has singled out the length of delay, only two of the four factors, as the primary, and as determinative of the question of denial of the speedy trial right. In the instant case, the length of delay to the Defendant to do under art. 32A.02 is shown a lapse of time to establish a PRIMA FACIE case for denial of the right to a speedy trial. The statute, upon such a showing, shifts the burden of going forward to the State to justify the delay. It is in this aspect of the statute that it crosses the line of unconstitutionality. As was stated in BARKER V. WINGO, "We regard none of the four factors identified above as either a necessary or sufficient condition to the finding of a deprivation of the right of speedy trial. Rather, they are RELATED FACTORS AND MUST BE CONSIDERED TOGETHER with such other circumstances as may be relevant. In sum, these factors have no talismanic qualities; courts must still engage in a difficult and sensitive balancing process." 407 U.S. at 533. Emphasis supplied.
In addition to possible prejudice, any court must thus carefully weigh the reasons for the delay in bringing a defendant to trial. MOORE V. ARIZONA, 414 U.S. 25 (1973), at 27. The decisions are clear that the courts, not the legislature, must balance all of the factors on an AD HOC basis. BARKER V. WINGO, SUPRA, at 530. See also HAAS V. STATE, 498 S.W. 2d 206 (Tex. Cr. App., 1973), at 211.
Were the Court to rule in favor of the Defendant, there would be no balancing, as the statute mandates a dismissal upon an un rebutted showing of a lapse of more than thirty days and thus would convert a shield into a sword. The motion that mere lapse of time amounts to a deprivation of the speedy trial right has been ex-

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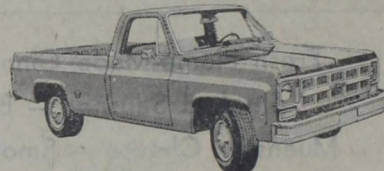

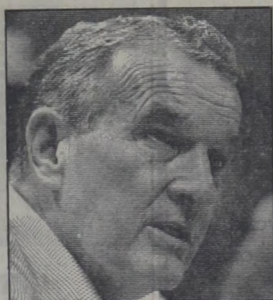
