The truce talk fiasco in Paris is studied at length this week Register Sept. 30 in an article in US News and World Report, which leaves little doubt that the affair is a hopeless waste of time.

As matters stand now, It is in an ideal position to stall and make more demands. It could go on indefinitely Americans and devastating South Vietnam while living in near peace-time comforts at home. Under those conditions it is not surprising that reds regard themselves as winners, in a position to make any kind of arrogant demand.

The bombing halt was Hanoi's big break. When LBJ offered to refrain if Hanoi would come and talk peace he presented the reds a golden opportunity. What more could they want? That put an end to the only serious trouble North Vietnam had. And all they had to do in return was talk - their own kind of evasive, abusive, demanding talk for which they were already famous.

Muenster Public Library got a big financial lift in the city ment was upped from \$450 to \$2000. Another lift had been previously assured as county commissioners increased their allotment from \$800 to \$1200.

The raises enable the local library to begin on an improvement program in keeping with recommendations of the Texas Library Commis-

After a recent survey the commission reported that the minimum library requirement is 10,000 volumes, but Muenster has only about 3,000 of which 1,000 are obsolete. Also, about 300 new books should be added each year along with an adequate supply of current literature.

Proposed budget of the library asked for \$3,000 from the city and included purchase of 900 new books for \$3,328. The lower allotment is expected to reduce the number of new books proportionately.

Other anticipated expenses are rent \$552, utilities \$160, supplies \$100, fixtures and repairs \$120, administration \$40.

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
