Crowley Lashes at Hippies, Yuppies

(Dallas) Congressional candidate Frank Crowley Wednesday promised volunteer workers in his campaign that when elected he would not miss 30 percent of the roll call votes, as his opponent has done. "I believe the greatest honor a person can receive is to be chosen by his neighbors to represent them in Congress. If I am so honored, I can assure you that I will be present and voting on the vital issues that face this nation", Crowley said.

He addressed workers in Dallas County Precincts 134 and 135 prior to the beginning of their house-to-house campaigning.

Crowley contrasted their work for the political change to that of the "hippies" Yuppies and Black Panthers who riot and demonstrate for the po-

litical changes they want." "I am convinced this year will see the triumph of the quite Americans — the people who fight the wars, pay the taxes and are 'sick to death' of the deadbeats and phonies who all too often, under the Administration, do their rioting and demonstrating with lavish subsidies of your tax money", Crowley said.

The 13th District candidate told the group he would "vote to deny Federal scholarships and loans to students convicted of lawlessness while participating in such activities".

Noting that hippies and Yuppies have promised widespread campus demonstrations and riots starting the week of October 21, Crowley said: "There is no reason in the world why the taxpayers should subsidize disorders and violence on college campuses. Our money is being used to provide educational opportu-

ities for youngsters who should be in school learning—not rioting".

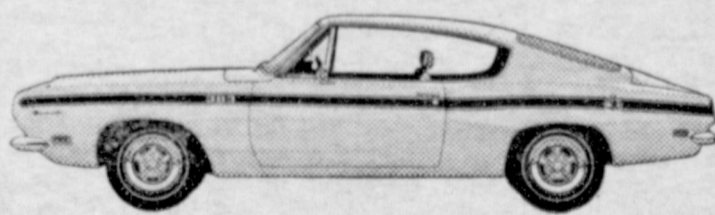

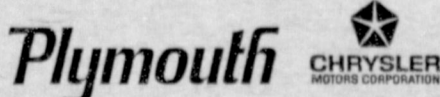

The hostess served refreshments to 16 members and two guests, Mrs. John Kubicek of Gainesville and Mrs. Joe Kathman.

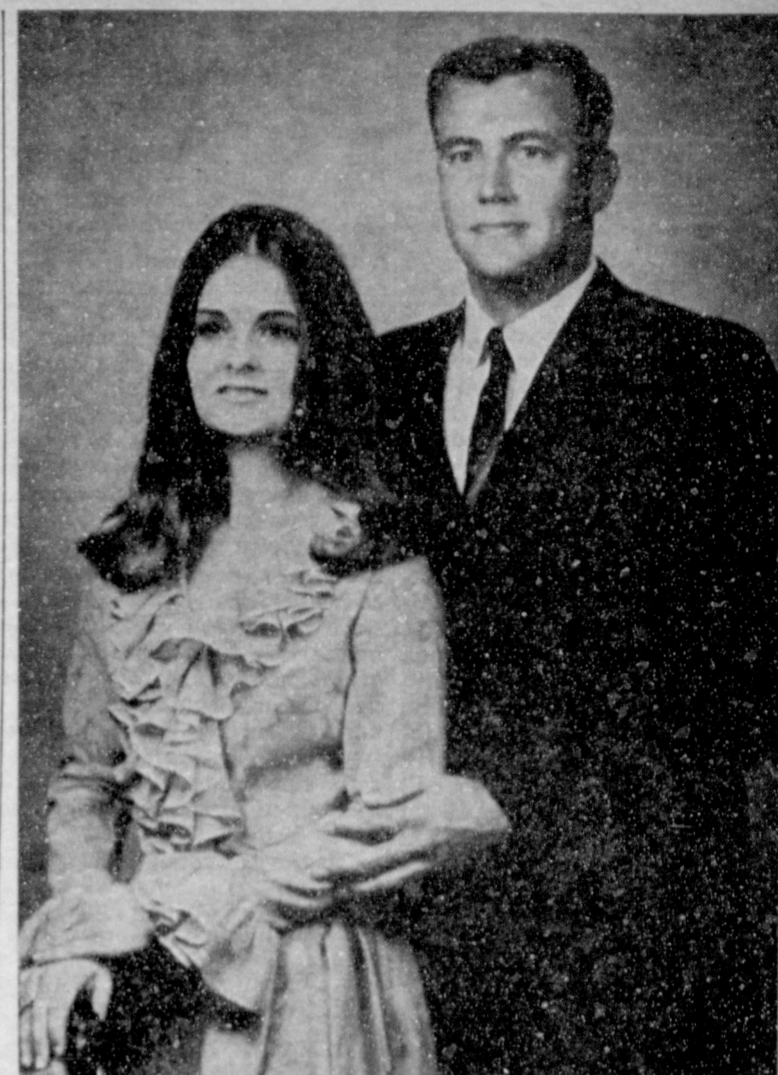

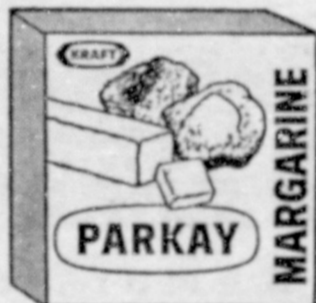

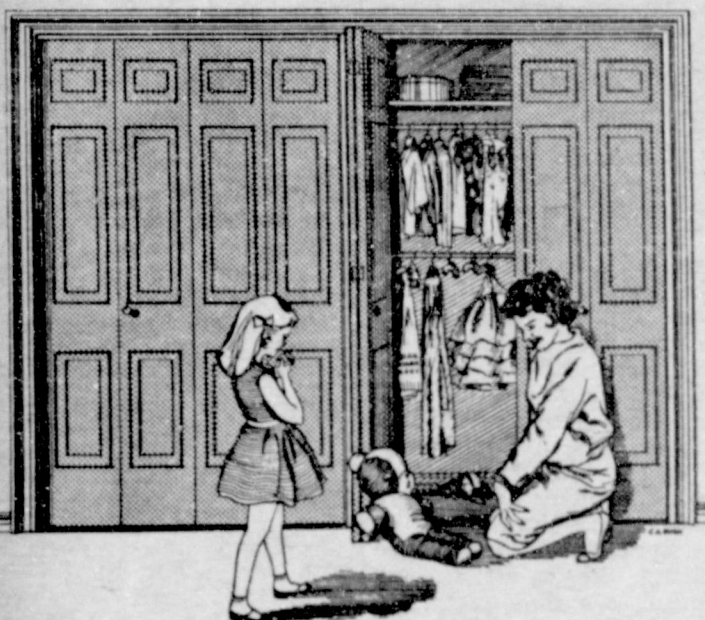

Continental Shelf Explored for Oil

New York — Oilmen are exploring large areas of the U. S. continental shelf, searching for petroleum to meet increasing demands, Oil Facts reports.

The American Petroleum Institute publication says that studies have indicated petroleum resources may exist off the northern section of the U. S. west coast and that a search for oil and gas is under way off the Atlantic coast. In addition, Oil Facts notes that extensive geological tests are scheduled in the southern part of the Gulf of Mexico.

The hunt for petroleum offshore, if successful, could add several states to the roster of oil producers, according to Oil Facts.

Competition is keen among companies bidding for federal offshore leases. So far, U.S. oil firms have invested more than \$7 billion in offshore oil exploration and development. Oil Facts points out it may require 12 to 15 years to recover money invested in offshore work.
