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Reports of stepped up activity by the enemy in Vietnam indicates that LBJ lost again when he ordered a bombing halt in the hope of inducing some sort of reasonable peace effort in Hanoi. This is turning out to be just another of many sad lessons we have learned about dealing with the communists. It doesn't pay to do favors for those scoundrels expecting them to show a similar sign of good will. Their policy is to take advantage of the concession and respond with treachery.

So, the net result of the president's dramatic pre-election announcement is another tragic set-back to our soldiers and the South Vietnamese. The enemy has used the lull to bring in reinforcements and supplies. He has shown more contempt by intensifying his attack. The allies have a tougher job than ever.

As facts of the fiasco continue to unfold it seems that the president also sustained a two way political loss on the home front. His eagerly awaited good news brought a last week surge of votes to his party, but still not enough to swing the election. And since then the whole affair has been back-firing at him personally. Apparently he had no preliminary agreement with Saigon or Hanoi. In spite of that he took a big gamble, knowing that the campaign was in urgent need of encouraging war news and trusting that he would somehow get the diplomatic preliminaries in order. Well, it did not work. He lost on both counts and he's doubly embarrassed.

The big tragedy of this whole affair, of course, is our set back as a result of another futile case of misplaced confidence. The enemy has gained again as we learned again that there is no such thing as reciprocal good will from the reds.

And that brings on the big question. Where do we go from here? Will it be possible for us to arrive at an honorable settlement, or will we have to go for total defeat of the Hanoi outfit? Without doubt, Nixon has inherited a real problem.

People who like to interpret elections as mandates for or against official policies received a guide for their decision this week in a nation wide study of votes received by George Wallace. The consensus was that the big majority of votes for Wallace were protest votes which would otherwise have gone for Nixon. In fact, it was estimated that if Nixon and Humphrey had been the only candidates Nixon would have received a landslide of more than two thirds of the electoral (Continued on page 8)

Mrs. Walterscheid, the former Miss Katie Hess, was born in Olpe, Kansas, Feb. 23, 1883, a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Franz Hess, pioneer Muenster residents who moved here with their family in 1890 after living in Gainesville about one year following their move from Kansas.

Mrs. Walterscheid made Muenster her home since she was seven years old. She married Mr. Walterscheid on Nov. 11, 1902. He died on May 26, 1951.

She leaves 109 direct descendants.

The title race in District 9-B did not end last week when Muenster beat its co-contender from Windthorst. A game with Era Friday night will decide whether Muenster is champ or co-champ. In case of a loss Windthorst will share a 4-1 loop record with Muenster and will also share the loop honor.

With that in mind, Coach Glenn Richardson is reminding his boys that this is no time for coasting. They'll have to keep going on full steam to avoid giving up a part of the title which some folks already are taking for granted.

Richardson is also telling his boys that this is more than just routine caution. Era deserves respect in its own right. It needs to be taken seriously regardless of its underdog status. Evidence of that is apparent in Era's stout stand against Saint Jo last week along with the fact that it will be at full strength this week. So, the emphasis at MHS this week is to put first things first and not stumble while looking a week ahead.

As regards the week ahead event, it was definitely decided last week. By beating Windthorst the Hornets became the 9-B standard bearer in bi-district competition. At the same time Lake Dallas became the 10-B representative by a 42-0 win over Perrin. Hence the two are booked to tangle for the bi-district trophy.

A previous win of 40-0 over the Falcons establishes the Hornets as favorites in that game too. And Richardson urges more caution. He points out that the Falcons have improved a lot since the early loss, as shown by their list of big wins in 10-B. Furthermore, their scouts have attended the last three Hornet games. They have looked forward to the coming clash a long time, obviously determined to find ways of stopping the Hornet offense and cracking the Hornet defense.

Since that game will lead to a regional, the status of two other districts now commands local interest. Celina took the 11-B crown last week by blasting Callisburg. Reported leaders of 12-B are Anna and Quinlan, one of which will meet Celina in bi-district. And finally, the winner of that game will meet the winner of the Muenster-Lake Dallas game.

Concerning this week's game, Richardson says all but Sparkman are physically fit and ready to go. Sparkman is nursing an injured ankle, has a chance to be in the Lake Dallas game.

Rap Windthorst Trojans 28-0 Hornets Win B-9 Title

Muenster's Hornets are the champs of District 9-B. They won the title very convincingly last Friday night by overpowering their principal rivals, the Windthorst Trojans, by a count of 28-0.

A crowd of about 2,500 was at Hornet Field for the title contest, which was also the headline feature of the Muenster High Homecoming. They saw the Hornets take command of the field and grind out the yardage relentlessly in four sustained drives. While scoring in each of the four periods the Hornets were also executing fine ball control. They had it for 73 plays and the visitors had it for 50. They gained a total of 310 yards in 21 first downs and the Trojans gained 106 yards in 7 first downs.

Superb teamwork by the Hornets' forward wall and the backfield was the formula of success. The big, scrappy linemen consistently opened gaping holes in the Trojan defense and the Hornet backs, particularly Clifford Sicking and Don Hartman scooted through for nice gains. And occasionally Sicking went around end for more yardage. He was the standout of the game with 223 yards to his credit. Another factor in the Hornets' favor was avoidance of costly mistakes. They lost possession only once, on a fumble, and they lost only 3 yards by penalty. Meanwhile the Trojans lost possession on two interceptions and two fumbles and 36 yards in penalties. There were a few instances on both sides of runners losing footing on the rain soaked field.

The Hornets started the

game with a first down, kicked on their second series, and held on the Trojans' first series. Then they got started on their first drive with Clifford Sicking and Don Hartman slipping through the line for gain after gain. They used 13 plays in going 62 yards and the pay off was a quarterback sneak for 1 yard by John Monday. Sicking's sprint around end boosted the count to 8-0 as the clock read 2:47 in the first quarter.

On Windthorst's third play after kickoff Mike Cason was on the right spot for a deflected pass and intercepted for the Hornets. However possession did not last long.

Big D Team Beats Tigers 14-13 with Last Minute Score

Sacred Heart's Tigers ended their football season Saturday night with a heartbreaking 14-13 loss to the Greenhill Hornets of Dallas.

Up to the last minute they had battled against the odds and held on to a 13-8 lead. But then the big Hornets crashed over with the winning TD.

Two minutes before it seemed as though the scrapping Tigers had saved their game. Greenhill had come from midfield to the 24 in two series, but the next series was one yard short. The odds seemed to favor the Tigers. A kick by Lee Roy Hess should set the visitors back to a safe distance.

But it did not go that way. The Big D fellows crashed through, partially blocked the kick, and Greenhill was only 21 yards away with more than a minute to go. A fourth down pass was complete to Schutz at the 1 and Gifford crashed over for the last yard. That won it 14-13, and it did not matter that a try for extra points was short.

The Tigers had done a big job in taking a lead over the Hornets. They were outweighed by an average of some 20 pounds and they were outmanned by a count of 44 to 17. Nevertheless they made up the difference in fight and hustle, that is, in the first half. After intermission Greenhill took charge.

Sacred Heart got started midway in the first quarter and advanced 34 yards to the visitors' 37 where Lee Roy Hess kicked to the corner and the visitors had to start only a foot from the goal. Four plays later the Tigers returned a Hornet kick to the 40. Next Hess almost got away on an end run but was finally hauled down on the 7, and four plays after that he made the final yard for a touchdown and kicked an extra point.
