

Let's Go Metric

In August of last year, the Senate passed legislation moving for U.S. adoption of the international metric system as our primary system and comparable action is anticipated in the House. From a number of viewpoints this is a most responsible decision.

In the first place, we are now the only industrial nation on earth not on or moving to the metric system. It is estimated that with metric-sized products we'll open up as much as \$10-billion additional foreign trade and heaven knows with our trade imbalance we can use it. Continuing to use our customary system places us in a technological trap of our own making and this is insane in a world where all are moving to a single technology. Although the move will be expensive, evidence is such that failure to change will be more costly in the long run.

Domestically a shift to metrics will create some confusion for both the public and business, but in the long run we'll probably learn it better than our present system. After all, how much sense is there to a system that asks you to relate 12 inches to a foot, three feet to a yard, 36 inches to a yard, 1,760 yards to the mile or 5,280 feet to the mile? With metrics we measure simply — for length the meter is divided into decimeters (1/10th), centimeters (1/100th), millimeters (1/1000th) — all you do is move a decimal point! The system is so much more logical than

The changeover will also encourage us to update our standards and specifications for products, offering us an unprecedented opportunity to improve them and cut out the unnecessary variety which increases cost.

Quick action on this legislation would be a service to America's economic future.





Crime Rate Drops

Major crimes are on the decline in Texas, according to a new Department of Public Safety report.

Col. Wilson E. Speir, DPS director, said the number of crimes last year was 2.2 per cent below 1971 - the first measureable decline since 1954. Translated into crime rates, the 1972 figure was six per on Sunday when county tax cent below the 1971 rate per 100,000 population.

The decrease, Speir said, was only the fourth since DPS began compiling its Texas Crime Report 30 years ago.

Decreases were noted in murders, aggravated assaults and thefts. Small increases were observed in rapes, robberies and auto thefts - with a larger increase in the burglary category.

The urban crime rate overall was down 5.7 percent, with the rural rate off 5.8 percent.

Crime clearance rates remained at 26 per cent. Clearance rate for murder improved from 86 per cent to 89 per cent, with further improvements noted in robberies, aggravated assaults and thefts.

Many factors are responsible, said Speir.

The DPS chief cited improved law enforcement effectiveness through training, education, more personnel and better facilities, as well as improvements in other parts of the criminal justice system and "a growing awareness and concern on the part of the public that crime must be impeded."

The crime statistics break down to one major crime every minute, a murder every five and a quarter hours, a rape every three hours and 45 Muenster after a thee-month minutes and a robbery every half hour.





Giving baby rabbits, chicks and ducks for Easter is cruel and in many states and cities illegal. The American Veterinary Medical Association (AVMA) urges parents not to give children living animals as toys.

A baby rabbit, chick or duck is not likely to survive in the home atmosphere, AVMA points out. A young child's enthusiasm over the new pet often results in unknowing cruelty as legs are broken and wings crushed. If the animal dies or is injured, it is a traumatic experience for the child. If the animal survives, it generally ends up in an animal shelter. Because such a large number of rabbits, chicks and ducks are left at animal shelters during the post-Easter season, it is impossible to place them. them all and many have to be destroyed. Even if the animal should reach maturity, many local ordinances would prohibit a family from keep-

that these are outdoor animals. They cannot be housebroken and may cause seri-

ous housekeeping and health problems. Many are disease carriers. The National Center for Disease Control in Atlanta and other public health authorities warn that children and adults in close contact with these animals may be exposed to salmonel losis, a severe gastro-intesti-nal infection. Salmonellosis is rarely fatal but often requires medical treatment including hospitalization. In addition to the family, other pets in the household may become ill.

Because of the problems surrounding "Easter pets." many communities have passed laws prohibiting the sale of these animals, including rabbits, ducklings and other fowl.

Easter and the coming of spring should be a time of and rebirth, not a period of physical illness, psychological trauma and the needless deaths of young animals. AVMA urges parents to leave rabbits, chicks, ducklings and similar animals on the farm and give their chil-dren stuffed toys or choco-late "bunnies" instead.





Experts Offer Tips On Saw Care, Safety

Many people neglect their hand and power tools through failure to sharpen or lubricate. One tool frequently over-

looked is the chain saw. Tho the popularity of the chain saw is increasing due chain saw is increasing due to its ability to handle a wide variety of tough jobs, the chain saw is inherently more complex than a crosscut saw or even an electric drill. It has many elements of an automobile, outboard motor or tractor—including fuel, ignition, and electrical systems. The saw's rotating elements approximate a propulsion system and it has lubrication and cooling systems.

Experts say the high-speed

Experts say the high-speed cutting chain on the saws can be severely blunted or damaged by such objects as nails, stones, hard wood, wire and even hard courth. even hard earth.

Researchers for one of the nation's leading chain saw producers, Allis Chalmers, offers these tips on how to keep your chain saw in top operat-ing condition and how to cor-rect problems should they

Preventive Maintenance

1. If chain has been stored, check for excessive moisture and foreign particles. Replace oil or change if contaminated. 2. Check chain tension. Too

much tension stretches the chain and might result in breakage under sudden im-pact or pinch. Too little tension causes excessive sprocket

3. Inspect air cleaner and fuel filter for dirt. Check chain cutter teeth sharpen them if they

are dull. 5. Check the built-in sharpening stone for excessive wear. Keep a spare stone on hand

6. Inspect spark plug for dust and gap. Adjust plug gap, if necessary.

When storing saw, wrap it in newspapers to keep out dust. Plastic is not recom-mended because it may seal in moisture and corrosives.

Here are some common chain saw operating problems and what to do about them:



Safety with the chain saw in hand takes some thought. Allis-Chalmers engineers advise using safety glasses when the chips fly. Safety glasses are best under all circumstances. Any side cut throws chips towards the operator.

*chain tooth problems -these can occur when hard objects are hit or when teeth are sharpened incorrectly for the job to be done. Teeth usually need to be resharpened.

*fuel problems - these result when the operator uses the wrong fuel-oil mixture, gets water or particles in the fuel or uses old fuel. To remedy, use correct fuel mixture or change fuel if dirty.

*saw engine backfires or cuts out - check for a worn spark plug or breaker points, bad condenser or coil. A broken wire can also cause a short or loose connection. Safety Tips

The Allis-Chalmers engineers stress safety first in the operation of a chain saw. They say safety glasses should always be worn along with a sturdy pair of gloves. Ear plugs are a good idea.


