

In comparatively light balloting last Saturday the voters of this community, for the first time in local history, chose

two women on their governing bodies. One of those is Sue Endres, who won 209-122 over Roy Monday in a contest for the city council seat vacated by

Albert Herr. The other is Theresa Walterscheid, who defeated Incumbent Jerry Wimmer 288-136 in the race for Muenster School Board.

At the same time another challenger, Dan Hamric, was successful by a 321-102 count in unseating Incumbent Dr. Larry Tisdale.

Otherwise the election was formality, with all other candidates coasting in without opposition.

Out in front of the list is David Bright, who got the city's top position. He was unopposed as successor to Mayor Arthur Felderhoff, who choose not to seek re-election. Bright received 281 votes.

Another unopposed city candidate was Herbert Miller. He received 291 votes in his bid for re-election.

Likewise Urban Endres had clear sailing in the school board election. He received 355 votes as an unopposed candidate for re-election.

Finally, there was the hospital board's ballot on which four unopposed incumbents coasted back into office. Those men and the votes they received are Jimmy Jack Biffle 385, Paul Fetsch 380, Alphonse Felderhoff 380, Al Trubenbach 376.

Two candidates for the county school board also were uncontested. They are Doyle Selby and Alphonse Felderhoff, representatives of Precinct 3 and 4 of the county school board.
