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In the recent loud clamor for gun registration an often repeated remark was that it will not work because the bad guys will not comply. So the only guns on record would be those of the good guys.

Apparently no one happened to notice at the time that we have a court ruling upholding the criminal's right to refuse to register — on grounds that no one can be forced to incriminate himself. How does that strike you? This isn't just a matter of who is willing to cooperate and who is unwilling. This says that good guys must obey but bad guys are excused.

The situation was explained in the Indianapolis Star in reference to the Case of US vs. Haynes. The defendant was prosecuted under the National Firearms Act for possession of an unregistered sawed-off shotgun.

The National Firearms Act, which has been on the books for a long time, regulates ownership and use of such weapons as machine guns, other fully automatic weapons, and sawed-off shotguns. Haynes argued that to register his weapon would be self-incriminating, and the Supreme Court upheld his contention.

And that, you can bet, puts an end to the proposal for gun registration. Congress has been told by the Supreme Court that the law can be rightfully defied by the very people it is intended for.

The more that's said on the matter of gun control the more it appears that the best suggestion is a mandatory stiff sentence for the use of a gun in any kind of crime, a sentence that really sticks and is not subject to parole. Such a penalty would actually make the gun offense more risky than the average crime. Criminals caught in possession would go out of circulation for a long time. And lots of guys with the criminal urge would be less inclined to carry out their ideas. Conditions will improve when regulations on the use of guns get so tough that hoodlums will be afraid to try.

Have you wondered who stands the losses in our big city riots? You realized, of course, that those binges of destruction and looting have been a huge burden on the country's insurance companies. Many had reached the point of refusing to provide coverage in the troubled areas. So then we began to feel sorry for the property owners.

Well, now we can feel sorry for ourselves. Whether we like it or not, all of us are involved in the riot losses. Congress has enacted the Urban Property Protection and Re-insurance Act of 1968, which provides backing by the US Treasury for insurance in riot areas.

It means that insurance companies no longer need to turn down applicants in the riot areas. It also means that future riots are our business. As you watch TV and see the burning and looting, just remember that you are helping pay for it. Whatever the Treasury kicks in to help pay for the losses has to come out of the taxpayers' pockets.

In a way we should not be too grudging about being forced to share in the losses. We ought to sympathize with the unfortunate people who are ruined by the outbursts of violence. On the other hand, since all of us suddenly have become victims, we suddenly have a greater right to demand corrective measures.

It seems only reasonable that the government, in assuming some of the financial responsibility for riot losses, should also assume greater responsibility in preventing them.

Experience in the many riots of recent years has established one fact very clearly. The people who organize and carry out the violence are criminals, and not just some frustrated underprivileged poor folks, as the bleeding heart element wants us to think.

It has been said many times that the leaders are well known to local police and the FBI, and the same can be said for much of the red power which backs up the black power. With such information at hand one would think it's a simple matter for authorities to get the main trouble makers and throw all the law books at them. In fact it's amazing that we still have violence after these several years. By this time most of the big shots should be under control and the others ought to be afraid to try anything more.

Only a few days ago black militants went on a rampage in Cleveland. The news told (Continued on page 8)

## Library Activities Told at Meeting

The board of Directors of Muenster Public Library in their July meeting heard reports on activity and progress of the Library. One hundred and forty-two children attended the last story hour. The story hour attendance was greater by forty children than last year.

In June a total of 338 volunteer hours were worked at the Library with 2,582 books checked out. Thirty-six new members were added to the library.

Special guests at the meeting were Miss Anita Decker, Field Consultant and Mayor Earl Fisher. Miss Decker commended Muenster on its fine library and especially the work Mrs. Luke and the volunteer librarians are doing. She stated that before our library can qualify for state and federal aid we must have a core library of 10,000 volumes. She estimated that 35 to 50% of our books are obsolete. When new book orders arrive some of the older books are removed from the shelves and given to the State Hospital or other worthy causes.

The City of Muenster sponsored Hartman's attendance at the course and by doing so earned a 3 per cent key rate credit for every resident paying fire insurance in the city. Other benefits are reduced losses through more efficient fire fighting methods and savings from fire prevention.

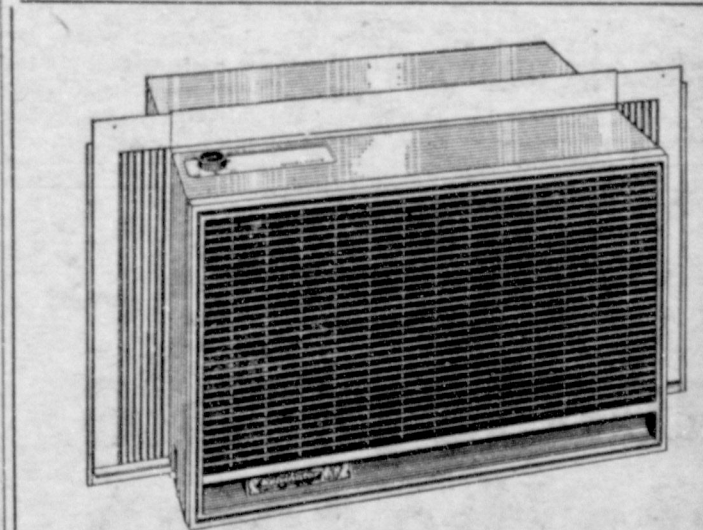

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**SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS**

Upper Elm-Red Soil and Water Conservation District cooperators, Bruno Fleitman, Johnny Bayer, Werner Becker and the Klement Brothers will soon be constructing new and modern parallel terraces on their farm.

Cooperators are changing from the standard terrace system that follows the natural slope of the land to a parallel system where terraces are an equal distance apart throughout the length. This system eliminates or reduces point rows. "Last year 92 percent of the terraces constructed in the Muenster Work Unit area were parallel", Cecil Chaney, Soil Conservation technician said.

According to the SCS technicians, sometimes additional waterways must be established to construct parallel terraces. Usually there will not be any more acres needed for waterways than is needed for the standard type terraces. But with additional waterways, the size can be reduced.

No one can tell by looking at a field just where the waterways are needed. A topog-

raphy map of the field must be made. That is to get the elevations every 100 feet over the entire field. From those elevations, the S.C.S. engineers can design the waterways and parallel terrace systems.

Some district cooperators are eliminating their old crooked terraces and constructing new parallel terraces. The supervisors state that any cooperators interested in parallel terraces should contact the S.C.S. office for assistance in designing the system.

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### PUBLIC NOTICE

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THIRTEEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR16)**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a Section 1-f, to read as follows:

"Section 1-f. All merchandise, products, goods or wares in the temporary custody of a public warehouseman, who has no financial connection other than as bailee for hire with the owner, shipper, or consignee of the merchandise, products, goods, or wares, are exempt from ad valorem taxation if they are shipped to or from the warehouse by regulated or bona fide private carrier, are held by the warehouseman not longer than six (6) months, and have a predetermined out-of-state destination at point of origin. The books and records relating to out-of-state shipments covered hereby of such public warehouseman shall be available for reasonable inspection by the proper taxing authorities. This amendment shall not act as a validation of any present statute or law, but only those passed specifically pursuant hereto; provided, however, that enabling legislation passed in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment shall not be invalid solely because of its anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment to exempt certain property temporarily stored in a public warehouse from ad valorem taxation."  
"AGAINST the constitutional amendment to exempt certain property temporarily stored in a public warehouse from ad valorem taxation."

### PUBLIC NOTICE

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (SJR4)**

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 4 Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Section 48a of Article III thereof, so as to provide for contributions on the basis of the full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System; providing for the submission of the proposed amendment to a vote of the people at an election and for proclamation and publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 48a of Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 48a. In addition to the powers given the Legislature under Section 48, Article III, it shall have the right to levy taxes to establish a fund to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for persons employed in the public schools, colleges and universities supported wholly or partly by the state; provided that the amount contributed by the state to such fund each year shall be equal to the aggregate amount required by law to be paid into the fund by such employees, and shall not exceed at any time six percent (6%) of the compensation paid each such person by the state and/or school districts; and provided that no person shall be eligible for retirement who has not rendered ten (10) years of creditable service in such employment, and in no case shall any person retire before either attaining the age fifty-five (55) or completing thirty (30) years of creditable service, but shall be entitled to refund of moneys paid into the fund.  
"Moneys coming into such fund shall be managed and invested as provided in Section 48b of Section III of the Constitution of Texas; provided a sufficient sum shall be kept on hand to meet payments as they become due each year under such retirement plan, as may be provided by law; and provided that the recipients of such retirement fund shall not be eligible for any other state pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless such other state pension or retirement fund, contributed by the state, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid; provided, however, that this Section shall not amend, alter, or repeal Section 63 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas as adopted November, 1954, or any enabling legislation passed pursuant thereto."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words:

"FOR the amendment to Section 48a of Article III allowing contributions to be made on the basis of full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas."  
"AGAINST the amendment to Section 48a of Article III allowing contributions to be made on the basis of full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment. If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the state constitution and be effective from the date of determination of such result and the Governor's proclamation thereof.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said special election and shall have the same published as required by the constitution and laws of this state.

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### PUBLIC NOTICE

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWELVE ON THE BALLOT (SJR14)**

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 14 proposing an amendment to Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding a new Section 52a to give the Legislature the power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 52a to read as follows:

"Section 52a. The Legislature shall have the power to authorize counties, cities, and towns to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes, or in aid thereof; provided, that property acquired from proceeds of the bonds shall be subject to ad valorem taxes. Legislation passed in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment shall not be invalid solely because of its anticipatory nature. The tax revenue, the utility revenue, and the revenue from services of any county, city or town may not be used to pay any bonds issued pursuant to this authority nor the interest thereon."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment to give the Legislature the power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes."  
"AGAINST the constitutional amendment to give the Legislature the power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

### PUBLIC NOTICE

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (SJR32)**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 1-e to read as follows:

"Section 1-e.  
"1. From and after December 31, 1978, no State ad valorem taxes shall be levied upon any property within this State for State purposes except the tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, for certain institutions of higher learning."  
"2. The State ad valorem tax authorized by Article VII, Section 3, of this Constitution shall be imposed at the following rates on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation for the years 1968 through 1974: On January 1, 1968, Thirty-five Cents (35¢); on January 1, 1969, Thirty Cents (30¢); on January 1, 1970, Twenty-five Cents (25¢); on January 1, 1971, Twenty Cents (20¢); on January 1, 1972, Fifteen Cents (15¢); on January 1, 1973, Ten Cents (10¢); on January 1, 1974, Five Cents (5¢); and thereafter no such tax for school purposes shall be levied and collected. An amount sufficient to provide free text books for the use of children attending the public free schools of this State shall be set aside from any revenues deposited in the Available School Fund, provided, however, that should such funds be insufficient, the deficit may be met by appropriation from the general funds of the State."  
"3. The State ad valorem tax of Two Cents (2¢) on the One Hundred Dollars valuation levied by Article VII, Section 17, of this Constitution shall not be levied after December 31, 1976. At any time prior to December 31, 1976, the Legislature may establish a trust fund solely for the benefit of the widows of Confederate veterans and such Texas Rangers and their widows as are eligible for retirement or disability pensions under the provisions of Article XVI, Section 66, of this Constitution, and after such fund is established the ad valorem tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, shall not thereafter be levied."  
"4. Unless otherwise provided by the Legislature, after December 31, 1976 all delinquent State ad valorem taxes together with penalties and interest thereon, less lawful costs of collection, shall be used to secure bonds issued for permanent improvements at institutions of higher learning, as authorized by Article VII, Section 17, of this Constitution."  
"5. The fees paid by the State for both assessing and collecting State ad valorem taxes shall not exceed two per cent (2%) of the State taxes collected. This subsection shall be self-executing."  
Sec. 2. That Article III, Section 51, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 51. The Legislature shall have no power to make any grant or authorize the making of any grant of public moneys to any individual, association of individuals, municipal or other corporations whatsoever; provided, however, the Legislature may grant aid to indigent and disabled Confederate soldiers and sailors under such regulations and limitations as may be deemed by the Legislature as expedient, and to their widows in indigent circumstances under such regulations and limitations as may be deemed by the Legislature as expedient; provided that the provisions of this Section shall not be construed so as to prevent the grant of aid in cases of public calamity."  
Sec. 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment continuously reducing State ad valorem property taxes and abolishing all State ad valorem property taxes after December 31, 1978, except the tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, for certain institutions of higher learning."  
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment continuously reducing State ad valorem property taxes and abolishing all State ad valorem property taxes after December 31, 1978, except the tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, for certain institutions of higher learning."

During June receipts amounted to \$1,139.17 and disbursements \$5,745.61 and the fund's balance was \$31,575.65.
