Reaching into the car the officer picked up a snub-nosed .38 revolver from the floor in front of the driver's seat. The suspect had no permit to carry it and the gun law's penalty for having it was stiff. But the suspect was not charged with that crime - because the arresting officer had picked up the gun without a search warrant. The suspect paid a small fine on the other charges and was released in less than a

And that's not the half of the story. Early last month Washington police and the FBI arrested the very same person, a self styled revolutionary. At the time he was carrying a sawed-off .303 rifle which, it is known, was used to murder at least four innocent victims since the first of the year. All had been slaughtered in cold blood, not in robbery, but hatred.

So, there's another criminal who evaded justice on a technicality, and it's particularly regrettable because four persons could have kept living if the law had been properly

These are only two recent examples. Almost anyone can recall other cases in which the suspect's guilt was obvious but he escaped justice on some trifling technicality which had no bearing whatever on his

Isn't it about time to do something about that? Isn't it rather absurd to free a criminal who is definitely known to be guilty just because some other person made a slight mistake? Anyone knows that this kind of boner does not lessen the criminal's guilt, and justice clearly is not served

by freeing him. The American legal system deserves our praise for its all out effort to be fair to the accused. But it also deserves our scorn when it excuses crime to compensate for an irregularity that isn't even related to the crime. Why not be realistic about the problem? Let there be some sort of reprimand for the person who violates the accused's rights, but let guilt or innocence still be determined by the evidence. After all, society is wronged every time a guilty person is excused and given the opportunity to seek another victim.

Why Abandon Free China?

Senator Henry Jackson (D- Dear Editor, Wash.) startled many of his admirers recently when he urged that the United States recognize "without delay" so many places to shop. I just Communist China and sever must move here. Now that I'm diplomatic relations with the Republic of China on Taiwan.

What struck many Washngton observers as more ridiculous was his recommendation that the U.S. should sever relations with the Republic of China, a staunch and loyal ally for decades. Surely, Jackson must rememper that Free China, at great sacrifice to herself, tied up over a million Japanese troops during World War II, thereby saving thousands of American lives. The Free Chinese stood by us when we needed them. Should we abandon them now?

The Senator also contradicted himself by urging the U.S. to sever "formal relations with the Republic of China - but maintain our commitments under the U.S.-ROC Treaty of 1954. Any country lawyer can see that the treaty would become null and void if we no longer recognized the "Republic of China."

Frankly, the Senator's suggestion just doesn't make much sense. After all, we recognize West Germany and yet no one has suggested that when and if we recognize East Germany we should "de-recognize West Germany. Similarly, we recognize South Vietnam but when and if we establish relations with North Vietnam, no one is likely to demand that we "de-recognize" the South.

Senator Jackson admitted that he did not expect the Nixon Administration to act on his suggestion. And with good reason. Mr. Nixon knows full well that we would gain nothing by building bridges to our enemies while burning them to our friends.



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

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

To avoid errors in deducting medical expenses on 1972 returns, Mr. Coppinger advised taxpayers to read the Form 1040 instructions carefully before filing.

A common error taxpayers made in reporting medical expenses is in deducting medicine and drug expenses. Texas Power & Light Company will spend \$171,433,000 for the construction of new facilities in 1973, J. F. Skelton, TP&L president, announced.

The construction budget is the largest in the Company's 61-year history, and expenditures will allow TP&L to keep pace with the growing electrical demands of customers in its 51-county service area.

A major portion of the expense is involved in the construction of seven major generating units. When completed over the next several years the new units will be capable Mrs. Henry Luke, 59, dies of producing some 5.7 million

The Rusk County and Titus County units will be owned jointly by TP&L, Dallas Power & Light Company and Texas Electric Service Company. The three companies also have two 1,150,000-kilowatt nuclear units in early planning stages. The units will be located near Glen Rose.

Another significant expenditure in 1973 will be the installation of additional fuel oil tanks at existing TP&L power plants.
