The point in the test case is: ... "Has the governor of Texas the power to pardon a man while his case is still pending before the appellate court'

Personal invitations to attend the hearing have been mailed by Chamthers to the district attorneys of Galveston, Houston; Dallas, Fort Worth, and other Texas cities. He requested that the newspapers extend invitations to all other district and county attorneys of the state to attend the hearing.






