





Any person who receives a social security check and attains age 65 in July 1973 or later will automatically be enrolled for both hospitalization and medical insurance under Medicare according to Gus Jones, Sherman Social Security District Manager.

Jones said this has always been true with respect to hospitalization coverage under Medicare. What is new is the automatic coverage for medical insurance . . . that part of Medicare which helps pay doctor bills, and, for which a monthly premium is paid by the beneficiary or deducted from his check if monthly benefits are being paid.

The change has been made to prevent an individual's loss or delay of entitlement to medical insurance coverage because of his failure to take timely, positive action. Of course a person can still decline medical insurance cov-

age by filing notice prior to the beginning of his coverage period and he will be considered not to have enrolled.



DALLAS - In the face of 1926, last year produced 9,804, unprecedented demand, Texas 973 barrels of oil at the rate tops among the nation's oil- 274,166,611 barrels. producing states and represented some 38-percent of total U. S. production, according to statistics compiled by the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

These figures show an increase of more than 67.8-million barrels over production in 1971. They reflect that during the last nine months of the year, the Texas Railroad Commission maintained a maximum efficient production rate for Texas fields. This marked the first time Texas wells had produced all-out since 1948.

> Last year's crude oil production, recorded in 203 of the state's 254 counties, was valued at some \$4.5 billion.

In 83 years of recorded production, Texas has produced nearly 37-billion barrels of oil, about 36-percent of total U. S. production.

Some 32 counties last year produced more than 10-million barrels of crude oil. The top half-dozen, all with production in excess of 50-million

Gregg County, the only Texas county to produce more than two-billion barrels of oil in the history of recorded production, remains the all-time leader with a cumulative production total of over 2.3-billion barrels.
