Hearing about this country's energy crisis, especially in relation to possible involvement in a Middle-East war, can scare a person stiff.

It's bad enough to think of high priced and rationed gasoline, of power shortages, and school and factory shutdowns in case of another severe winter. But imagine the predicament if we get mixed into the explosive Arab-Israel situation. We could suddenly find ourselves solidly in disfavor with the Arabs and cut off from our greatest source of import oil.

It would mean first of all that our total oil supply would diminish by a third. And domestic shortage would be compounded by the fact that so much would have to be assigned to national defense.

Demands of the military and essential industry, plus a minimum for home use, would exhaust all of the supply. We'd have to ride bikes and save the cars strictly for emergency use. We could find our electricity rationed, with recommendation to disconnect air conditioners. It could bring on a change to simple and rugged living.

Of course the worst is not inevitable. We could experience merely the pinch which is indicated by present circumstances. As stated in an energy crisis seminar at Sherman last week, it's already later than most of us think, and no solution is in sight.

The over-all energy demand already exceeds the supply, and projections indicate that demand will go up while supply goes down.

Theoretically some of the strain can be relieved by increasing oil imports. But that would worsen the balance of payments problem which is already unfavorable. From there on the Arabs could lose interest because they have more money than they need, or they might buy controlling interest in vital industries over here. Neither of those alternatives appeals to us.

Other relief can be attained by doing a number of things that should have been done before — that is, correcting a pack of boners that brought on the crisis. But they all need time whereas the demand-supply deficit is already under way.

The most urgent action is to get the oil flowing to us from North Alaska. A few years ago the nation cheered when an enormous oil field was discovered there, and it grieved about inability to move the oil away. Tankers had Arctic weather problems. A proposed big pipeline was stymied by environmental extremists.

The absurdity of that situation defies comprehension. Demanding assurance that the environment would not be violated, the obstructionists secured an injunction to halt the pipe line project. Common sense demanded that the objection be brushed aside with hardly a second thought. Why should anyone expect a pollution problem there when thousands of miles of pipe line criss-crossing the country are giving no trouble? Or, in case of trouble, can anyone imagine a more desirable place for it to happen? Well, the pipe line is finally okayed but lots of good time has been wasted and more good time will be needed.

Other official boners added to the crisis. Pinching down the alleged tax loophole on depletion allowance decreased exploration and marginal production, just as predicted. Investments decreased as returns decreased. Likewise price control on gas curtailed development because of declining profits. Meanwhile coal production declined because it could not compete with the cheap gas. At the same time ecology cranks intensified the problem by ruling out low grade coal with a high pollution level.

The solution there is two-fold. First let the gas producers raise the prices, then reduce pollution requirements from perfect to acceptable standards so that lower grade fuels can be used again. Needless to say gas will be less lavishly used when it costs more and still more of it will be conserved when more coal comes into use.

Also worthy of consideration are enormous deposits of low grade coal and lots of wastes and by products that can be processed into gas and oil.

Three Are Prospects For City Police Job

Three prospects for appointment to the Muenster City police were selected from some eight applicants by the city council at its meeting Monday night. Those three are to be interviewed after which the selection will be made.

Mayor David Bright urged the council to hire the lawman with as little delay as possible in order to give early attention to wild driving which has been disturbing the town. The man will be instructed to crack down on speeders and noise-makers.

Councilmen also chose May 30 as the meeting date of the tax equalization board which, as in recent years, will consist of the council members. As they review the tax rolls they'll prepare postal notices for all tax payers concerned and hold their tax hearing a few days later.

Delinquent taxes, too, received the council's attention. Agreeing that delinquents have had fair warning, aldermen instructed the city secretary to turn accounts over to their tax attorney, Julian Smith, for collection. Whoever ignores him will become subject to legal action.

Concerning garbage collection the council elected to adopt a program or abandon it without further delay. They will draw up specifications promptly on the duties involved in the service and ask

Jaycees Sponsor Motorcycle Races Sunday at Bulcher

At least 150 motorcycle riders from a radius of more than 300 miles will be roaring over the Prentiss Harris farm at Bulcher next Sunday in the Red River Enduro races sponsored by the Muenster Jaycees. It is the first endurance race over a track that has been popular with motorcycle riders for several months.

Danny Yosten, chairman, said the distance will be about 50 miles, winding through the rough country near Red River. Some of the track will allow bursts of speed but most of it will be slow. Average speed will be about 15 miles per hour.

Spectators will be welcome, at a charge of 50 cents each. They will get to see the latest in bikes and attire along with activity related to the race. However they will see very little riding because very little is visible from any one location. The take off and finish spots probably will have the most action.

Yosten said the race is scheduled to begin at 8 o'clock, depending on how many are entered. If the figure remains near the 150 now entered the start will be postponed to 9. But for a big field the time will remain at 8 o'clock. Spectators are reminded that it's almost completely a morning show.

The race is primarily an endurance event, as the name implies — and endurance is required of both the machine and the rider. It is held in five classes: for bikes to 100 cc, those of 101 to 175cc; from 176 to 250, over 250, and the powder puff class. And three trophies for each class plus a sweepstakes trophy will be awarded. Riders must be 21 years old or present notarized permit indicating permission from a parent or guardian.

The entire show, including concessions, is sponsored by the Muenster Jaycees as a benefit for a special charity project.

Seminar Reveals US Energy Crisis

"The county is in serious trouble and no solution is in sight" was the gloomy message given by Dr. John McKetta, University of Texas professor, to several hundred persons attending the Energy Crisis Seminar last week Wednesday at Grayson County College.

The event was sponsored by Texas Power and Light Co. to reveal the critical energy story to representatives of its extensive North Texas service area.

Dr. McKetta said that a number of senseless government policies had brought on the present predicament and the indication now is that our nation's supply of energy will never again be able to catch up with the demand.

Some of the official mistakes which brought on the trouble were listed as follows. The fixed low gas price which discouraged exploration and development while putting many coal fields out of business; tax policy discouraging exploration for oil; delayed approval of the Alaska pipeline; and extreme ecological demands which retard the production of energy while also consuming excessive amounts of it.

The result is that our supply of oil is far behind our production. A third of what we use is now imported and the situation would be desperate if it were cut off for any reason. Vast quantities of coal are untouched because the quality does not please ecology cranks. Also nuclear power development is retarded by fear of explosion and radiation.

Others on the program were Dr. Charles Jones of the ETSU physics department, James Patterson of American Oil Co, and Dr. James Connor of the Atomic Energy Commission.

Dr. Jones held out the hope that nuclear power development will soon accelerate and help the cause. Patterson suggested that the public can

Council Considers Type of Road to Replace Overpass

Details on the type of four lane road that will replace the present two lane overpass west of Main Street still have not been determined, but it isn't likely that the city will get the Maple Street crossing it originally asked for.

The original request about a year ago was to keep the road level high enough to allow the Maple Street crossing under it. The purpose was to provide a safe passage for children to the city park as well as a convenient road for vehicle traffic.

According to City Manager Steve Mosler, the highway engineers said the plan could be used provided the city of Muenster would provide the right of way. And that was the problem. A high level road allowing Maple to pass underneath would require a much wider right of way than the lower level road. That would require three business firms to make expensive moves thereby adding substantially to the right of way cost.

Accordingly the city seems resigned to the lower level road with Maple Street's intersection at the same level. And the next problem is whether to have a ground level pedestrian crossing for the kids or build a boarded in walkway crossing over the top.

Another alternative, suggested locally, is a culvert like pedestrian passage under the road provided it can fit into the city's budget and the state's plans. Feasibility of that method would depend on whether there will be sufficient fill in to raise the road level high enough to allow the passage below.

It has been pointed out also that right of way cannot be taken from the city park. Because of that a slight curve will be needed so that the additional road between Main Street and Elm bridge will have to be added at the north side of the present overpass.

Farmers Reaping Bumper Harvest Of Bailed Oats

Farmers around the community are making hay while the sun shines. And how! After weeks of intermittent rains they are putting in long days, making every effort to finish the job while weather permits.

Besides, they have plenty of inducement to go after this crop, which is one of the best ever in the area. As usual farmers are harvesting about half of their oats crop as hay, and getting a big yield of heavy bales. What's left for the combines looks equally good. Unless hit by bad weather or pests it gives promise of lots of bushels per acre.

The same applies to wheat. It's fine now and will be a bumper crop if all of it will stand for harvesting.

Unfortunately this doesn't apply to all of the area. Hundreds of acres which looked equally good were wiped out on April 24 by the most severe hailstorm of the community's history. A wide strip was completely destroyed.

The baling operation was under way last week but delayed by rains on Sunday, Wednesday and Friday. However weather has been fine since Friday, fields were ready Monday and work has been going at top speed since then.

Friday's rain measured .74 inch. The month's total now is 3.99 and the year's total 17.66.

He served as a chemical operator for American Cyanamid Co. in Fort Worth for 15 years. At age 42 he was declared totally disabled and had resided at Veterans hospitals since, two years at Lisbon and the past eight years at Bonham. He died there Friday.

And some of them, such as this one, have unusual names. Electrostatic precipitator. It's a protective guardian of the air you and your children breathe—a complex, mechanical giant being installed at Texas Power & Light Company's new lignite-fueled generating plants to safeguard the quality of the air—and your environment.

But it's only one of the guardian measures TP&L uses. Soil is reclaimed at lignite plants by sodding beneficial grasses in areas where lignite has been produced. Gas Company Asks R. R. Commission For Rate Increase

Lone Star Gas Company today announced that it filed an application with the Texas Railroad Commission Friday (May 11) for an increase in the city gate rate for gas delivered to each town served by the company in Texas.

The primary factors involved in Lone Star's application relate to the cost of maintaining an adequate gas supply for customers, and contracting for new supplies to meet growing consumer demands. The individual items included in the company's rate increase proposal are: (1) the right to recover costs and return of \$7.2 million associated with the firm's West Texas Gas Supply System, an approximate 400 mile large-diameter pipeline system for West Texas to the Dallas-Fort Worth area; (2) the right to recover costs and return of \$0.8 million on approximately \$9.6 million in advance payments and pre-payments the company thus far has made to

producers as a part of new gas purchase agreements; (3) to bring the company's weighted average cost of gas used in the Commission's calculation of Lone Star's base city gate rate up from the 16.29-cents per thousand cubic feet to the present level of 20.53-cents per thousand; (4) to allow Lone Star to "pass on" 100% of its increased cost of purchased gas on a monthly basis, rather than the presently allowed 65% every six months.

The cost adjustments would mean an 8.1-cent per thousand and cubic feet increase in the city gate rate, and an increase of \$10.5 million in Lone Star's annual revenues when costs are flowed through to customers, based on a 1972 volume of approximately 130 billion cubic feet.

The company further noted that all proposed rate increases are cost justified and within nationally established price control guide-lines for utilities established last year.

The story that when it rains on Easter it will rain the

following seven Sundays has been proven wrong. In the three Sundays following Easter it only rained here on one of those Sundays. True we had enough (over 3 inches) that day to make up for several weeks. It rained in Cooke County on one of the Sundays

when Muenster had no rain. Now if we can break the ground hog theory on winter — possibly the almanac will have to be reprinted.

In attending the past four City Council meetings we were favorably impressed by the conscientious approach given all problems, particularly on money matters. Some people complain about city tax being too high but when you see the cost of maintaining a city water department with its wells and miles of pipeline, a sewage plant also with miles of pipe plus mechanical installations that run twenty four hours a day, a street system that the wet weather damaged this winter and spring and the cost of building new streets and facilities to accommodate our city's growth, it makes us wonder how it can be done with the amount of money that is available.

Our city needs further improvements such as street repairs, better street lights and a garbage pick up. They will be handled in line with their importance and when funds are available.

One cost the city has and will have that could be avoided is police protection. The city is trying to find qualified people to fill those positions and it will cost from \$12,000 to \$15,000 per year.

A city the size of Muenster should not need two people carrying guns to maintain law and order. Except for the nuisance caused by those wild car and cycle drivers a semi-retired person could be our police.

Many of our citizens, wanting to be near church so they could walk to the services, built their homes on Main street and near the church property. Now night after night their sleep is disturbed by some punk showing off with his machine.
