Likewise price control on gas curtailed development because of declining profits. Meanwhile coal production declined because it could not compete with the cheap gas. At the same time ecology cranks intensified the problem by ruling out low grade coal with a high pollution level.

The solution there is twofold. First let the gas producers raise the prices, then reduce pollution requirements from perfect to acceptable standards so that lower grade fuels can be used again.
