Not many years ago electric companies had their promotion departments going constantly in suggesting ideas that might induce the customer to use more current. Now it's different. The promotion people are reminding customers how they can reduce their light bills. The motive here, of course, is to have us reduce the unnecessary use so that our limited supply of current can serve more people. We've reached the stage of straining our resources, so it's comforting to think that we are seeking ways to use them more efficiently.

Some of the recommendations are to turn off lights that are not in use; avoid frequent opening of refrigerator doors; turn off appliances when not in use; set the air conditioner thermostat just a few degrees higher; conserve on the use of any kind of heating appliance. The idea has lots of appeal on both sides. Lower electric bills will be welcome to the consumer, and help toward solving the energy crisis will be equally welcome to the power companies.

Appearances are that we are heading for a similar adjustment in our fuel supply. Small, economy cars are gaining in popularity as we hear about possible rationing and likely price increases in gasoline. Next they'll be urging us to reduce speed, avoid the unnecessary acceleration and braking, and stop the long idling periods so as to get more mileage out of gasoline.

We hope the ecology people will also join in the economy spirit by concentrating on engine improvement for more -complete fuel combustion instead of adding gadgets for treating the pollution from inefficient engines.
