Rapid Completion Of Forms Urged on 1978 Ag Census

AUSTIN — Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown urges Texas farmers and ranchers to complete and return all 1978 Farm Census reports as soon as they are received early next year. "The report forms which will be used for the 21st national agriculture census will take just one-third the time to complete as the old forms," Brown said. "Prompt completion of the forms will allow the U. S. Department of Agriculture to quickly and accurately compile this benchmark data for its current agricultural statistical series."

"In addition, this census is the only source of uniform data at the county level on agricultural production and inventories," he noted. "It is widely used across the nation by decision-makers in both the public and private sector."

Several changes have been made in the current census, and these are explained in full with the report forms. Completion of the forms is required under federal law. Brown also pointed out that all information submitted on the reports is confidential. Each producer is required to answer only those questions pertaining to his own operation.

SAVING TIPS

on electric heating

1. Keep heating equipment at top operating efficiency. Have it checked seasonally by qualified serviceman.
2. Set thermostat at 68° or lower. Lower to 50° - 60° if you'll be away several days.
3. Weatherstrip doors and windows; caulk cracks to prevent drafts and warm air loss.
4. Check the filter every 30 days on forced-air systems. If filter is permanent, clean it by manufacturer's directions; if it's disposable, replace if dirty.
5. Thorough home insulation keeps the warmth in, cuts energy use. Can pay for itself by lowering heating (and cooling) costs.
6. When fireplace is not in use, keep damper closed.
7. On sunny days open draperies, blinds to let in warmth of sun.
8. Open outside doors as little as possible.
9. Keep furniture, draperies away from air outlets and returns so air will flow easily. Clean often.

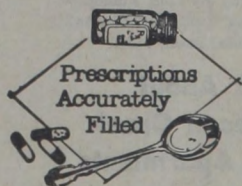

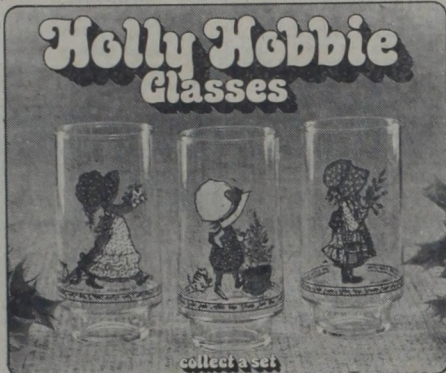

**Pointers Given on
Selection and Care
Of Christmas Tree**

Usually a major step toward the Christmas season is the purchase of a Christmas tree. There are several pointers to remember when making your selection and then caring for the tree.

It's important to get a tree that isn't too large for the allotted space, one that is well filled-out, and has a triangular shape. Check to see if the tree is fresh by shaking it. If only a few needles fall, you can be assured of its freshness, and the tree will maintain its appearance longer.

As soon as you get home, cut off about an inch from the butt end of the tree to facilitate moisture intake. This will help the tree maintain a fresh appearance. Put the butt end

of the tree in a container of water and store it in a cool, shady place until you are ready to bring it indoors.

Before bringing the tree inside, find a location where it will be away from heating vents, radiators, fireplaces, stoves and television sets. Use a tree stand that holds water. Because of the low humidity in most heated homes, the tree will need to be watered every day to keep the foliage fresh.

It's important to check the condition of the electrical cords and lights before putting them on the tree. A short in the wiring would cause a serious fire.

So, proper selection and care of your Christmas tree can help insure a safe Christmas. For safety sake, turn lights off when no one is home or when retiring.
