## Funeral Sunday For Jim Walker Of Marysville

Funeral services were held Sunday at 2:30 p.m. for James D. (Jim) Walker, 82, long-time Marysville resident who died early Friday in Lisbon Veterans Hospital in Dallas, after a short illness. For the past several years he had been a resident of a nursing home in Arlington.

The Rev. M. A. Thetford, pastor, officiated at Shiloh Baptist Church where Walker held membership and served as a deacon over 40 years. Scott Bros. Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

Bearers were members of Fish Creek Masonic Lodge of which he was a member.

Masonic graveside rites were conducted and military honors were accorded by Muenster VFW Post. Walker was a veteran of World War I.

Jim Walker was born Nov. 23, 1887, in Tennessee and was three years old when his parents Mr. and Mrs. C. S. Walker settled at Marysville. He was married there to Miss Essie Ramsey in 1920 and was a farmer-stockman until he retired from active work. For a number of years after his wife's death in 1952 he took care of his invalid mother until her death.

Surviving are three daughters, Mrs. Leona Corley of Bedford, Mrs. Renita Luttmere of Valley View and Mrs. Edith Webb of San Antonio; eight grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

### Reference to the start made by the national ancestors reminds us that their virtues are due the credit for our present national greatness.

Progress made by the country in the first three centuries after colonization was the most phenomenal of all history. US became the most powerful and the most progressive nation of the world. But it's been slipping lately. Too many people are more concerned with pay than doing a good job, trying to get more out of society than they give, demanding rights but ignoring duty.

Charles Shuman, national president of the Farm Bureau, presented an alarming question on that subject to the organization's convention Monday. He asked whether official eagerness to help the poor might result in even more poverty, eventually leading to a national crisis. The high standard of living proposed for unfortunate people is a temptation to lazy people. As the incentive to work declines, and production drops accordingly, we can encounter serious problems of supply and demand.

The man has a vital point, and there can be no doubt that the nation is inviting serious problems. Charity is admirable where it is deserved but it is a tragic mistake where it is not deserved. Every person who shirks his obligation becomes a burden on the economy whereas he should be helping support it. Responsible people have to take on too much of a load in addition to their own.

When President Nixon proposed his welfare program he stated that the principal objective is to discourage loafing by making work more rewarding. One wonders whether that difference is enough. There are many able bodied people willing to live on less so long as they don't have to work. And now that there's talk of more generous handouts many more will be inclined not to work.

There ought to be a system of providing decent subsistence and comfort to people who need help, but also a hard bodied policy of denying handouts to able bodied loafers. Our national leaders need to realize that the old time qualities of diligence, integrity, thrift, and morality made this country what it is, and

## Belcher Indicted By Grand Jury For Bank Robbery

The Cooke County Grand Jury last Friday indicted Jimmy Lee Belcher of Sanger for the armed robbery of Muenster State Bank on November 25.

Date for his trial was not set. Meanwhile his bail of \$25,000 continues and he remains in the Cooke County jail.

Belcher is charged with robbing the Muenster bank of about \$25,000 shortly after 2 o'clock on November 25. About a half hour later he was arrested near Slidell following a high speed chase and exchange of gunfire in which he was slightly wounded. The stolen money was recovered in his car.

## Local Blood Bank To Open Wednesday

People of Muenster and surrounding area will make their first deposit in the newly established local blood bank next Wednesday, December 17.

They will make their donations from 2 to 6 p.m. at the Knights of Columbus hall in a bloodmobile from the Red River Blood Center of Wichita Falls, which is a part of the nation wide Red Cross blood bank system.

The bloodmobile visit is sponsored jointly by the local KC council and the VFW post. Originally the KC council was sole sponsor but it has recently accepted an offer of help from the VFW post, which endorsed the program unanimously at its last meeting. The principal function of sponsors is to recruit blood donors. Goal of the two organizations for Wednesday is at least 100 pints. That amount is regarded as adequate

for the community for more than two years.

The Red Cross blood bank system is recommended especially for its financial saving to persons of the area who need blood transfusions. Blood they will receive from the bank will have been donated by local people so it does not need to be paid for. The only charge is for services of processing and distribution by the blood bank center and administrative charge by the hospital. The cost of a transfusion will be about half what it was before.

That saving becomes available to residents of the Muenster Hospital District and any other patients of the Muenster Hospital. Residents of the district are entitled to the service whether or not they are in the local hospital. For instance, a person receiving a transfusion elsewhere could have the blood replaced by the local bank instead of paying for it.

Eligibility also applies to persons not living in the district who are patients of Muenster Hospital and are transferred to other hospitals for special treatment or surgery.

Sponsors of the bloodmobile visit are emphasizing this feature of the program. They recommend that people donate with the idea of providing blood for themselves or family members or friends, knowing that the help applies wherever it is needed. Substantial savings will result for all local people who need blood.

Chairman of the local program is J. W. Fisher, representing the Muenster KC council, the sponsoring organization. Administration of the blood bank account is assigned to David Bright, administrator of the local hospital. He will record transfusions in the hospital, also authorize and record withdrawals from the bank to replace the blood used by other hospitals in transfusions to eligible persons.

The blood bank likewise has a definite financial value to the hospital. Formerly it paid a stocking fee of \$1 per pint per day for unused blood, which amounted to about \$2,000 a year. The new system eliminates that charge.

Muenster Hospital has been operating on the Red Cross system since December 1, receiving its blood on credit. After next Wednesday it will be able to draw on its own blood account.

## Muenster Loses 13-0 To Celina in Regional

History repeated itself last Friday night when the Muenster Hornets had their dream of a regional trophy shattered for the second time by Celina's mighty Bobcats.

Again it was a matter of too much power and too much speed. The Bobcats put together a scoring drive in each of the first two quarters and then coasted through the next two periods for their 13-0 victory.

Actually they were not coasting. They kept up the pressure to the end, but Hornet defense was more successful in its effort. Almost all of the two periods were played on Muenster's side of the mid-field stripe and the Bobcats were stopped on the 1, the 28, the 6 and the 10. In first downs for the second half the teams were tied at four each whereas Celina made 9 and Muenster none in the first half.

Despite the loss, Hornet coaches and fans were proud of the game. They realized that Celina's team was mostly the same outfit that mauled last year's Hornets 40-0. It features a group of boys who had won the state Class B track title last year, including a backfield which was first in the state in the 440 relay. Considering the odds, the loss by just 13-0 compares favorably with the Hornets' previous list of wins.

Hopes of the Hornets had been lifted by their encounter with the Bobcats early in the season. They lost that one 32-14, however they outplayed and outscored Celina in the last three quarters. Their intention was to carry on as they had ended the other game. But Celina had other ideas, which were indicated in the opening minutes of play.

Bobcats received the kickoff and promptly launched a touchdown drive from their own 28. Peterman, Vest, Tolleson and Hampton ground

out steady gains that gobbled up the 72 yards in 15 plays. Tolleson went over from the 2 and Vest missed his kick for extra point.

Longest gain of the drive was 12 yards, which was only slightly less than the best runs of the night for the Bobcats. The Hornets did a superb job of hustling to deny the speed-pack a single break-away run and limiting the gains over ten yards to about a dozen. Vest had runs of 14 and 13, Hampton went for 16, Peterman made 12 and 13 Cody made 10. Longest play of the game was a pass from Peterman to Pell for 22.

The clock read 4:45 as the first score was marked up. After that neither team was able to move until early in the second quarter. Muenster lost possession on three punts and a fumble. Celina lost possession on a fourth and 1 gamble, a fumble and a kick. Then the Bobcats got organized again. With 85 yards to go they advanced 40 on seven ground plays before Hornet defense held for two downs. Then fate smiled on Celina as Pell juggled a pass and finally held on for a gain of 22.

Two plays later Vest crashed through for 12 yards to the 9 but fumbled as he was brought down.

The rain soaked field plus a misty drizzle through much of the game was a definite

handicap to both teams. It had a bearing on four Celina fumbles. It combined with Celina's tight pass defense to give the Hornets lots of passing problems. The slick ball also had a bearing on the Hornet fumble just two plays after Celina, allowing the Bobcats to finish the drive which had just been interrupted.

The ball was recovered on the 4 and Celina crashed into the line three times to get the score. Hampton made the last yard and Vest kicked an extra point.

Just before the half the Bobcats threatened a gain when Tolleson intercepted on the 21. However the next series made just two yards.

Starting the second half the Hornets kicked on first possession and Celina moved a gain. Four runs in a row gained 47 to the 1 then a holding penalty moved the ball back 15 yards. A try for field goal failed there and the game developed into a standoff.

The Hornets got their first first down after that but had to punt on the next series. Celina kicked to end the series. Then Muenster put on its best offensive effort of the night. A run by John Monday and two by Hennigan gained 13 to the Hornet 39. A pass to Robert Bruns gained 7 and one to Earl Koelzer added 13 and Muenster was past mid-field for the first time. That was at the 41. The drive ended with an interception four plays later.

Celina failed to gain and kicked on fourth down, the ball taking a Bobcat bounce and stopping a foot from the Hornet line. Three short gains from there made 6, and a punt plus a clipping penalty set Celina back to the 45.

The penalty was too much to overcome. Muenster got possession on the 28 and promptly reached the 45 on

## Innocent Until Found Guilty

The "instant experts" are already at work painting verbal pictures in psychedelic colors of the alleged My Lai massacre. The extreme left has been quick to use the incident for the lowest of political motives, in order to attack the administration, the United States, the military and nearly everyone in sight. This despite the scant concrete bit of news, that the incident

took place on March 16 of 1968, and that an Army Lieutenant has been charged, under the new administration, with the murder of South Vietnamese villagers. This is indeed a serious charge, and therefore a legitimate newsworthy story.

But what disturbs us is that certain elements of the Press have, in print and on the air, tried, convicted and condemned the accused without the slightest regard for the fundamental American rule

that a man, any man, and no matter how strong the evidence may appear to be against him, is to be considered innocent until proven guilty, by law. "Witnesses" have been interviewed—but not under oath, and therefore not subject to the penalties of perjury should their stories be false. So far as we can tell, no effort has been made to determine whether the alleged "witnesses" may not in fact be members of the Communist apparatus, and hence eager to condemn by falsehood, if necessary.

One writer, in the WASHINGTON POST, having reached the "verdict", declared: "The government shouldn't get away with sentencing a handful of men, and letting the others escape. . . . The others . . . include Lyndon Johnson, Hubert Humphrey, Walt Rostow, the Bundys, and all the rest, Democrats and Republicans, from three different Administrations, and seven Congresses. Throw in the people who make napalm, M-16, and the other instruments of liberation, and we might have a trial that is logical and goes after the real villains. I know just the place to hold it. It's a town called Nuremberg".

This is irresponsible journalism at its worst. As (we hope and pray) responsible journalists, we condemn such lynch-mob hysteria. This is just the sort of abuse of freedom of the press to which Vice President Agnew has publicly complained.

As yet, the accused have not been given the benefit of trial. They have not been found guilty, and therefore are to be considered innocent. Let us have no hangings by the news media, or in our own hearts and minds.

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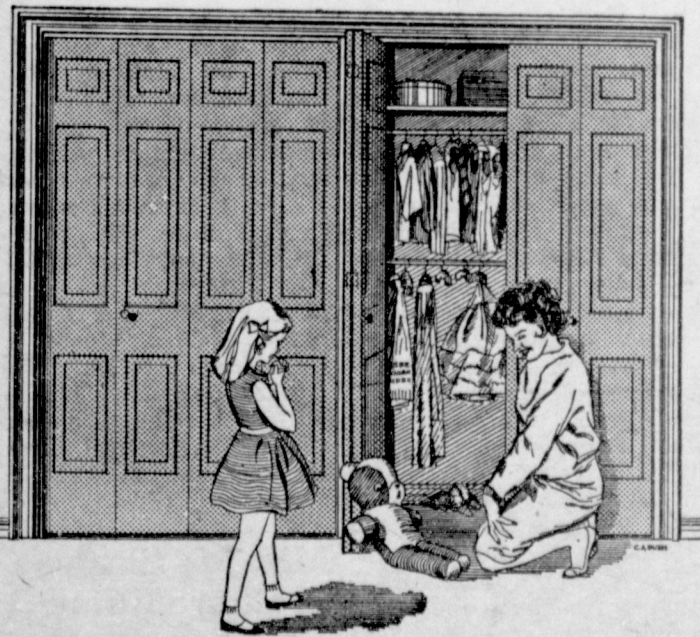
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## Yule Shoppers Warned to Beware of Auto Thieves

Christmas shoppers should take every precaution to protect their packages and automobiles from thieves, warns the National Automobile Theft Bureau.

C. C. Benson, manager of the southwestern division of the NATB, said that Christmas shoppers who leave their cars unlocked and packages in the back seat are leaving an open invitation to thieves of all kinds.

"Car thieves frequently prowl shopping centers and other such areas where shoppers are likely to leave cars unlocked and keys in ignitions while they run inside stores to make quick purchases," said Mr. Benson.

During the holiday season the thief not only has more cars to pick from, but often can find a car filled with packages. Thus, he can get two birds with the same stone - - the car and the packages - - and have an early Christmas, observed the NATB official.

Mr. Benson said shoppers should lock all packages in the trunks of their cars when the automobiles are unoccupied. Over 60 per cent of the cars stolen had been left unlocked and over half of these were left with keys in the ignition.

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## The 'Doves' Prolong the War

Congressional "doves" are up in arms over a taped television interview and a 30-minute film made by the Republican National Committee involving a former Special Forces Major, James Rowe. Major Rowe was a prisoner of war, held captive by the Communist Viet Cong for over five years.

In his statements the Major declared that his cover story to his captors was "blown" when an unnamed U. S. "peace" group turned over his biography to his Red captors. The AP story failed to note if the doves ever questioned what "peace group" endangers our American soldiers now being held by the Communists.

Major Rowe incurred the wrath of the "doves" by stating that the American POWs, to quote the AP release, "largely ignored Hanoi's propaganda until late 1967 when it began quoting U. S. senators by name and citing U. S. newspaper, magazine and news agency reports of anti-war demonstrations." Rowe specifically mentioned statements by Sens. Fulbright (D-Ark.), Chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee, George McGovern (D-S. D.) and Mike Mansfield (D-Mont.). "The peace demonstrators and the disheartening words of these senators made our life most difficult," was Major Rowe's testimony before the House Armed Services Committee. It helped to break the spirits of Americans and boost the morale of the Viet Cong.

We can well understand the reason for the uproar. It is one thing to have it said here that the tactics of the peace at any price advocates are prolonging the war and endangering the safety of our men in the field. It is another thing to have it said by one who has paid the price of defeatism.

## Scholastic Greenbacks

Education, like everything else, may be in for revamping in the months and years ahead - - if a "Black Paper", recently published by a group of British educationists, psychologists, publicists and parents, relative to the status of education in England, may be taken as a general criteria. It charges that the standard of education in British schools is lower than it was in 1914. Blame for this state of affairs is laid, by inference, at the door of the U. S. educational system, which has proceeded on the theory that children learn better when discipline in the schools is relaxed. In Britain, this "progressive" educational philosophy seems to have had discouraging results. The average attainments in reading, spelling and mechanical and problem arithmetic are now appreciably lower than they were 55 years ago. Reading standards are poor, not only among school children but also among teachers. As a result of progressive education, the "Black Paper" reports that up to 25 per cent of college-level students are semiliterate. Many British industrialists say, to their dismay, that even some university graduates are unable to spell properly when they take jobs.

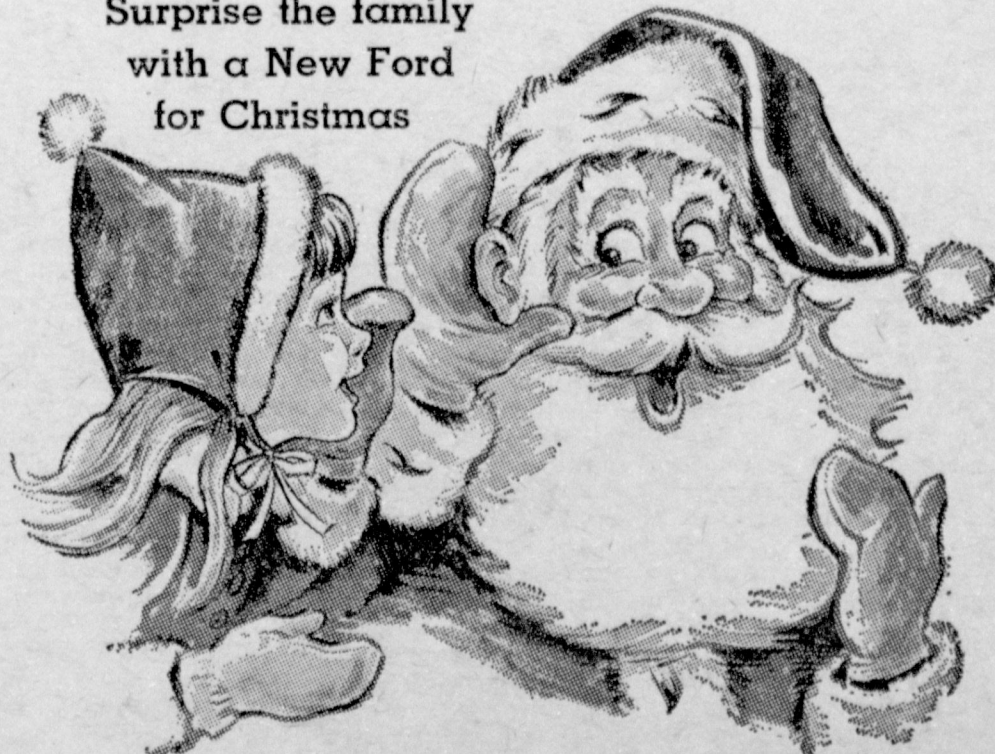

**Observe the Right Way to Decorate Christmas Trees**

Martin Luther generally is credited with first using candles to decorate Christmas trees, and since his time people have been burning down their houses with unsafe Christmas tree practices.

There are right and wrong ways to go about decorating a tree, warns the Texas State Department of Health. The right way is the safe way.

Only freshly cut trees should be used. Saw off the trunk at an angle about an inch or more above the original cut and erect the tree so it stands in water.

Locate the tree away from sources of heat to prevent more rapid drying. Keep it away from exits and remove it as soon as possible after the holiday.

Wax candles should never be used on or near the tree. Use only lighting sets that bear the Underwriters' Laboratories (UL) label -- not just the cords -- and use them only for their intended purpose. Discard any lamp wiring that is frayed or badly worn.

Unplug the lights when not in the house or when going to bed.

Avoid overloading circuits. A 15 amp fuse should be the maximum used. Metallic trees should not be decorated with electric lights. Instead, use off-the-tree spot or flood lighting.

Keep trains, road racing sets and other electrical toys away from the tree. Sparks or short circuits could start a fire.

Use flame retardant flock in order to reduce the fire hazard. Sprayed-on, flame-retardant treatments by homeowners generally are not practical since effective application is difficult.

If you buy a plastic or metallized plastic trees, make certain that the materials burn slowly. If decorated with lights, determine that the branches do not conduct electricity before you make the purchase. Again, select only those that have the UL label.

Trees are the focal point for holiday decorating, but safety should come before -- or go along with -- beauty.

**SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS**

There are many areas of old cropland and fields and overgrazed pastures in this area that are actively eroded and almost covered with gullies. Not only are these areas out of production, they are sore sites to the eye.

To establish these areas to a planned vegetation, shaping is necessary so farm equipment can be used in cultural operations such as seedbed preparation, seeding, sodding, mowing and spraying. There must be a stable outlet or stopping place for the shaping. This may be accomplished with a natural outlet where the gullies grade out on a flat area or by a mechanical outlet such as a drop inlet, erosion control dam or a diversion terrace.

The cost of shaping varies with the depth of gully and size of the area to be smoothed. Usually, the shaping cost runs from \$75.00 to \$100.00 per acre for heavy shaping to as low as \$20.00 per acre for light shaping. Cost of establishing vegetation ranges from \$20.00 to \$35.00 per acre depending on methods used and amount of fertilizer applied. A cost of \$100.00 per acre amortized over a period of 20 years at 6% interest makes yearly cost of \$8.72 per acre. Increased benefits from grazing, plus beautification and increased capital investment makes this small annual cost seem nominal.

Establishing a cover on these areas will be affected by the intensity of grazing. Limited grazing of vegetation during the establishment stage is often beneficial in controlling competitive weeds and shrubs. Overgrazing will seriously hinder establishment. Careful management of grass is a must after establishment.

Your local Soil Conservation Service technician can help you plan the needed treatment of these critical areas. For cost-share assistance, contact your local ASC Office.
