## Muenster Is Host For Soil Awards Banquet May 13

For the second time in recent years my routine has been rudely interrupted by an emergency visit at the Muenster Hospital. So, this is a second experience which merits expression of deep appreciation for a fine institution.

As before, the nearness of the hospital was its first blessing. Getting attention in distress was only a matter of minutes. After that, getting relief needed only a few more minutes. Since then everything has been fine. I'm here for observation and rest, more a guest than a patient. Just living it up. Illness was never more pleasant than this.



Rather than attempt a column this week I'm abiding by professional advice to take it easy. However, a subject very much on my mind is the one which has been very much in the news. And my sentiments are well expressed by an article in this week's release of U.S. Press Association, entitled "The Letter of the Law." Here it is.

The harsh verdict in the case of Lt. William L. Calley Jr. is certain to be a matter of hot dispute for a long time. Equally noteworthy is the overwhelming public support for Lt. Calley, running at about 100 to 1. A few thoughts on the matter would appear to be in order.

First, it is abundantly clear that the six-man military jury, in reaching its verdict, adhered to a strict, relentless interpretation of "the letter of the law," which was their right and maybe even their duty. From ancient times, mankind has endeavored (without much success) to "civilize" warfare.

The famous Dutch legal genius, Hugo Grotius (1583-1645) observed some 350 years ago that the laws of nations had, even at that time, "condemned" the use of assassins to kill an enemy. Yet the Communist aggressors in South Vietnam routinely hurl hand grenades into crowds of civilian shoppers, theatres and restaurants.

Thousands of loyal government workers have been openly assassinated, kidnapped and tortured by the Vietcong. Clearly, the "laws of war" are not observed by the enemy. More than that, the "doves" in America make no demands that the perpetrators of these heinous crimes against civilians should be brought to justice.

The sense of outrage felt by the American people, it seems to us, stems directly from this blatant "double standard," one rule for us, another for the Red invaders. Thus, Senator J. William Fulbright, powerful chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, sanctimoniously suggests that the "war crimes principles developed at Nuremberg" should be used against Presidents Johnson and Nixon, and against Generals Creighton W. Abrams and William C. Westmoreland. But there was no suggestion on his part that the same rules apply to Communist General Vo Giap, or Mao Tse Tung, or the Communist international rulers Kossygin and Brezhnev. As usual, his "rules" are applied selectively - against the United States, but never against the enemy.

Or what about Senator George McGovern, whose public utterances have been considered so favorably by the Communist enemy that they have been used consistently for the brain-washing, the mental torture of our American prisoners held by the Vietcong in North Vietnam? Is not the "letter of the law" to apply to those who give "aid and comfort" to the enemy? Campus "revolutionaries" openly flaunt the law while college administrators close their eyes or look the other way. Rapists and murderers and killers and

## Felderhoff Is Mayor; Herr, Miller Favored

Arthur Felderhoff is Muenster's new mayor coasting into the office without opposition in Saturday's election to succeed Mayor Mike Sloan who did not seek re-election.

Balloting was mostly routine as voters were required to make only one selection in electing members on three local and one county board.

Herbert Miller won the only race, that for re-election on the city council Place 3 polling

135 votes to 40 for Earl Walterscheid. Felderhoff drew 156 votes for mayor and Albert Herr polled 158 votes for Post 5 on the city council. He succeeds Gene Hoedebeck who did not run for re-election. A total of 179 persons voted.

Three incumbents and one new director were elected to serve on Muenster Memorial Hospital District. They are Alphonse Felderhoff and Incumbents Jimmy Jack Biffle, Paul Fetsch and Alois Trubenbach. The votes were: Felderhoff, 186; Biffle, 174; Fetsch, 173; Trubenbach, 172.

Ray Wilde and Robert Bayer were re-elected to the local school board without opposition. Doyle Selby, precinct 3, and Alphonse Felderhoff, precinct 4, were unopposed for the county school board.

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## The Big Word

The following editorial written by Dick West of the Dallas Morning News, was judged the best in a nationwide contest sponsored by the Southern States Industrial Council.

MISSING in most year-end dispatches about American business and the economy is the biggest word in our unique system — profit.

Columns have been written about the Gross National Pro-

duct (GNP) passing the trillion-a-year mark on the final Tuesday of 1970. Other stories detail the figures on sales and on physical expansion. Employment, of course, gets its share of attention.

But these indices are meaningless, unless the profit picture is healthy.

In the free-enterprise system, there is neither enterprise nor freedom without profit.

Sales can top all records, but they mean nothing unless the producer and seller can put aside something for the future.

When Germany suffered runaway inflation in the early 1920's, its GNP jumped from billions of marks to the sextillions in a few months, but the country was broke. The profit structure was shattered, and the economic predicate was laid for Hitler.

IT IS PROFIT that gives our national security the muscle to resist dictatorship aggression.

It is profit that gives 80 million people regular jobs.

It is the expectation of profit — another word is incentive — which distinguishes our system and becomes the energizer of our life-stream.

It is profit — and profit only — which provides charity, philanthropy, education and support for the exercise of religious freedom.

Without profit, there can be no personal independence, no ownership of property, no castle which a man calls home, no savings — and worst of all, no freedom of choice or the courage to devise it.

It is profit which enemies of our system — from Karl Marx to Kossygin — would like to destroy. But, ironically, most of them have turned to incentive schemes which are imitation of ours. They turned, reluctantly, because they had to.

THE MOST SHOCKING trend in America is the current tendency to downgrade profits: To pinch, squeeze and siphon them away. The very word has become a stigma.

The academic community sneers at it. A national poll shows that 85 per cent of us who live under it do not understand it. Organized labor, in its annual demands, attack it — yet the individual worker in a business is the one who stands to gain the most from it.

Khrushchev sneeringly predicted that the Russian system would bury us. And it will, unless we readjust those forces — such as confiscatory taxes — which assure a stable profit structure to the smallest hamburger stand as well as General Motors.

The heart of every individual and economic system is the desire to achieve. Without desire, without motivation, life is meaningless.

## Don't You Believe It

For the doom-sayers and those who despair rather than face up to the admittedly complex problems of the day, it has become a thing of fashion to murmur that every civilization must rise and it must fall.

Seeking a parallel in antiquity, they explain that the Western world in general and the tighter world of America in particular are caught up in the pattern of the decline, the decay and the fall of the old Roman empire.

Don't you believe it — at least as far as America is concerned. Our civilization is not the civilization of that Rome of old. One chief difference, it would appear, is that both ownership of property and the possession of wealth are widely distributed in this America of ours.

When there began the breakup of the old Roman empire, there were two huge, proletarian strata — slaves and near-slaves — who were utterly devoid of personal wealth or even modest possessions. Most of the people of that empire at that time owned nothing, and had little to lose if the "establishment" of the day came unglued.

Americans generally have a stake, a property stake if you please, in society. They own homes, land, automobiles, deep freezers, television sets, a myriad of things. We hear much about today's "poor" in America. By the standards of the historic past and some of today's present elsewhere, many of America's "poor" are well off in comparison.

When the revolutionaries, the real ones and the phoney ones alike, talk of doing away with the American "establish-

## That It May Be the Last!

In an interview with the press, President Nixon has said that the war in Viet Nam is ending, and added, "In fact, I seriously doubt if we will ever have another war. If this is to happen, it is imperative that the moral force of world opinion be brought to bear to compel humane treatment of U.S. prisoners of war, held under diabolically cruel conditions in the stockades and penitentiaries of North Viet Nam.

The Reader's Digest, in its April issue, has sought to mobilize public opinion and generate an upsurging public protest in the form of millions of signed statements to be delivered through the American Red Cross to the government of North Viet Nam. The Digest article, entitled "Inside the Prisons of Hanoi", should be read by every American. It is a report of actual POW conditions as described by some of the men who have been released and by informed sources in Washington, Saigon and Paris. It describes such conditions as prisoners being caged or tethered like animals so that villagers could file past to strike them or urinate on their bodies. It speaks of constant hunger, steady weight loss, nausea and fever. It describes the horror and hopelessness of the "Hanoi Hilton", an old French penitentiary, in which prisoners are kept in tiny cement-walled, heavily-barred cells and sleep on cement slabs, isolation from other human contact, the numbing cold, or rough boards stretched across sawhorses. Progressive starvation, isolation from other human contact, the numbing cold, lack of medical care for wounds, as well as illnesses or injuries contracted during captivity, are part of the picture.

The Geneva Conventions, to which Hanoi is a signatory, "... require repatriation of the sick and wounded, as well as the release or transfer to a neutral nation of men whose long confinement jeopardizes their health." Hanoi continues to break every rule in the book by its treatment of the 781 men captured and missing in North Viet Nam. Also, Viet Cong and communist forces in South Viet Nam and Laos have failed to even identify almost 800 other Americans captured or missing in these areas. As The Digest article points out, some of the POW's have already died, others face almost certain death unless their treatment is drastically improved.

The following statement appeared in The Reader's Digest. Every American can help by signing it, with or without his own personal message, and sending it immediately to "Help Our POW's", American Red Cross, P. O. Box 1600, Washington, D. C. 20013. The results will be tabulated, and the messages will reach the government of North Viet Nam. Massive pressure of world disapproval is the one hope that U.S. prisoners of war in North Viet Nam have, and expressing his indignation is the one step that every American can take to assure that for this nation the long war in Southeast Asia does end with honor and that it may indeed be "the very last one."
