The answer to this country's economic prayers is in boosting production by just 5 per cent. So says Dr. George Benson, president of the National Education Program, who claims that this simple process could double the national output, also double everybody's standard of living, within fifteen years.

It seems like quite a claim. Imagine a 100 per cent increase on the return by giving only a five per cent increase on effort. But mathematically it works out. Sort of like figuring compound interest on investment. Obviously five per cent increase for 15 years amounts to 75 per cent, and there's the additional potential that is created by each year's production of more wealth.

Moreover, that five per cent goal seems to be well within the national capability. A big part of it could be reached simply by an understanding which would eliminate strikes. More of it could be reached by greater caution, thereby eliminating lost time due to accidents on the job or the road, or sickness caused by one's own folly. Still more of that productivity could be attained by alertness on the job to avoid mistakes and loss of time. As we think over the subject we feel convinced that the imagined bonanza is well within our reach if all of the country will wise up to the opportunity and then pull together.

Of course all that will take a lot of doing. First of all we need to launch an educational campaign that will wipe out much if not all of the socialistic and anarchistic notions that have infected our economy in recent times. We have to realize that our past greatness was built on our attitude of ambition, cooperation and hard work in an atmosphere of free enterprise.

Somehow the people of America must be convinced again that we really have the right system and we really can move forward if we'll understand the basic principles of the system and work honestly at applying them.

Too few people nowadays realize that industry has three essential elements: capital, management and labor. Neither can get along without the others, and no two can get along without the third. Capital is the investment in plant, equipment, material, operating funds etc. Management includes the people who do the planning, secure materials, supervise the manufacturing process and sell the finished products. Labor includes those who work on the materials to make the finished products as directed by management.

Anyone who gives it some thought can understand that the three elements need one another and can get along harmoniously when each gets its fair share — and the net result for the country is a more prosperous, more comfortable and happier society.

So the first step toward the better life is education, to overcome the false ideas that have been planted in people's minds in recent years and to replace them with firm conviction and firm confidence.

For instance, school kids need to be told that ours is not a slave system in which the greedy capitalists are exploiting the workers. They need to understand that investors have a right to an earning on the money they risk to buy plants and equipment. Furthermore that the investors are not really pot bellied plutocrats but millions of average people who own stocks. Furthermore that capital does not get the lion's share of industry's income but a mere 6 to 10 percent which serves both as dividend and as re-investment.

From this fact we arrive at the very obvious fact that the big share from industrial earning already goes to labor and when demands are made for higher pay the raise can come from only one of two sources. Either productivity has to increase or the amount of the raise has to be added to the price of the finished product.

And then we come to the problem of inflation, which has been the country's big economic headache for the past three decades. As prices go up the consumers need more income, so they demand more pay and give another nudge to the inflation spiral. Obviously it's time to turn to that other source for increase of pay. Raises should be based (Continued on page 8)

## Work Begins on Phone Company's Modernizing Job

Muenster Telephone Company's expanding and modernizing project got under way Wednesday morning. The job, which is scheduled for completion in mid-October, will bring 1-line service to all of its patrons in Muenster, Myra and Forestburg and also bring the convenience of direct distance dialing in the three communities.

Actually the job's kick-off date was Tuesday. That's when the owners, contractor, engineer and REA representative held a meeting to discuss and plan their work. Owners of the firm are Alvin Fuhrman, W. J. Miller and Alphonse Hoenig. Fuhrman said the job consists principally in installing 176 miles of underground phone cable in the rural area and replacing or adding about five miles of overhead cable in the city. Four plow crews are in operation with M. E. Spencer Jr. as foreman for the K & B Construction Company of Tulsa.

The resident engineer representing the phone company is Kenneth Kildiene. Also on the job for the company is its regular line crew member, Charles Cook. While the work is under way, Fuhrman said, Muenster's population will increase by about twelve families.

The modernization also includes a separate contract for inside work at the system's exchanges. It will start later but is expected to be finished about the same time as the outside contract.

## Big Response Urged For Blood Bank Day

Residents of the Muenster Hospital District and others served by the Muenster Memorial Hospital will make another deposit next Wednesday in their Red Cross blood bank.

The occasion is a visit to the community by a bloodmobile from the Red River Regional Red Cross Blood Center of Wichita Falls. Facilities for donating blood will be set up at the K. of C. Hall from 2 to 7 p.m. The hours this year start later and end later than at the previous visit as an accommodation to people who want to come after work.

Those who have a tight schedule will have another convenience in being able to donate at a time of their choice and avoid waiting in line. They can phone the hospital for an appointment at a specific time.

Recommended ages for blood donations are 18 through 65. Under age persons will need the consent of a parent or guardian. Over age persons are expected to have written approval from their personal physicians.

The bloodmobile staff will include five registered nurses and technicians from the blood center. They will be assisted by four local nurses who will check on physical qualifications and medical records of the volunteers and six or eight Hospital Auxiliary members for registrations and serving coffee and doughnuts.

## Installing Starts At Western Auto

Installation of the Western Auto department at Hess Furniture started a week early. A representative of the company reported on the job bright and early Monday morning, instead of next Monday, so the department, scheduled to open on July 1, will open about a week earlier.

## William Pitman on ETSU Honor Roll

William D. Pitman is one of 904 students named to the spring Dean's List at East Texas State University. The list, ETSU's special honor roll includes undergraduates doing at least 15 hours of academic work and maintaining a grade point average of at least 3.25 out of a possible 4.

The local program is sponsored jointly by the VFW Post and the K of C Council with J. W. Fisher as community chairman. Their quota, normally set at 100 pints, has been upped to 120 in order to compensate for abnormally high usage during the past year. Patients in the local hospital used 117 units and additional units were transferred to local residents in other hospitals, particularly Larry Yosten and Mrs. Joe Hoenig.

Another incentive for the higher quota was pointed out in a letter from the regional center to Chairman Fisher. It stated that the Wichita Falls facility has been running short lately and has had to have blood shipped from St. Louis and Detroit. The center is most eager to keep its area adequately supplied and avoid future dependence on other areas, as well as to replenish the blood it has borrowed. That can be accomplished, the letter said, if each area will work a little harder to reach its quota.

Locally that special effort got under way this week in a letter campaign to many who drew on the local bank last year as well as to a number of relatives and friends of those who received. Also about three dozen placards are set up here and at Saint Jo asking people to come and give.

The letters invite people to return the blood used by themselves or a relative or friend and to specify in whose name it is given. It also mentions the probability that some of the donors will actually be giving for their own future need.

The sponsors are trying for 150 volunteers of which, according to normal procedure, 80 per cent will be accepted as donors. That will meet the quota of 120 pints, however not as much as is wanted. Sponsors would like to go over the top by a stout figure.

Membership in the Red Cross blood bank is big asset to the people of this community. It provides an efficient and economical system for blood transfusions to patients of the Muenster hospital and to residents of the hospital district who happen to be in other hospitals.

There is no charge for the blood they use, because it is given by local people for local people. The only cost is for service which covers collecting, packaging, storing, transporting, typing, infusing, etc. That means that the actual cost per unit to the patient is \$25 to \$30 below normal. At the same time the hospital saves about \$150 per month in stocking fees.

The blood bank system includes a number of areas with bloodmobile visits scheduled so that fresh blood is always available. Each community in its turn furnishes the blood for all the others.

The age limit allowed for use as fresh blood is 21 days. After that it is processed into plasma and other blood products.

## Area Farmers Are Eligible for USDA Drought Relief

In his regular weekly report to Texans last week, Senator John Tower included a list of counties in which farmers and ranchers are eligible for federal drought relief.

Farmers and ranchers of Cooke and Denton Counties and 145 other Texas counties are eligible for hay transportation assistance and Commod-

ity Credit Corporation owned feed grains at reduced prices. The Agriculture Department has ruled that the new hay bank program can be effective now in that farmers growing forage on irrigated set aside lands may put up hay from 25 per cent of their set aside acreage or 25 acres, whichever is greater, and may use or sell that hay immediately without penalty. The hay must be grown, put up, used and sold within the drought-designated counties.

Cooke, Montague and Denton counties are among the 155 counties designated by USDA in which farmers and ranchers are eligible for grazing and haying privileges on non-irrigated set-aside lands without penalty.
