





The enrollment will be divided into two groups, one of which will attend classes next Tuesday through Saturday and the other to attend Monday through Friday of the following week.



SHOT HEARD ROUND THE WORLD



Independence Day 1973

Firm action in defense of freedom is this country's oldest tradition. It is the foundation on which the independence we celebrate this week will remain secure as long as we honor it.

Actually, the shooting began more than a year before the Declaration of Independence was signed. In the spring of 1775, the British commander in Boston learned that the patriots of Massachusetts had assembled ammunition and other military equipment at Concord, 16 miles away.

He sent a force of eight hundred men to destroy the munitions. When six miles from Concord, at Lexington, seventy armed men stood their ground on the village green and the British army fired the first shots. They proceeded to Concord where Emerson's "embattled farmers" hid most of the munitions and withstood the British assault.

The battle aroused the colonies and, by the end of the summer, the power of the royal governors was destroyed and provincial congresses were formed. The idea that independence was essential to freedom became widely accepted and ultimately was articulated in the Declaration of Independence.


Men's High Heels Invite Accidents

Tripping the light fantastic with high-heeled, platform sole shoes may be the latest in shoe styles for men, but it may spell trouble!

National Safety Council Home Safety Information Specialist Mary Anderson sees trouble afoot for careless male cloggers. "The extreme height, weight and rigidity of the shoe - or the bucket-on-each-foot feeling, decreases mobility, balance and speed," notes Ms. Anderson. "The possibilities of injuries caused by falls and twisted ankles are greatly heightened when you pair the average man or boy with platforms," she says.

"Watching your step and one foot at a time, or what I call creative walking is the key to keeping your ground with platform shoes," she says. "Judge each movement with your heels in mind," she suggests, "and allow for the deeper toe area at each step, curb, or any floor level change."

"Don't drive cars or ride oicycles with them on," she warns. "Unless safety gets some sole support, some men are going to be down at the heels a lot sooner than they expected," Ms. Anderson concludes.
