Gov. Preston Smith has signed into law legislation requiring school children to be inoculated against six diseases and preschool children immunized against eight dis-

"This is a landmark legislation in the field of health," Smith said Monday. "For the first time in the history of the state of Texas we will be able to make some headway in eliminating these diseases."

The governor predicted the laws will "sharply reduce the disease rate in our state."

The health bills require preschool children to be immunagainst diphtheria, whooping cough, tetanus, polio, rubella, rubeola and smallpox before they can enschool children be inoculated for diphtheria, rubeola, rubella, tetanus, polio and smallpox as a prerequisite for admittance into any Texas elementary, secondary or university facility. -Cecil Waggoner in Claude News.
