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Texas legislators got quite a jolt last week when the state's voters turned down the constitutional amendment giving them a pay raise, especially in view of the fact that the margin of defeat was so emphatic.

Some of them, including Speaker Price Daniel Jr., promptly pointed a finger at Washington, saying that tragic events at the national level have crushed public confidence in our political and governmental systems. There may be some truth in that. Some people may have taken the election as an occasion to express their disgust with Watergate.

The more likely explanation was that offered by the GOP candidate for governor, Jim Granberry. He thinks that the lawmakers were asking for too much and made another mistake in coupling pay raise with annual sessions. Most people will agree that the representatives in Austin deserve more than \$4,800 a year, but they can't agree to the big increase which more than triples the salary — along with the proposed per diem increase. Doubtless the public would have been more sympathetic to a salary of \$8,000 or \$10,000.

And, of course, the three part issue must have had some adverse effect. A person opposed to any of the three necessarily voted against all of them.

Despite all that, there was merit in the proposal. Compared with earnings in many other lines, the requested salary was not out of line. Lots of people of less ability and less achievement are getting much more. And legislators of every other state receive more. And the average of all states is more than the \$15,000 requested. So, unfortunately, the men who conduct the state's 5 billion dollar annual business will have to go on working for peon's pay.

Meanwhile they need to realize that the misfortune was brought on by their own boner. By the next time they should know that threefold increase is too much to ask for, and that a 3-part proposal presents three chances for a negative vote.

Congressman Wright Patman revealed a rather shabby attitude last week in stating that President Nixon ought to resign because he has lost the confidence of the public. Then he went on to say that he does not think that the president can be found guilty of wrong doing, but he should quit nevertheless because his ability as the national leader has been so badly damaged.

What impresses us here is Patman's inference that Nixon should pay the penalty for wrong doing even though he is not guilty of it, in fact that he should give up in disgrace to satisfy the character assassins who have been after his scalp and that portion of the misguided public which has been deceived by hypocritical politicians and a hostile press.

If Patman were the statesman he claims to be he could never reconcile his two statements. If he thinks Nixon is not guilty he ought to come out emphatically in his support. Instead of suggesting resignation he ought to help toward restoring some of the confidence that has been taken from the president.

The great tragedy about Watergate is the hypocrisy. It started with political spying, which has been the way of life for many years in both parties, and makes an issue of dirty tricks, which have been equally prevalent on both sides. All it nags about political contributions when everyone knows they have been sneaked into both parties. And the stone throwing is not confined to persons without fault. For instance, loud mouth Ted of the unexplained Chappaquiddick incident.

As regards the spying, it has become so commonplace that it's taken for granted on both sides. The only real crime was the break-in. And regarding the several big political contributions, it's doubtful that Republicans are as much at fault as the Democrats.

Of course, there's a good reason behind the law which demands strict accounting of contributions. There's always a danger that a representative or senator who is obligated for campaign funds will be favorable to benefactors in dispensing political favors. We don't like to think that a man who

Moster Runs Wild As Tigers Upset Bowie JV 32-8

Sacred Heart's Tigers, recovering from their only loss of the season a week earlier, rebounded in a big way Friday night for an impressive 32-8 win over the previously unbeaten junior varsity of Bowie. It gives the Tigers an 8-1-1 record to date with another game still on the schedule.

They got their start early in the first quarter after the visitors fumbled on their own 44. Sacred Heart went the distance in short steady gains and one 11 yard ramble by Kevin Pels, who also crashed over for the final yard.

The next one came early in the second quarter as Mark Hess crashed through to block a Bowie punt. The ball tumbled back across the goal where Carl Hess punched on it for the touchdown.

Bowie could not go on its next possession and had to punt at the end of the first series, so Sacred Heart started again from its own 34. That drive was mostly a Dickie Moster project. Besides gains of 11, 10, 11 and 15 he crashed over from the 1 for the score. A pass from Roger Endres to John Bartush upped the count to 20-0.

Following kickoff the Jackrabbits again had to punt on their first series and the Tigers followed up with an accommodating fumble on the 30. The recovery seemed to spark Bowie's only successful drive of the night. Consistent short gains reached the 1 yard line and Lindsay went over from there. Smith followed over for two more points.

That was the third touchdown of a busy second quarter but another was still coming. On the kickoff that followed Moster started from the 12, got fine blocking, and flew all the way down the right sideline. As he reached pay dirt only 45 seconds were left in the first half and the score was 26-0.

Starting the second half, Sacred Heart kicked on its second series, after which the visitors got started from their own 10 for a drive that ended 64 yards in 14 plays and ended

Though the championship of District 14-A has been decided there will still be a scramble for other positions in the final standing. For Muenster that can possibly mean a three way tie for second place, and it could also be a tie for third or a tie for fourth.

Frisco and Callisburg, in the top and bottom spots, are a cinch to end that way after playing each other. But a number of possibilities can result when Muenster plays Pilot Point and Nocona plays Sanger. Standings now are Sanger 3-1, Muenster 2-2, Nocona 2-2 and Pilot Point 1-3.

Indications are that both of the games will be well matched. In spite of comparative scores in games with Muenster, Nocona and Sanger rate as a toss-up. And the same can be said about Muenster and Pilot Point on the basis of their games with Nocona and Sanger.

On the basis of weight, this will be one of the two this season when the Hornets will meet near equals. The Bearcats will be only slightly heavier in the line and will also have a 185 pound fullback plus a couple of 150 pound high speed runners. On the other hand Muenster has done well lately in the running department and also has a fair passing record.

Physically the Hornets have come to their last game in better shape than previous years. They now have one casualty, Louis Koelzer with a shoulder injury. Tom Bright, out with flu for two weeks, will be back on the job. And all the other boys are ready.

Hornets Rampage For 48-0 Decision Over Callisburg

The Hornets had no problems Friday night as they sailed to an easy 48-0 victory over Callisburg's lightweight and inexperienced but spunky Wildcats. Muenster first stringers were completely in charge but the younger fellows had a good contest.

While that was going on Frisco cinched the district title with a 29-8 win over Sanger and Nocona outscored Pilot Point 33-24. Sanger now is in second place in the 14-A district with a 3-1 record, Muenster and Nocona stand at 2-2 each, Pilot Point is 1-3 and Callisburg is 0-4.

The Hornets got their first score on their first possession, then another on the next possession and the third one on fourth possession. From then Coach Glenn Richardson gave the younger fellows a good deal of playing time and scoring slowed down. Meanwhile the hosts made considerably more gains but still failed to get across the line.

A fine kickoff return by Curtis Klement gave the Hornets their start on the Wildcat 40. Eight plays from there made the distance and big gains were by Klement and Randy Wolf for 12 yards each. Wolf scored from the 1 on a quarterback sneak and John Eckart kicked an extra point.

Next drive started after a fine punt return by Klement which was mostly nullified by a clipping penalty. The ball was put into play with 65 yards to go. Sophomore Mark Sicking stepped off 15 yards to midfield, then Klement broke through the middle and saw the way clear for a 50 yard sprint to pay dirt. Eckart's kick upped the count to 14-0.

An interception and 30 yard return by Terry Walterscheid gave Muenster a set up on the 25. Klement reached the 10 in two tries but a foul up and incomplete pass spoiled the next series, so Eckart tried for a field goal. It missed.

Four plays later Callisburg kicked and the Hornets started again, with 56 yards

\$304,000 Loan Approved by REA For Phone Corp.

Muenster Telephone Corp. has been approved for a loan of \$304,000 by the Rural Electrification Administration for construction of new facilities, according to reports received during the past weekend from Senator John Tower and Congressman Omar Burleson.

Alvin Fuhrman, manager and co-owner of the phone corporation, explained that REA's approval makes the money available for projects that are planned for the coming ten years, and money will be borrowed for each job as it is needed.

Improvements included in the over all program are an addition to the combined exchange and headquarters building here, construction of a warehouse and truck shed on the 6-lot location recently purchased across the street south of the phone building, construction of 24 miles of new line, and providing service to new customers. A ten year projection based on past growth indicates that 245 additional subscribers can be expected in the present service area in Cooke and Montague counties.

The loan will be subject to an interest rate of 5 per cent. Fuhrman said that the 2 per cent interest in effect since REA was organized was discontinued recently and loans hereafter will bear the same rate of interest that the government is paying at the time on the money it borrows.

TP&L Seeks Higher Rate

A proposal to increase electric rates by an average of about 10 per cent will be submitted to the Muenster City Council Monday night, November 19, 1973, Bill Bedrick, Texas Power and Light Company manager, said today.

The proposed increase is only the second TP&L has sought in 22 years. The last occurred in 1972. At that time, the Company asked for and received a six per cent general rate increase, the maximum permitted by the Cost of Living Council.

During the 1972 hearings TP&L said rapidly increasing costs of construction, interest and fuel would force the Company to seek another rate increase in the near future.

If approved by the council, the rate hike would be only the third general increase by TP&L during its 61-year history.

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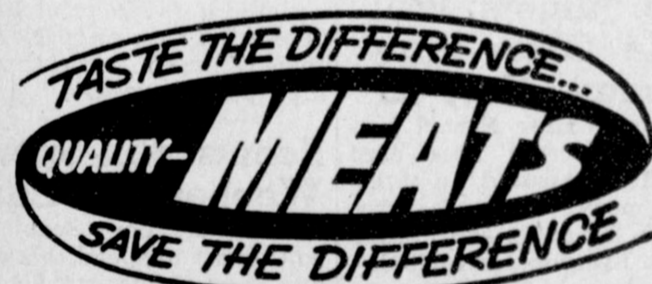

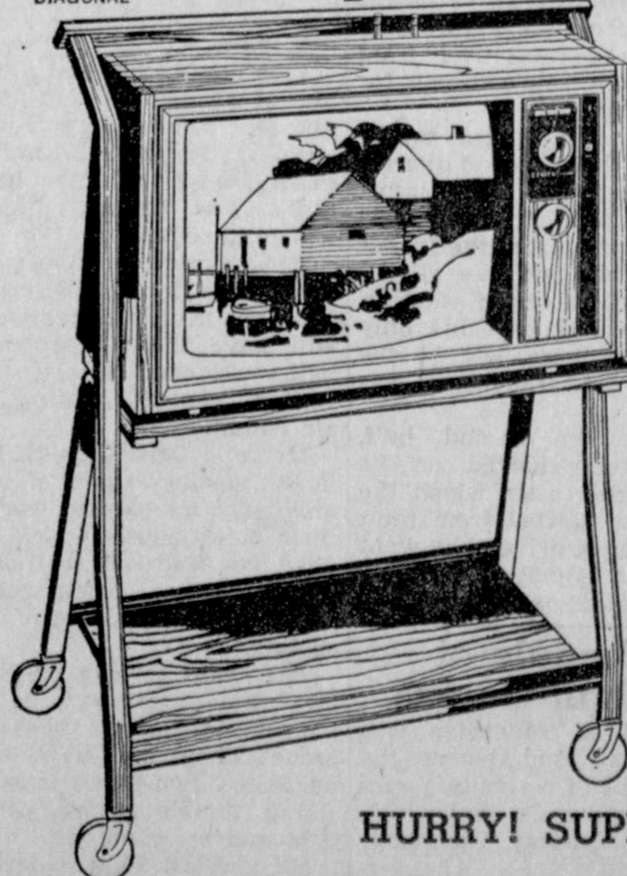
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Forestburg News -



Outlook Is Bleak In Energy Crisis

Outlook for a bleak winter grew steadily worse as the energy crisis mounted.

Speed limit reductions and year-around daylight savings time, recommended by President Richard Nixon, may be some of the milder results.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe, assessing the president's proposals and reaction of other states before announcing his own program, said gasoline rationing is an "eventuality that will have to be considered."

Grimmest of all was Railroad Commission Chairman Jim Langdon's forecast: "Some people in Texas are going to be cold this winter." Those who use butane, propane or electricity for their heating are the ones most likely to get the shivers, said Langdon.

Middle distillate fuels, used primarily to generate electricity — and of increasing importance due to the shortage of natural gas — may also be in short supply as much as 400,000 barrels daily, according to Langdon's estimate.

Meanwhile, the Nixon ad-

ministration altered previously-announced allocation policies to allow middle distillate suppliers to provide Texas customers diesel fuel, fuel oil and kerosene without limit through November.

Even in the reprieve from mandatory allocations, there was an implied warning to Texas electric utility companies: come December they may be running short of fuel oil, since allocation formulas are based on 1972 purchases. Most Texas utilities, used to plenty of natural gas, didn't use much fuel oil to fire their boilers in 1972.

Things apparently are going to get a lot worse before they get better on the energy front.

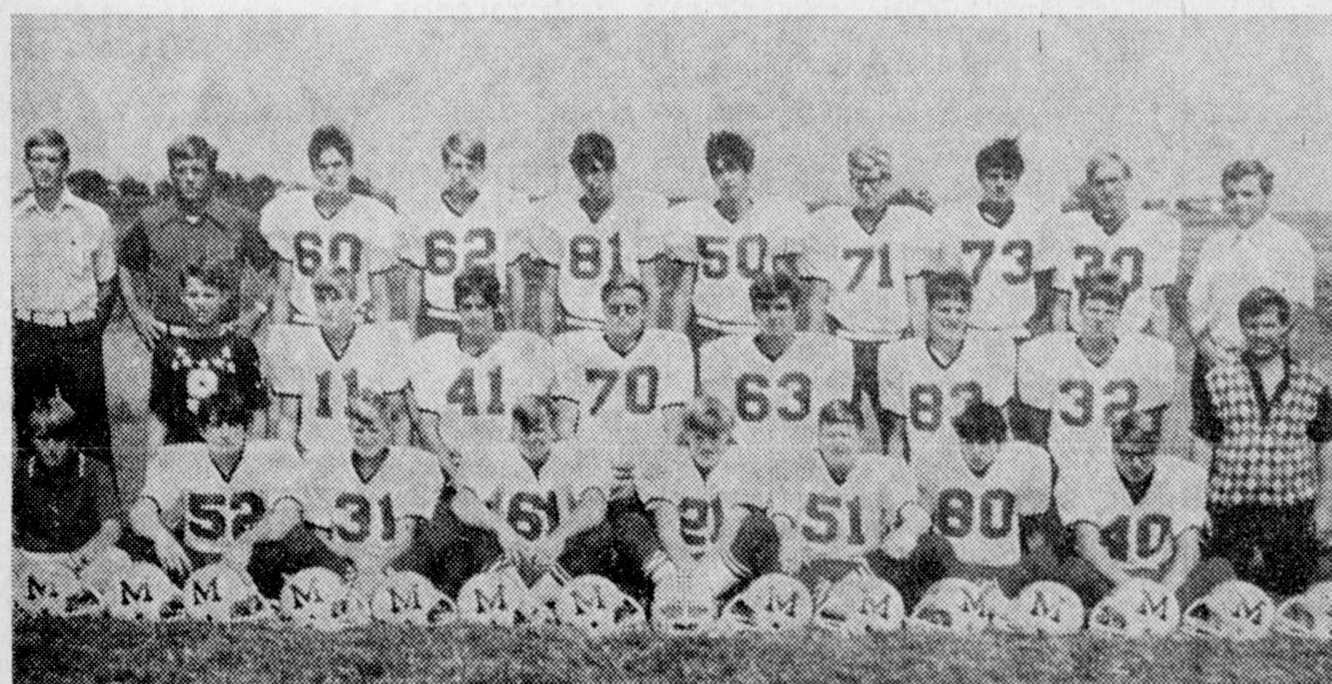

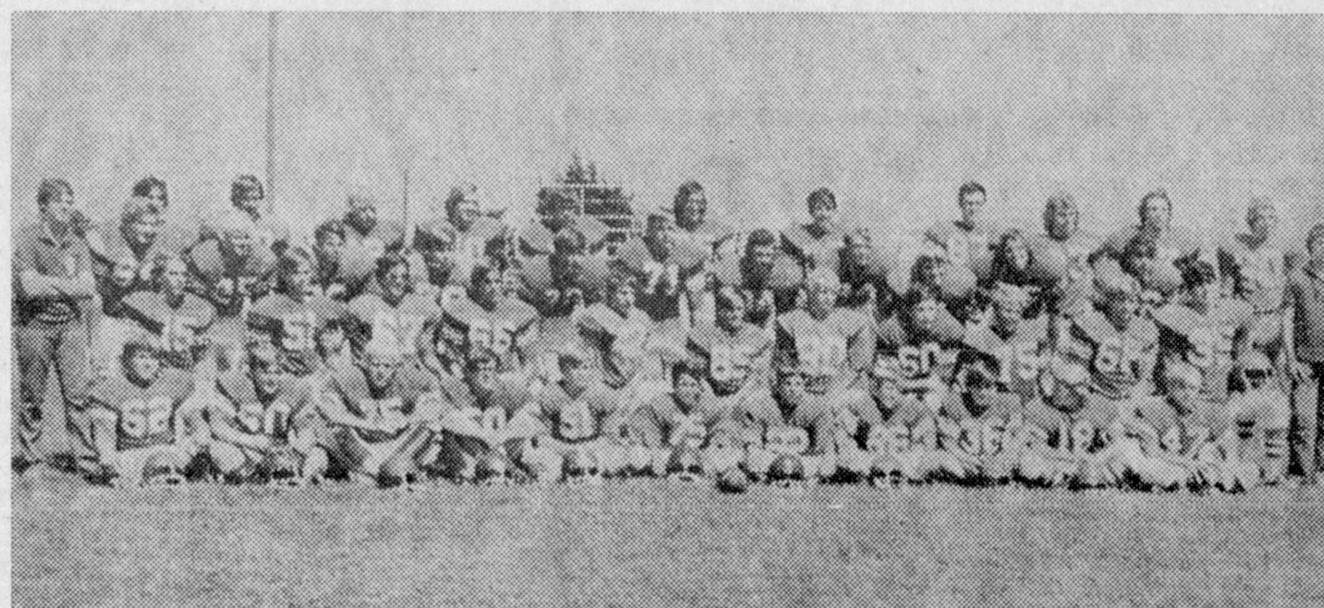

Texas FB Reports All Time High in Membership Roll
1973 has been a banner year in membership for the Texas Farm Bureau, reports TFB President J. T. (Red) Woodson. The organization scored its biggest membership gain in history, he said.

Total membership as of Oct. 31 (end of the organization's fiscal year) was 152,380 member families, a gain of 15,437 over last year, making the 21st straight year for the TFB to show an increase in members. Tabulations were completed Nov. 6.

All of the 209 organized county Farm Bureaus registered an increase in membership, Woodson said.

The five largest counties in membership size are (1) Harris — 2,541; (2) Ellis — 2,302; (3) McLennan — 2,253; (4) Fort Bend — 2,117; and (5) Fayette 2,000.

Woodson said farmers and ranchers have enjoyed the most favorable prices for their products this year that they have received in a long time.

"But they have felt themselves under fire by intermittent threats of price controls on raw farm products and embargoes on farm exports," he explained. "These fears have caused them to rally behind an organization which could effectively speak for them against such threats," he added.
