As state and national governments are wrestling with the energy crisis, it begins to appear that this problem may be a blessing in disguise. We can profit from it in the long run. Even though we anticipate discomfort and inconvenience, along with probable readjustments of the economy, reason tells us that we need to conserve our precious resources as much as possible.

We ought to borrow from the message that soil conservation people have been preaching for the past three decades. Farmers are not able, like the pioneers, to move on to new land when their wears out. They have to quit wasting.

The nation's attitude toward energy was very similar. We had it in abundance at low prices. The economy was geared to a philosophy of living it up.

Government got into the spirit by establishing low prices for gas and oil. Politicians liked the idea of assuring cheap energy to their constituents even though the oil industry was hurting.

And as production declined the big operators imported foreign oil, which was available cheaper than it could be produced here.

Before long Arab oil became a vital part of our economy. Consequently when the Arabs cut us off a few weeks ago the supply suddenly dropped far below the demand. We're in a squeeze, forced by necessity to learn the hard way what we should have realized long ago.

Probably the first lesson is to avoid dependence on another country. There may be times when it's smart to rest our resources while we have a beneficial trade arrangement, but it's never smart to be unprepared. Considering the abundance of our food production and the scarcity in some other countries, it is likely that foreign oil will again come our way. But if and when it's cut off again, let's hope that we will be ready to just turn on our own.

This situation is especially important in relation to national security. At this time we have a big problem in Vietnam where communists are again putting the pressure on Saigon. Our long costly war over there helped establish the South's freedom and independence, but left a general understanding that we would furnish material and supplies in case of renewed aggression.

Well, it seems that the Reds are set for a big squeeze play there. With lots of their own oil, and Arab oil at their disposal, they can give Vietnam Reds very substantial help while we can do little for the South. And we shudder to think of our helplessness if we should suddenly become involved in a war of our own. Compared with this possibility, the coming discomforts and inconveniences are trifles.

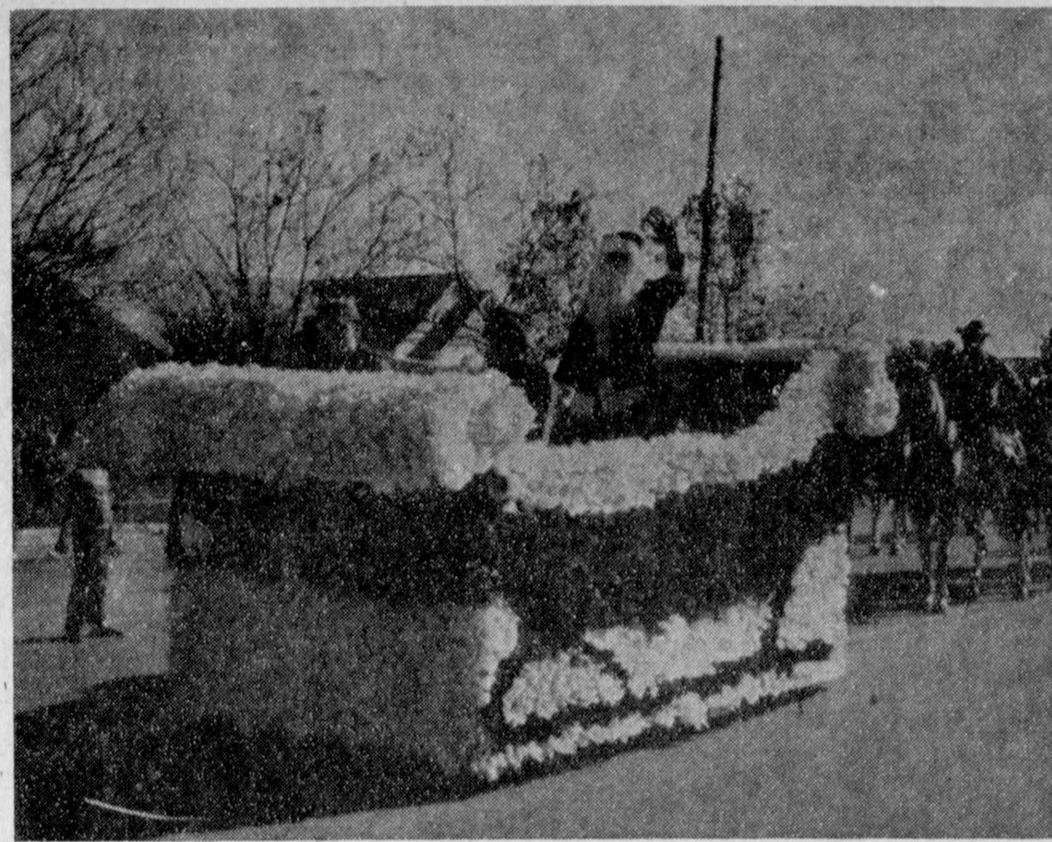
All of that combines to convince us that the President's goal of self sufficiency is a must. We must make sure that enough of our own energy is available so that we will not be crippled by another shutdown of oil imports.

The next lesson is to avoid bureaucratic meddling and give oil producers a chance to operate freely. The present emergency would not have come if realistic prices had been charged for gas and oil, permitting exploration for more production and continued operation of marginal wells. Soon after prices are allowed to go up we'll have new wells plus additional recovery from old wells that could not be economically operated for cheap oil.

At the same time this ought to loosen the grip that environmental cranks have on the nation's economy. Some of their brainstorms have been obstructing progress for years, and usually without sufficient reason. They object to the danger of nuclear energy when the 38 nuclear reactors now in use still have caused no accident. They object to offshore drilling and the Alaska pipeline when the history of other pipelines and offshore wells refutes their objections.

Our government must learn that the ecology people are not always right. Doubtless they have cleaned up lots of air and water and improved appearances, but they have also put the country in a bind almost every time they hatched a new caution. They must not be allowed to impose unreasonable

Ash Street to Be New Access Road To Hwy 82 West

The Muenster city council in regular session Monday night approved a proposal to open and develop Ash Street from Sixth Street to Eddy Street. It means, in effect, that the street bordering the west city limit will be extended to the street which borders the south city limit.

However, the proposal to open and improve Eddy Street was turned down in favor of another plan which is for Precinct 3 of the county to open a short link from the south end of Ash to FM 373 South. Commissioners Earl Taylor and Robert Bayer, attending the meeting agreed to cooperate in the project. Both are concerned because the proposed street adjoins their precincts.

The chief result of the project is that the road will cross Highway 82 providing an entrance to, or exit from, the west part of town. Also it opens a short cut from FM 373 North to Highway 82 or FM 373 South.

Principal cost in the project is a bridge over Brushy Elm creek, which is to be paid by the city. Road expense will be shared by the city and the two precincts.

Councilmen agreed to start with the bridge job, first seeking cost estimates and specifications after which bids will be invited. The road work will be delayed until the bridge is finished.

Don Fleming, city engineer, appeared before the council to advise that a board of directors should soon be appointed by the council for the city's newly created water district.

After writing the essay, the student gives it as an address and is judged on content, originality and delivery. Theme this year is "My Responsibility as a Citizen."

Local prizes are awarded by the sponsoring group and Miss Walterscheid advances to district competition to try for state honors. Parents of the three local winners are Messrs. and Mrs. Julian Walterscheid, Ed Endres and Urban Rohmer.

Reception Honors Rep. Bill Sullivant

Bill Lewie and Jim Smoot, presidents of the two Gainesville banks, hosted what has been termed by political observers as the "most successful political reception Cooke County has seen in many years" for State Representative Bill Sullivant last Thursday evening. The event was held at the River Valley Country Club near Gainesville.

More than 500 guests were registered from Cooke, Fannin, Grayson and Wise counties, but observers estimated the total attendance at a much higher figure. In addition there were political leaders from Athens, Kerrville, Springlake, Fort Worth and Dallas along with the political personnel of Cooke County.

Refreshments of coffee, punch and hors d'oeuvres ran short before the affair ended because hosts had not anticipated the size of the turnout.

Ronnie Runs Second
Ronnie Hess ran second in the annual Turkey Trot held in Dallas on Thanksgiving Day. He covered the eight-mile course in 43 minutes 37 seconds, surpassed only by a 42:30 runner in the entire race. He was second also in his class of 18-29 year olds. His sister Barbie finished the course in 75 minutes, not the last of the 299 runners from age three and a half to 76. Watching her children were Mrs. Ray Hess, daughter Darlene and son Jeff. Ronnie and Darlene are students at NTSU.

City Garbage Service Will Be Started Soon

Residents of Muenster have a garbage and trash ordinance which becomes effective this week with official publication of the ordinance. Along with it they have a disposal service which now awaits arrival of a supply of paper bags and completion of a paint job on the garbage truck.

Operators of the truck will be Wayne Tate and Werner Yosten. They will haul the garbage to the Roy Tate farm north of town where it will be dumped in ravines and eventually covered with dirt to shape up and restore usefulness to the terrain.

The ordinance, which appears in full elsewhere in this edition of the Enterprise, specifies that all garbage and solid waste matter shall be disposed of through the city's garbage service except where such items are used for mulch or compost. Included in the ordinance are food scraps, food containers, paper, ashes, tree and shrub trimmings, lawn trimmings — in general any substance that is not disposed through the sewer system. None of the substance may be burned.

It is also required that the garbage be packaged in bags not to weigh over 50 pounds, and that limbs be bundled not to exceed 50 pounds nor 5 feet in length and 18 inches in diameter. Paper bags for the purpose will be furnished by the city in two deliveries for a total of 104 bags per year. This will allow for two pickups a week. In case of extra large accumulation of limbs, etc., special arrangements can be made with the city. Pickups are to be made from curb side only.

All homes and all commercial firms of the city are required to use the service. Its cost to the residential customer will be \$1.00 plus the amount of sewer charge per month, and cost to a business will be a minimum of \$5.00 per month, the actual charge to be determined by the quantity to be hauled. Billing is to be included monthly on the water bill and penalty for delinquency is suspension of water service.

In the opener with Goldburg, Muenster girls were under pressure but kept the lead all the way for a final count of 54-43. Becky Fields led the scoring with 23, Tracey Klement added 16, Debbie Schneider 13 and Mary Lou Fleitman 3.

The second game was a runaway by Lindsay, which later lost to Valley View for the championship. The measure of Muenster's loss was 62-24 as Becky Fields hit 15, Sandy Dittfurth 5 and Tracey Klement 4.

Then came the game with Era which was a combination of cold shooting and hot guarding on both sides. The guards, who did a fine job for MHS in all three games, were Barbie Davidson, Kim Klement, Lisa Mollenkopf and Gina Felderhoff. Scorers were Becky Fields 9, Tracey Klement 7, Sandy Dittfurth 4, Debbie Schneider 2.

Muenster boys made a slow start in their opener with Goldburg and trailed 17-10 at the half. But then they had a big third quarter jumping to a 24-21 lead and extended the slim 3 point margin to the final count of 29-26. MHS scorers were Randy Johnson 11, Randy Wolf 6, Curtis Klement 6, Ronnie Felderhoff 4, Lyle Klement 2, Terry Huchton and Tim Felderhoff did some good relief work after Randy Wolf fouled out early in the third.

He explained that many farmers did not buy diesel, butane and propane fuels this time last year because it was too wet to get in the fields. Also, he said, better prices this year enabled some farmers to trade in their old gasoline powered equipment for new diesels. Since they have no history on buying diesel fuel, it is not available to them now.

Kammerdiener said although the government had issued so-called "common-sense" directive for distributors to assist in hardship cases, the distributors are afraid of making a decision that could cost them a heavy fine.

"Therefore," Kammerdiener said, "Farm Bureau in Texas and across the nation is calling upon the Interior Department to assure distributors they will not be punished for selling to hardship cases."

Local Trio Sells Big Round Bales

The big round hay bales which have been gaining popularity lately are available at Muenster from the WPW Company — the initials standing for Jerry Walterscheid, Ed Pick and Dave Walterscheid, with dealership for Cooke, Montague, Denton and Wise counties.

They sell the Vermeer baler in two sizes, the smaller unit making bales of 6 feet diameter and 5 feet length, the larger one making bales of 7 feet diameter and 6 feet length. The smaller size is equivalent to 25 to 30 regular bales, the larger size to 50 to 60 regular bales. All of them resemble miniature hay stacks.

Features of the big bale are that it sheds water and can be left outside, saving barn storage space. Also it doesn't have to be hauled to the livestock, the animals can go to it. A fork attachment on a tractor is used for moving the bale.

PROHIBITING THE DISPOSAL OF SOLID WASTE MATERIALS, GARBAGE AND TRASH AND PROVIDING FOR A UNIFORM COLLECTION OF SUCH SOLID WASTE MATTER BY THE SANITATION DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF MUENSTER, TEXAS, AND/OR THE DULY DELEGATED PERSONS OR AGENCY, AND HEREBY MAKING IT UNLAWFUL TO DISPOSE OF SUCH SOLID WASTE MATTER OTHER THAN AS PRESCRIBED IN THIS ORDINANCE, REQUIRING ALL PERSONS RESIDING WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF THE CITY OF MUENSTER TO COMPLY WITH SUCH REGULATION, DESIGNATING AND REQUIRING LICENSES AND PERMITS TO PERSONS OR FIRMS TO GATHER, HAUL AND DISPOSE OF SUCH WASTE MATTER, PROVIDING FOR A FEE FOR SUCH GATHERING SERVICES AND DESIGNATING A PENALTY FOR VIOLATIONS OF THE ORDINANCE.

SECTION No. I. DEFINITIONS.

The following definitions of terms used herein shall govern interpretation of this ordinance:

(1) **GARBAGE OR SOLID WASTE MATTER** is defined as rubbish, trash, kitchen and household wastes, ashes, paper and food containers and all similar trash.

(2) **BRUSH** is defined as tree trimmings, weeds, hedge trimmings, lawn trimmings, shrubs and trees not to exceed three inches in diameter and cut in lengths of not to exceed five feet.

(3) **INDUSTRIAL WASTE** is all residue or waste resulting from manufacturing, commercial or industrial operations or processes.

(4) **CUSTOMER** shall mean all persons residing within the city of Muenster, and all any persons, firms or corporations receiving garbage pickup and disposal service from Sanitation Department of the City of Muenster, Texas.

(5) **COMMERCIAL REMOVAL** is defined as hauling garbage for hire, not as a part of a combined service, and consisting more or less of commercial or larger waste materials etc.

(6) All reference to Solid Waste, Trash, Rubbish, Tree Trimmings, Kitchen and Household Wastes, Food Containers etc., as here in used shall not be construed to mean any substance that is otherwise disposed of by and through the sewer system.

business within the city shall be and they are required to be subject to the regulations set forth in this garbage-disposal ordinance, and all such persons, firms or corporations shall automatically become customers, and be required to conform to the garbage pickup service under the terms and conditions set forth in this ordinance, and all future deposits and disposals of said waste and garbage shall be deemed to be applicants for garbage service and security for garbage collections as herein prescribed for all citizens of the City of Muenster.

2. It shall be the duty of every person, persons, firms or corporations owning, managing, operating, leasing or renting any premises, dwelling or other type of buildings to place or deposit or permit to be placed or deposited any solid waste materials as here in defined in or on such premises except as stipulated by this ordinance. It shall be the duty of such persons firms or corporations to place all such solid waste material, trash or rubbish from such premises or businesses in boxes, gunny sacks or other portable containers, "provided that the gross weight shall not exceed fifty (50) pounds. Any person desiring to place tree trimmings or hedge cuttings etc. for collection shall cause such material to be securely tied for collection in bundles not heavier than fifty (50) pounds nor more than five (5) feet in length and eighteen (18) inches in diameter. Such tree limbs, shrubs, hedge cuttings, grass cuttings, leaves etc., shall be placed in an orderly fashion near the curb or alley line, or at such other place as designated by the Sanitation Department on the days that service is offered for pickup.

3. Rocks, scrap building materials or other trash resulting from constructions or remodeling, and/or a general clean up of vacant or improved property, or wastes and trash resulting from sizeable amounts of tree, brush or debris cleared from property will not be removed by the City as a regular service, but this type of service may be acquired by the owner upon the payment of an extra fee. Exceptions to this are:

(a) Trees, shrubs and cutting will be carried by the City as defined elsewhere in this Ordinance.

(b) All types of trash, refuse, and rubbish will be carried by the City during any clean up campaign which is proclaimed and authorized by the City Council or Mayor.

(c) All industrial waste must be disposed of by the owner or occupant of the premises where such wastes accumulate by individual contract with a commercial licensed, pick-up service, unless a specific contract is entered into with the City for collection and disposing of such industrial wastes.

(d) The terms of this Ordinance shall make it unlawful for any citizen within the limits of the city, or any person, firm or corporation to burn any garbage, leaves, tree limbs or trimmings or any

other type of solid waste materials.

(e) Nothing herein shall be construed to prohibit any person or resident from leaving the cutting of grass upon his lawn or garden, or leaving the leaves from the trees upon such property upon the property or any other such or similar type of cuttings or vegetations that may be construed as being a mulch or fertilizer.

SECTION III

All persons residing within the limits of the City of Muenster, Texas, shall provide at his place of abode, residence or business, for the purpose of accommodating trash, garbage and other solid waste materials, a standard galvanized or approved plastic garbage can of from 20 to 30 gallon capacity, and such cans or containers shall be equipped with tight fitting lids. No receptacles shall be used for accommodating of garbage, trash or other waste materials in any business or residence district except those containers of size mentioned or as prescribed or directed by the Sanitation Supervisor by authority given to such Supervisor by the City Council.

SECTION No. IV.

The Sanitation Supervisor shall have the authority to refuse to pick up and haul away any refuse, garbage or other solid waste materials from any place of business or residence not complying with the requirements for garbage containers of size mentioned or as prescribed or directed by the Sanitation Supervisor by authority given to such Supervisor by the City Council.

SECTION No. V

(1) It shall be the duty of employees of the Sanitation Department of the City of Muenster to empty garbage containers and transport garbage and other trash from the residence or place of business of each person in the City of Muenster, except for industrial wastes, and except for rock, concrete and building materials referred to in a previous paragraph hereof. This provision shall not preclude any other person, firm or corporation from carrying on such type of activities, providing such person, firm or corporation engaged in commercial removal of such garbage has applied for and obtained a license and permit from the City.

(2) Any person, firm or corporation desiring to engage in the commercial removal of garbage or brush etc., for which a charge is made to citizens within the limits of the City shall, before engaging in such activity, obtain a permit which shall, if approved by the City Council of the City of Muenster, be issued a certificate of license receipt by the Secretary of the City of Muenster, which permit shall expire on January 1st following such issuance and which permit and license fee shall be payable annually on or before January 30th each year, if renewed. The license fees for such pick up service activity shall be \$5.00.

SECTION No. VI
Sanitation service to the residential area of the City of Muenster shall be provided on the following basis:

RESIDENTIAL CHARGES

(a) One family residence, 2.50 minimum charge; Two family residence on one meter, 5.00 minimum charge; Two family residence, separate meters, each unit, 2.50 minimum charge;

(b) Apartment house (with cooking facilities) up to and including four units, each unit, 2.50 minimum charge; One family residence with apartment unit or units (with cooking facilities; on one meter, per unit, 2.50 minimum charge.

(c) Each unit will be furnished a packet of 52 sacks every six months (enough for 2 sacks per week) cost to be included in the regular monthly charge. Pickup of the filled sacks will be curbside only, twice a week in the residential areas.

(d) The cost of this service will be a minimum of \$2.50 plus sewer charge scale per month for residential customers. Business minimum \$5.00 and per volume.

(e) Manner of billing. The charges for the collection of garbage, trash solid waste materials as provided herein shall be billed monthly with, or on the same basis as the water and sewer bills or charges are made. All charges for this service shall become delinquent on the same basis and date that the service for water become delinquent.

(f) Failure to pay. Failure to pay any charges assessed under the terms of this Ordinance within thirty (30) days after rendition of a bill shall be considered notice to the customer that the city will discontinue water service and garbage service and that such delinquency shall be handled in the same manner as any bills or assessments for water and failure to make payment as prescribed shall result in discontinuance of water service, and/or including all penalties attached thereto.

(g) All charges levied for the services provided by this chapter or this Ordinance shall be payable at the office of the City Secretary-Treasurer of the City of Muenster and in the same manner that all water and sewer bills are paid, and penalty on delinquent accounts shall be the same as are applied to water and sewer users.

(h) If delinquency of payment should result and the City is required to disconnect the water service, and the account is subsequently cleared, a charge shall be made for reconnection of customer's water.

COMMERCIAL AND INDUSTRIAL CHARGES:

(2) The charges for service to

commercial and industrial users shall be based on loading time and cubic yard volume per week. Minimum charge shall be \$5.00.

(3) Any customer not coming within the outline of Paragraph (1) **RESIDENTIAL CHARGES** shall be charged according to Paragraph (2) **COMMERCIAL AND INDUSTRIAL CHARGES**. In assessing charges under Paragraph (2) the Superintendent of the City of Muenster Sanitation Department shall estimate the quantity of garbage and trash reasonably expected to be accumulated by each business customer or established concern each week and to be picked up by the City Sanitation Department, and to such estimation of garbage shall be applied the schedule of charge set out as above stipulated. Such estimates shall be revised from time to time as conditions appear to warrant. The estimate made by the Superintendent of the City Sanitation Department shall be binding on all parties except in case of excessiveness, when an aggrieved customer being charged under said paragraph shall be entitled to an appeal to the City Council.

The fact that a public health hazard exists and that the city is now without sufficient regulation of police power to control and provide for the public health and safety of the City of Muenster, and the further condition that the Department of Health of the State of Texas, recommends and requires controlled disposals, creates an emergency, and the rules requiring the reading of an Ordinance several times is hereby suspended, and that after the reading of this Ordinance and the passing and adoption of an Ordinance under this Ordinance shall, the Ordinance shall become in full force and effect.

PASSED AND APPROVED by the City Council of the City of Muenster, Texas, this 19 day of Nov. A.D. 1973.

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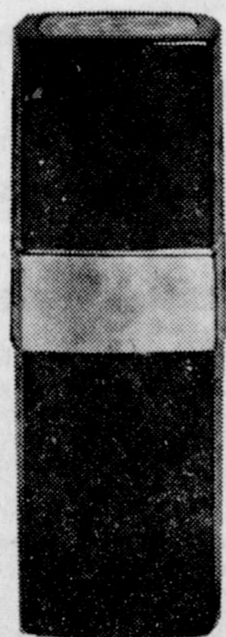
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Jan Cain Wins in Mary Kay Contest

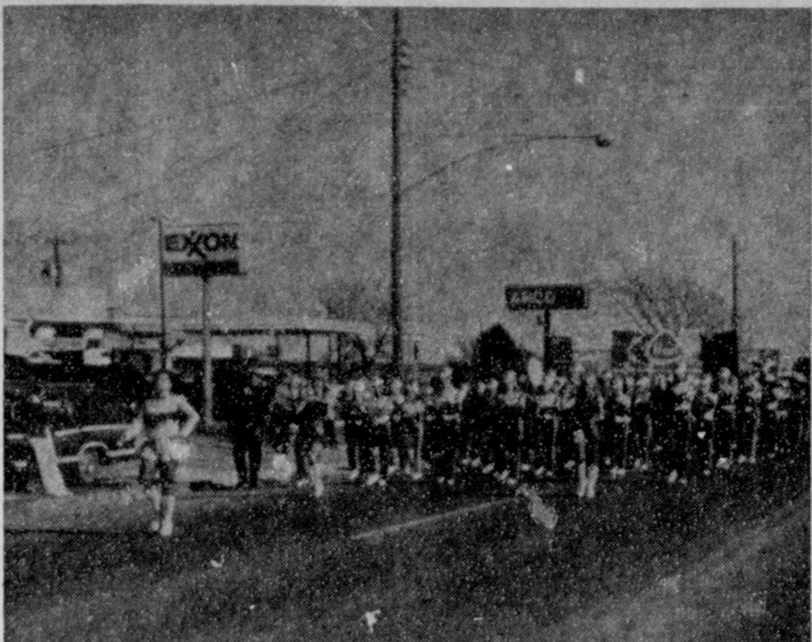
