Harvest Outlook Is for High Yield Despite Drought

For the second consecutive year a drought in this community is followed by a surprisingly good grain crop. With the harvest just getting started, average wheat yield is being estimated at about 30 bushels per acre and one person has reported 41 bushels per acre for one field.

Similar good news applies to the oats, even though none of it has been combined to date. Several have harvested it with their balers and say they are highly pleased with quantity and quality.

The harvest season got under way last weekend when Stockmen's Feed Store got its first load from Clem Hermes and Tony's Seed and Feed got one from Richard Arend. Both loads tested over 60 and moisture condition was good. Since then the grain has been coming in at a steady pace.

Despite good quality and yield, the season has its drawbacks. In the first place acreage is limited to about half of normal. Persistent wet weather last fall and early winter caught most farmers with planting unfinished. By the time dry weather arrived it was too late. So, the crop is below average even though yields are above average. Next complaint is the price. At about \$1.40 per bushel the cash value is a disappointment.

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INFORMED CONSUMER

You want to borrow money to finance a new car or for some other family or household reason. What are your legal rights in relation to the one who lends you the money?

This area of the law has been significantly affected by Congress' passage of the Federal Truth-in-Lending Act of The effect of this relatively

new law, which applies to items of personal property, services purchased for household uses, personal loans and many real estate transactions, is simply to require truthful and full disclosure of credit terms to you, the borrower. Lenders must now furnish the debtor with a detailed written disclosure of credit terms before credit is extended.

Included in the items which must be revealed to the borrower are the amount of

credit, total amount to be financed, dollar amount of the finance charge, finance charge expressed as an annual percentage rate, the number, amount, and due dates of payments, and default charges.

The finance charge includes the amount of the insurance premiums, service or carry charges, investigation fees, interest, and other costs. This charge then is what the customer pays for the privilege of obtaining and using his

Why have a Truth-in-Lending law? The theory is that if all of these charges are specifically set forth by the lender, a person can shop and compare the costs of borrowing from various lending institutions. This works to his district advantage since most of us are interested in saving money even though willing to pay the cost of obtaining credit. The Truth-in-Lending Act

should prove beneficial to the borrowing member of the consuming public. By requiring the lender to disclose conspicuously and clearly the credit terms and charges, the informed consumer is better able to protect his pocketbook

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
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
