Bill is known among his colleagues as a hard worker representing this county with conscience and judgment. He is appreciated especially by rural people for sponsorship of the tax bill requiring farm and ranch land to be assessed according to its productive capacity rather than its market value.

Skyrocketing land prices of recent years, the result mostly of speculative buying, would have been the basis for much higher valuation. We shudder to think what a farmer's tax predicament might be if his income from the land had to pay for the inflated assessments based on land prices of recent years. The idea is about as unrealistic as expecting to make payments on the high priced land out of its earnings from production.

We've been aware lately of efforts in Washington to get terms with Cuba, both economically and politically. In keeping with its close affiliation with the Soviet Union, the Castro regime favors a spirit of detante, in which the two countries establish a friendly atmosphere for trade, tourism, social relations and what not

The Castro outfit has its henchmen spreading this line. At the same time we have our own liberals who seem always eager to be chummy with the people who stated long ago that they intend to take us over.

Of course these people don't bother to look at the record. They are unimpressed by the fact that relations with red countries have been very unsatisfactory in the past. We been mooched and cheated. We have had agreements violated. And we have seen the reds accepting assistance from us at the very time they were hauling shiploads of supplies to our enemies. We have seen them expanding their military while depending on us to grow their grain and build their truck

factory. Well, the Russians and Cubans are too much in cahoots to justify any confidence from us. The proposal reminds one of the bad guy edging up close to the good guy. While he claims his motives are completely friendly, we still wonder whether he's getting set to pick a pocket or stab the person. This is an instance of that old time problem involving the white hats and black hats. The white hats are at a disadvantage. They have to be constantly on guard against trickery and treachery, whereas the black hats can carry on in comfort knowing that they will receive a fair deal while awaiting their opportunity for a ripoff. As it looks from here, US has little to gain in getting chummy with Cuba.

Actually, just one Cuban program is more than sufficient reason for US to reject any proposal to improve relations with the Castro cutthroats. It is the espionage program that has been under way for more than five years under cover of sugar harvesting. The scheme was hatched in 1969 as a way whereby Cuba could compensate to some extent for a subsidy of a million dollars a day from Moscow.

In this operation Castro & Co. invites US leftists, especially the revolutionaries, to show their good neighborliness by helping Cuba with its sugar harvest. As told by a Congressional Internal Security Subcommittee, this program is "one of the most extensive and dangerous infiltration operations ever undertaken by a foreign power

against the U.S." While in Cuba these young leftists are quizzed on every aspect of life in this country. And when they return home they have assignments to gather information on nuclear research and weapons, missiles, submarines, planes, etc. - in fact a wide range of inbut is able to take the swimming lessons.

Rain has been not only ample but probably also the most timely that the area has experienced in many years. Net result was a better than average grain yield and good harvesting weather, with only one interruption in combining, which did little if any harm to the grain but gave a big assist to pastures and forage crops.

Again, a rain last Saturday gave another welcome boost to ranges and feed crops. Good hay cuttings are in sight now. Saturday's rain measured .38 on Moster's gauge, and was reported up to 2 inches in some areas of the community. Total for June was 3.18 inches.

The area proposed for annexation to the hospital district includes the southwest portion of the county, about a ninth of its area, and consists principally of the communities of Myra, Hood, Rosston and Leo.

Its eastern boundary is irregular to exclude Gwyn property near Myra and Fischer property near Era and merer property between Myra and Lindsay.

Joining the present district line between Myra and Lindsay, the boundary is determined principally by three roads. At the north end of the addition is the J. T. Biffle Road; then the Arthur Reese Road, generally parallel to and about two miles east of the Myra-Era FM Road. At intersection of the Reese Road with FM 922 the boundary follows 922 west to the intersection with Myra-Era pavement, from which point the Sam Seagraves road leads south to the county line. The boundary follows this road south to the county line, except the zig zag to exclude Fischer property, thence west to the Montague county line trict boundary.



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

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
