Some people may find it a bit strange that in Saturday's election on expansion of the Muenster Hospital District only one ballot box has been designated for the present district whereas three have been designated for the area to be annexed. The proportion is especially odd in view of the fact that the three polling places will serve about half as much area and twenty per cent as many people as the single ballot box does.

Well, there has to be a reason. When details of the election were being worked out, representatives of one of the communities said that its people were enthusiastic about the merger and would appreciate their own ballot box so that their vote can be a matter of record. Then the representatives of the other two areas asked for a similar accommodation, and polling places were arranged accordingly.

The significant point here is that real enthusiasm is apparent among the people who will vote on joining the district, but little is being said by residents of the present district. And, unfortunately, the scarcity of comment also includes a few critical remarks about people who opposed original formation of the district but want to get in now when it is well established and almost out of debt.

That attitude is understandable. Human nature seems prone to remember old grievances. But there are other considerations, principally that only a few were involved the first time, and it's obviously unfair now to reject some 700 other people because of them ... especially since those same people are steady patrons of the town and the hospital. They are Muenster's customers, and deserve Muenster's vote of appreciation.

Besides, Muenster people have practical, business reasons for supporting the annexation. People asking to be adfor medical attention. Some of them understandably will




City Loses in June In Water Connects

and larger federal milk marketing order within the state, according to Agriculture Commissioner John C. White. The new order is the result of a United States Department of Agriculture action to merge


six existing orders to provide for a smoother and more orderly marketing of milk. Under the present system, there was some overlap in distribution and procurement areas among the orders.

Debate Workshop Offered at CCC The debate workshop sched-




