City Loses in June In Water Connects

The population of Muenster declined slightly during the past month, according to the city water department's record of turn-ons and turn-offs. Steve Moster, city superintendent reports four connections and six disconnections.

The turn-ons are J. D. Caplinger, L. K. Ponder, Rudy Koelsler, and Diana Webster. And turn-offs are Robert Steele, Richard Evans, Abel Rivera, Robert Fowler, Jack Guinn and Jim Mays.

Also on the record is Glenn Stockard for a transfer from one location to another.

Additions and deletions in the water department, along with births and deaths are the basis of the city's population. Turn-ons, specifying the number of persons, and births are added, whereas turn-offs and deaths are subtracted. By that calculation the Muenster's present count is 1699.

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Dairyman's Price For Milk Declines

AUSTIN — While milk production remains close to 1974 levels, the average price received by Texas dairymen is down some 87 cents during the first five months of this year, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White reported.

Texas' milk production totaled 1,411 million pounds by the end of May, 14 million below the same period last year.

At the same time, White added, the average price paid to dairymen was \$8.96, compared with \$9.83 during 1974.

And while milk prices continue to fall, costs of production stay at near record levels. Sixteen percent protein dairy feed has dropped \$15 from the January high of \$156 a ton, but farmers are still paying \$13 more than they did in May, 1974. Baled alfalfa hay has remained around \$100 a ton during the first part of 1975, compared with \$86 last year and \$68 in 1973.

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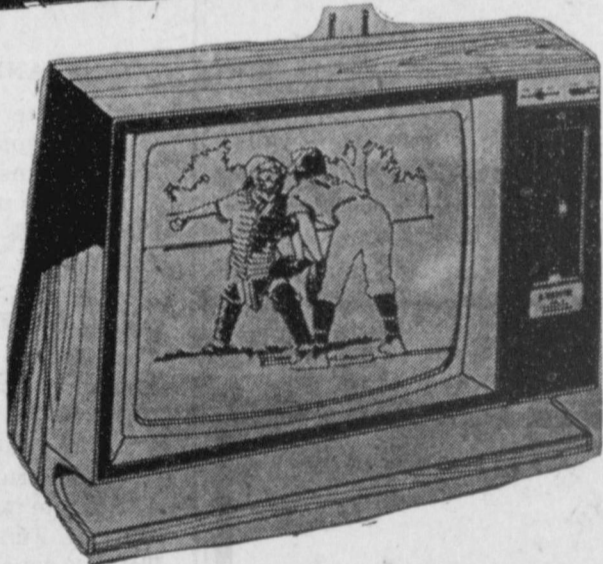
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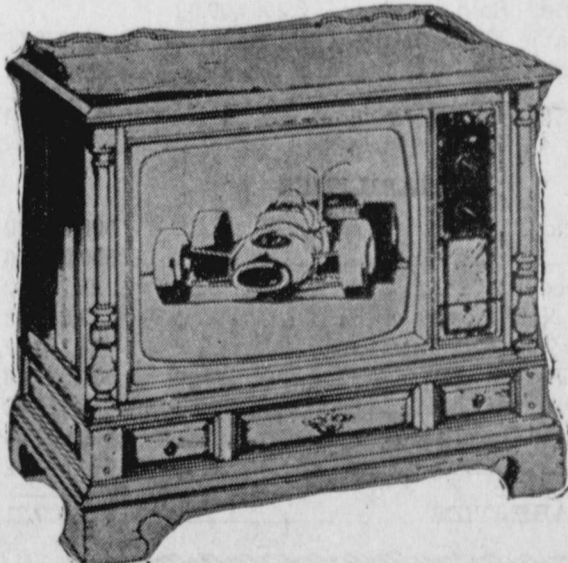
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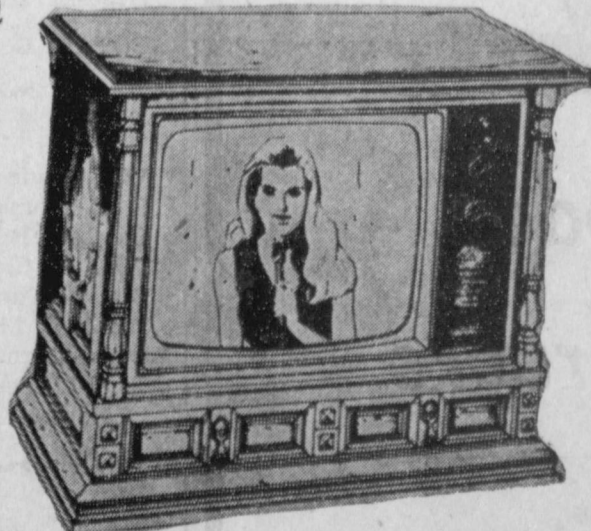
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Mr. and Mrs. Bobby Hermes Return from Wedding Trip

DPS Records Show Increasing Number Of Traffic Deaths

Driving is becoming even more dangerous on Texas streets and highways. This is according to Major Glen Warner, Commander of the Northeast Texas Region of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Records show that accidents are running some 24% higher than at the same period for last year. This translates into 256 more people killed this year over last year at the same time. This is attributed to two major things; number one is the easy availability of fuel which has caused an increase in the amount of traffic and number two being an increase in the average speed of all traffic.

Major Warner advised that extra troopers will be on duty during the long 4th of July weekend.

The Major gave these safety hints for summer driving this holiday weekend:

- 1) Check your vehicle for safe mechanical conditions. This still is a contributing factor in many traffic accidents. This would include checking brakes, lights, signals, windshield wipers, etc.
- 2) Remember that during the holiday period traffic will be heavier than usual and this will cause home delay in schedules. We suggest you leave a little earlier than usual and maintain your schedule.
- 3) Please adjust your speed to conditions, because speed too fast for the existing conditions is the number one contributing cause of all accidents in Texas as well as nationwide. The conditions we are referring to are light, weather, road, traffic, vehicle, and driver.
- 4) We strongly urge drivers to refrain from drinking while driving. National accident records show that over 50% of all fatal accidents involve drinking drivers. We also urge citizens to report drunk drivers to the nearest law enforcement agency. Please don't try to celebrate the 4th with a 5th.

Fuhrmann Sisters Return After Three Weeks on European Tour

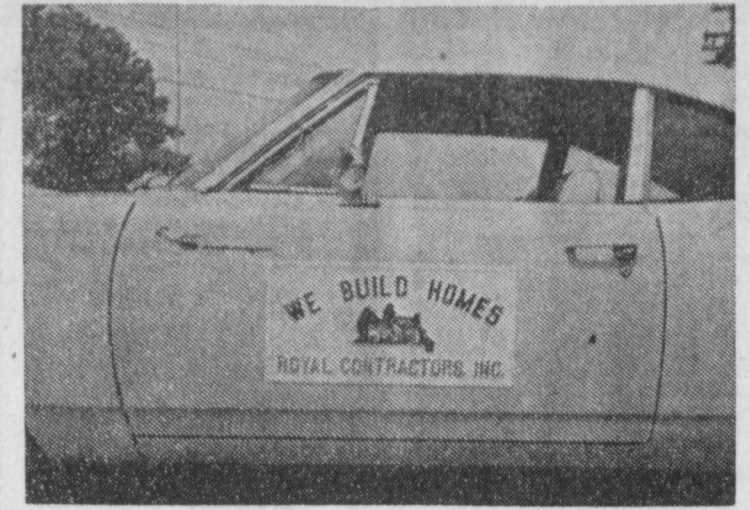

USDA Marketing Order to Regroup Texas Dairymen

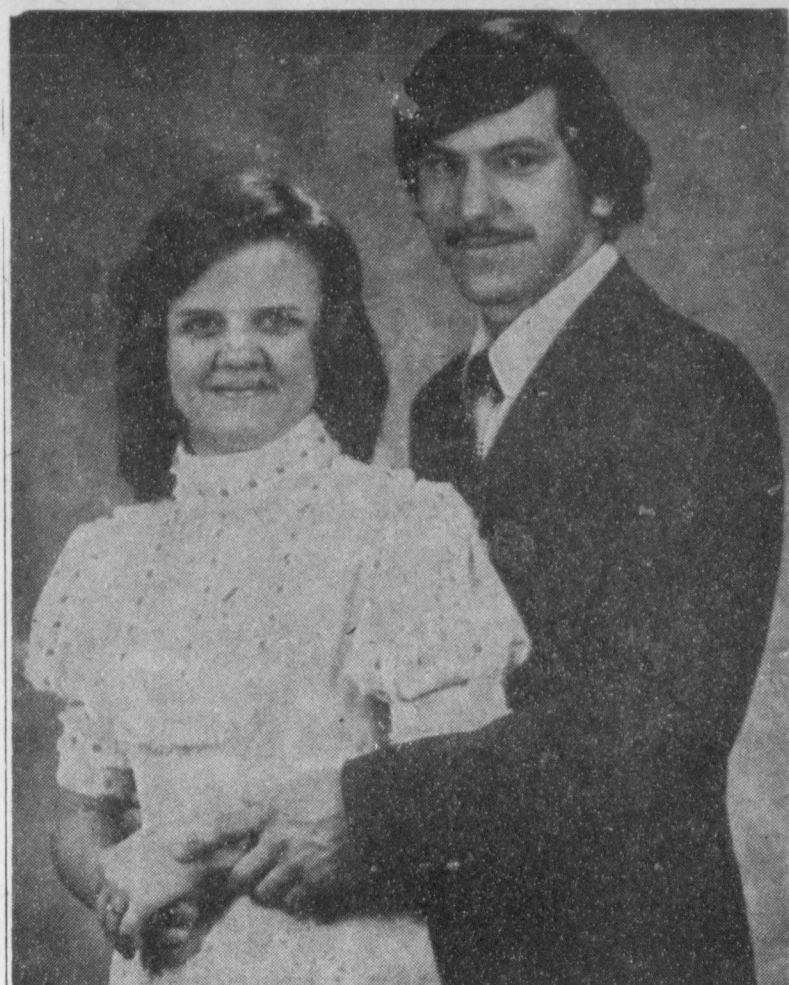
AUSTIN — Beginning July 1 some 5,600 Texas dairymen will be grouped into a new and larger federal milk marketing order within the state, according to Agriculture Commissioner John C. White.

The new order is the result of a United States Department of Agriculture action to merge six existing orders to provide for a smoother and more orderly marketing of milk. Under the present system, there was some overlap in distribution and procurement areas among the orders.

The dairymen affected are in the North Texas, Austin-Waco, Central West Texas, Corpus Christi, San Antonio and South Texas orders.

White noted that the merger was not designed to change the basic pricing policy of the federal marketing system and that retail dairy prices should remain unchanged by the consolidation.

However, White added, some dairymen are going to be affected by the new pricing provisions. There will be a sharing of Class I (fluid milk) sales, and one Class I utiliza-

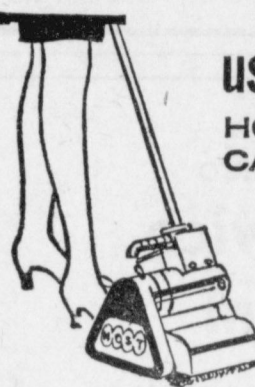

tion will apply equally throughout the entire order.

Under the present system, each order maintains its own utilization, and some orders have a higher Class I utilization than others. It is conceivable that farmers in a previously high Class I area could receive a lower price for their milk under the new system, White reported.

Pricing will be centered at Dallas with a transportation or marketing differential adjusted for 12 zones within the order. Dairymen in the Lower Rio Grande Valley would be paid the Dallas price plus 75 cents, but dairy farmers in three northeast Texas counties would receive the Dallas price minus 10 cents, since they are closer in proximity of sales to the Arkansas Marketing Order.

White said that prices will still be based on the Minnesota-Wisconsin price series and farmers will continue to receive a blend price for their milk.

The merger is in keeping with the national trend toward fewer but larger marketing areas. The new order will cover territory under the existing six orders plus any areas covered presently by regulated handlers.

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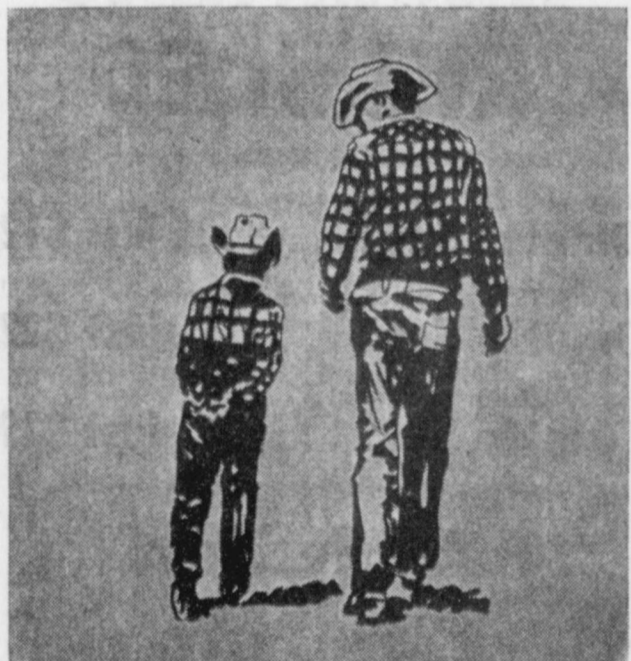
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Car Crash Fatal To Rosston Youth

line, and not already included in the hospital district, is proposed for annexation.

Though enlarging the district by 50 per cent, from 22 to 33 per cent of the entire county area, the expansion will add comparatively little in tax valuation and population. It will add \$3 million to the present tax valuation of \$8.3 million, thereby raising the district portion of county valuation from 11 to 15 per cent. Total valuation of the county is \$76.5 million.

At the same time the population ratio would increase from 16 to 19 per cent of the county total. Present count of the district is 3,850 and the proposed addition of 720 would increase the total to about 4,570. The county's total count is about 24,000.

Actually the election offers people of the four communities a choice of joining the Muenster District or becoming a part of the proposed Gainesville District.

Legislative action has authorized establishing the Gainesville Hospital District in the portion of Cooke County not occupied by the Muenster district. And Saturday's election will decide whether the four areas are inside or outside the Muenster district.

Supporters of the merger on both sides consider it a good deal. To the district it means a better relationship with people who have been patronizing the town, hospital and schools. On the other hand rejection could cause ill feeling and possible loss of patronage. Such absence would hurt the hospital financially, perhaps to the extent of causing a cut back or shut down in operation.

Likewise there are factors that appeal to people who asked for admission. First is the satisfaction and security of joining an established, successful district that is almost clear of debt, rather than get involved in a big, expensive new program. And there's also the fact that most of the people are closer to Muenster than any other hospital, a consideration which gets bigger as the energy crisis gets worse.
