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FOURTEEN AMENDMENTS ON NOVEMBER BALLOT

Fourteen constitutional amendments are on the November general election ballot. Each of the proposed amendments has been passed by the required two-thirds majority of both Houses of the Texas Legislature and must receive majority approval by a popular vote before adoption. Following is a brief summary of the proposed amendments.

AMENDMENT 1. The pro-

posed amendment increases the annual salary of members of the Texas Legislature from \$4,800 to \$8,400.

AMENDMENT 2. A strictly local measure which would amend to abolish the Lamar County Hospital District and authorize the commissioners court of Lamar County to provide for the transfer or for the disposition of the assets of the hospital district.

AMENDMENT 3. The amendment would require that all justices of the peace in all counties of Texas be compensated by the commissioners courts on a salary rather than a fee basis. Effective date for the new type of compensation would be January 1, 1973.

AMENDMENT 4. This proposed amendment would add a section to the Texas Constitution to authorize the 63rd Legislature to establish a constitutional revision commission. The commission would

AMENDMENT 5. The proposed amendment would permit the legislature to grant property tax exemptions to disabled veterans and to their surviving spouses and minor children.

AMENDMENT 6. This provision would add a new subsection to allow political subdivisions of the state to exempt not less than \$3,000 of the value of residence homesteads of all persons 65 years of age or older from all ad valorem taxes levied by the political subdivision.

AMENDMENT 7. The amendment, if passed, adds a new section to the Bill of Rights of the Texas Constitution. At present, the Texas Constitution does not expressly prohibit discrimination because of sex, race, color, creed or national origin. On adoption, the amendment increases the constitutional guaranty of equal rights to all persons.

AMENDMENT 8. This proposal would amend the state constitution to provide four year terms for certain elected and appointed state officials whose terms are now two years. Offices affected by the change in term would be the offices of governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, treasurer, comptroller of public accounts, commissioner of the General Land Office, and commissioner of agriculture.

AMENDMENT 9. If adopted, the amendment exempts directors of soil and water conservation districts from constitutional prohibitions against holding more than one civil office of emolument and against payment of compensation to persons holding more than one office or position of honor, trust, or profit under this state or the United States. The amendment would prohibit a member of the legislature from holding the office of director of a soil and water conservation district. It is doubtful that this adds anything not already prohibited under the existing provisions. Thus, directors of soil and water conservation districts would be permitted to hold more than one public office or position and, where applicable draw a salary or other compensation from the state treasury.

Members of the 63rd Legislature would then be convened in January, 1974 for the purpose of drafting a new constitution or revising the current constitution for submission to the voters of Texas. The convention would be allowed to sit through May 31, 1974, and could extend its life for 60 days beyond that date. The only subject matter restriction on the convention as provided by the proposed amendment is that the present Bill of Rights of the Texas Constitution be retained in full.

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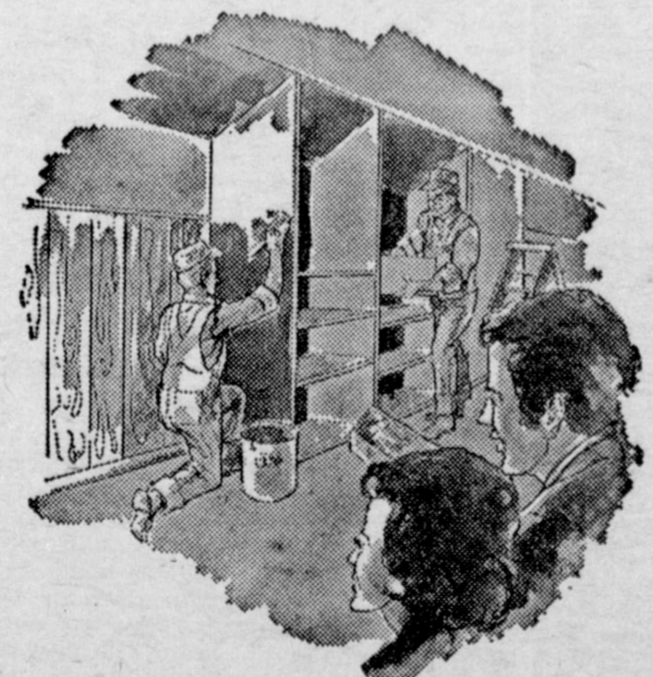
TO THE VOTERS OF COOKE COUNTY

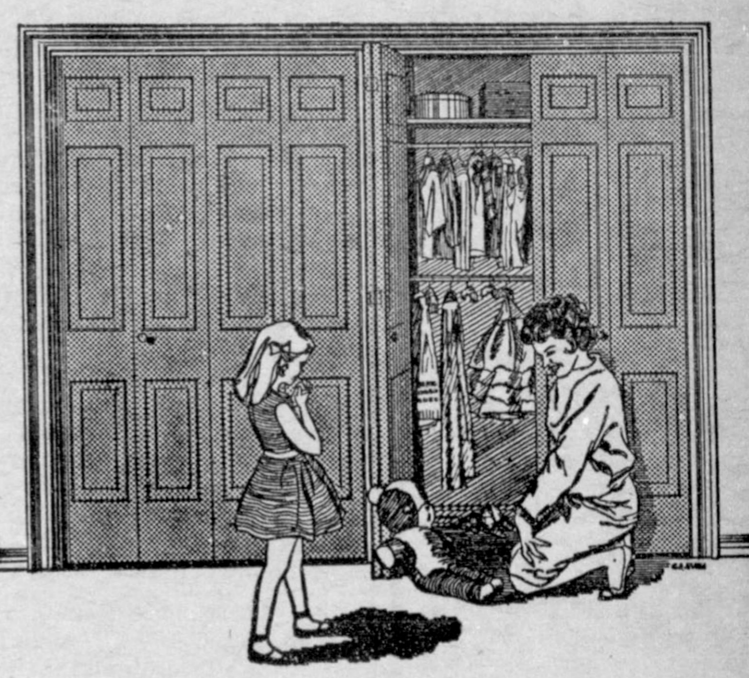

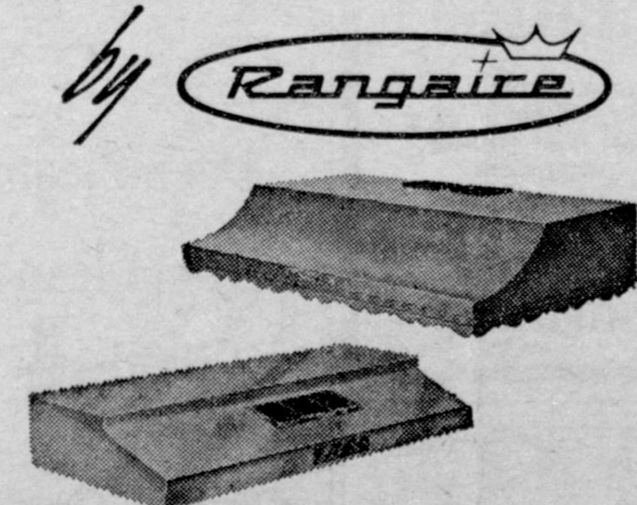

Nixon's re-election.

Candidate McGovern himself admits that fact. What's more he acted on it when he sent Piere Salinger to Paris as his representative to talk to the North Vietnamese. He got word to them that a settlement before election would not be in their interest because it would hurt his election chance, and he would be the easier for them to deal with.

Doubtless the enemy has considered those things and has waited because of them. But now, as Nixon's prospect keeps improving, it's easy to imagine that the Reds want to make their decision before the November 7 deadline.

A rather disturbing factor in the multitude of reports is the apparent squeeze being put on South Vietnam. President Thieu, they say, declines to go along with any agreement which includes a coalition government — and the very grave danger of having his country eventually taken over by the reds.

This presents a big problem in the peace negotiation. It makes us wonder whether we'll still let the Reds outfox us by exploiting our eagerness for peace. It could go that way if we allow the enemy to worm his way into the Saigon government as a condition for accommodating Nixon with a settlement before the election.

Let's hope and pray that our negotiators won't make a bad

deal just for an early deal — that they'll refuse to sell out South Vietnam and stick to the principle we have supported all these years. Our first concern should be the kind of settlement the South Vietnamese can live with. After all, Nixon doesn't deserve re-election if he fails to stand by that condition.
