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A law passed by the last legislature puts teeth into a regulation which has been ignored too long. For many years we have been required to carry liability insurance for the benefit of persons who sustain injury or damage through our fault, but nothing was done about the people who failed to buy such insurance. As a result, many failed to get the compensation they deserve for accidents caused by others.

Now the law says that an uninsured person involved in a traffic accident resulting in death, personal injury or property damage over \$250 may be subject to suspension of driving privilege and vehicle registration. In case of such an accident the DPS is required to begin proceedings to enforce the law by setting a hearing at which the person charged must be able to prove non-liability in the case, produce a release signed by the damaged party, or show that arrangements have been made to pay for injuries and damages.

At least a few desirable results can come from the new law. More people will get a fair settlement out of accidents caused by others, and persons who refuse to comply may find themselves and their vehicles removed from the list of traffic hazards. Conceivably it will also make some people better drivers.

Of course, this is also a break for the insurance company. It can sell more policies, so it benefits along with those whose chance for settlement has improved. All of which is fine. But isn't it time to give consideration also to the people who pay the premiums?

As all of us know, there are cases of continued payment for many years but never a claim for damages. In all fairness there ought to be a reduction of premium for people who have caused little or no payments for damage.

This principle could apply also to other forms of insurance, such as hospitalization or fire insurance. After a number of years and many thousands paid out in premiums there ought to be at least some reward for a good record.

A few days ago Paul Harvey commented on England's sad financial condition resulting from its socialistic programs of the past thirty years, and called attention to the fact that US has watched Britain's deterioration but makes no effort to avoid its blunders.

Cradle to grave security along with outrageous prices and wages have caused inflation and a decline of production just as they have over here. About the only difference is that England is nearer to a crash than we are.

Looking forward to the consequence, one has to be aware that this is not security, regardless of official terminology. National bankruptcy will bring all welfare programs to a screeching halt, after which millions of dependent people will have no place to turn.

Mr. Weinberger, now quitting as secretary of HEW, foresees ruination in the readiness of Congress to expand the more than a thousand federal grant programs already on the books and to enact new ones. Unless legislators practice restraint, he says, the nation will wind up as broke as New York City.

We have this talk about tightening the belt and biting the bullet but not enough practice of what is preached. In the first place Congressmen need to show the way by turning back their last pay raises.

Actually, starting here and now, everybody in government, industry, business, transportation and every other kind of occupation needs to start a reverse of the inflationary trend. That is by accepting less pay instead of demanding more. It means a cut in welfare pay as well as wages and of the prices for goods and services. Instead of allowing money value to keep wasting away, we need to restore it, and to revive the old time American principle that it pays to save. Another recommended change is better supervision of the welfare programs which now support loafers who refuse to work as well as strikers while they hold out for higher wages, and which often pay one person

Myra Baptists to Observe Church's 100th Birthday

The Myra Baptist Church will celebrate its 100th anniversary Sunday, August 17. Service will begin at 10:30 a.m. with special music, the history of the church and a sermon by a former pastor, Rev. Glen Bridges.

Lunch will be served at noon and the afternoon will be devoted to fellowship. All former members and friends are invited.

On August 12, 1875, a group of twelve gathered under the trees near a grist mill about two miles southeast of Myra and organized the church. They met under the trees, weather permitting for almost a year before a school house was built three miles to the east, and that building was used for three years for worship services.

The first church was built in 1888 on what is now Trew land southeast of Myra. After thirteen years, the building was moved to Myra in 1901. In 1911 a new building was constructed in Myra but was destroyed by a tornado in 1945.

The Myra Baptist Church was rebuilt on its present location in 1946. Mrs. Mildred Biffle has announced that all former members and friends are urged to join the congregation this Sunday.

40 Eager Hornets Report for First Football Practice

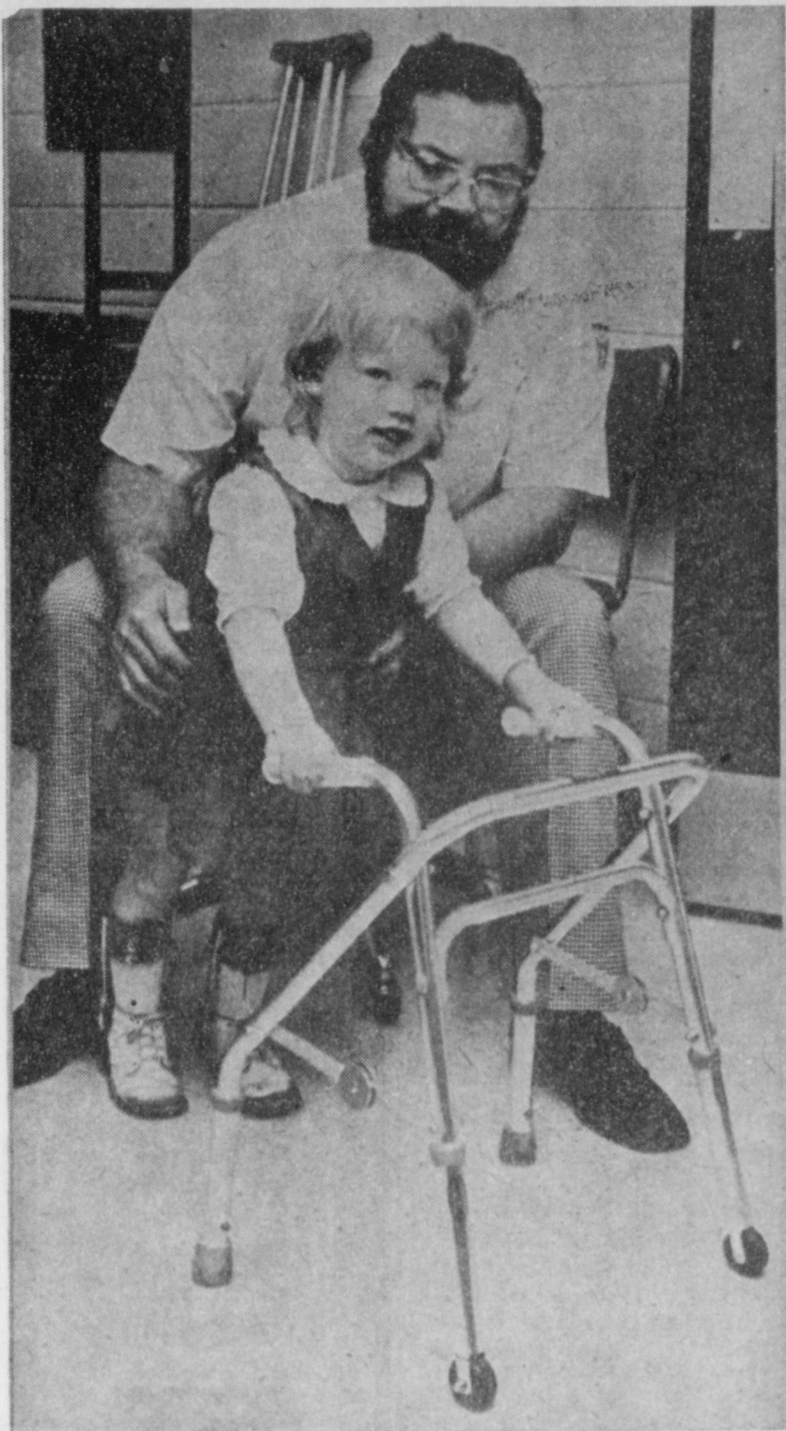

Hospital Success Story Told at C of C Meeting

Members of the Muenster Chamber of Commerce, in their regular meeting Tuesday heard a pair of interesting reports on the success story of Muenster Memorial Hospital.

David Bright, administrator, gave a short summary on its operation and Mrs. Ted Henscheid, president of the hospital auxiliary, told about the extensive program carried out by that organization to help the hospital.

Bright explained that the hospital's budget for the next fiscal year is \$645,000, including \$20,000 for debt retirement. That leaves \$625,000 for operation. Principal expense items will be \$330,000 in salaries to the total of 87 employees, which is a full time equivalent of 42. And about \$200,000 of the salaries are paid for nursing services.

Regarding revenue, Bright said that average income from a day's care is \$77, as compared with \$137 for the average of all hospitals. Normally, he added, a patient's total cost per day is about twice as high as the room rate.

Operating margin for a year has been estimated at \$14,000, but none of that figure comes from the welfare program. Medicare requires statements showing cost-income ratio and discounts its bills accordingly. The total of those discounted payments amounts to about one third of the hospital's revenue.

Overall, the administrator was proud to describe the summary as very satisfactory, but the hospital has two major problems. First is a need for more doctors, to relieve the overload carried by the present staff and to shorten waiting lines of patients. The other problem is government interference and requirements, especially in cases of federal agencies that seem to be as confused as the hospitals. It requires extra time and expense often to the extent of decreasing efficiency and quality of service.

Mrs. Henscheid explained that the hospital auxiliary's

purpose is to help the hospital physically and financially, and it has attained a great record in both respects. Starting with 16 members in 1964, it now has 122.

Its principal service to the hospital has been in supplying about \$30,000 worth of vital equipment and instruments enabling the hospital to give better care. The money was raised by variety shows, dances, bake sales and a number of other promotions which were generously supported by local business and the public.

Along with their work related to those projects the auxiliary members also perform welcome services to the hospital. They are organized to give emergency help in case of disaster. They maintain contact for a human organ bank. They assist at the semi annual collection for the blood bank. They assist hospital personnel at special occasions sponsored by the hospital.

County 4-Hers in State Art Program

Four Cooke County 4-H members submitted posters to the State 4-H Poster Art Program. They are Dolores Sandman of Lindsay, Pat Davidson of Muenster, and Susie Felderhoff and Denise Haverkamp of Sacred Heart 4-H.

The purpose of the Poster Art Program is to provide youth a chance to express what 4-H is and does for them and to provide a basic of selection for the national 4-H poster. The theme areas for 1975 are "4-H - Room to Grow," "We Are Involved," and "You've Got a Friend in 4-H". All posters were 14 inches by 22 inches, horizontal or vertical in design, and of any medium.

The top three posters from state judging will be submitted to the National 4-H Service Committee in October. The poster art program is jointly sponsored by the National 4-H Service Committee and Coats and Clark, Inc.

First Enrollment Continues Drop in Scholastic Count

The first registration here this year indicates another drop in the community's total scholastic count. Enrollments Monday at Sacred Heart School were 254 in elementary and 110 in high school, as compared with 260 and 114 last year. It's a drop of 10 in both departments whereas last year's loss was only 2.

The second registration, to be held Friday at the public school will tell the balance of the community's total count. That figure last year was 745 for a decline of 27 from the previous year's total. Moreover the figure included kindergarten, whereas only 12 grades were counted before. On a 12 year basis last year's total was 696, a drop of 99 since 1968.

Sister Georgia, elementary principal, reported enrollment by grades as follows. First, 30; second, 24; third, 22; fourth, 30; fifth, 39; sixth, 25; seventh, 36; eighth, 38. Sister Mary John, high school principal reports 24 freshmen, 31 sophomores, 34 juniors and 21 seniors.

Classes start next Monday at Sacred Heart and next Thursday at the public school.

Police Crackdown Aimed at Drivers Without License

Frequent reports of unlicensed drivers operating autos and motorcycles within the city have prompted the following open letter by Police Chief James McDonald.

The Muenster Police have consistently been receiving complaints of unlicensed drivers driving motor vehicles and motorcycles on the streets of Muenster.

Therefore, driver license check shall, and will be conducted at unspecified times within the City of Muenster, with no exceptions made to any violators. A summons shall and will be issued for violation.

With full cooperation and assistance from the parents by not permitting unlicensed drivers to operate the family car, and/or motorcycles, the police therefore need not do the dirty work of issuing a traffic summons. Obeying state laws and city ordinances begins at home.

If your son or daughter has a drivers license for a motor vehicle, and no motorcycle code letter in top right hand of driver license, they are not permitted by law to ride a motorcycle. If they do so, they are in violation of the motor vehicle code.

We, as police officers do not make these laws. They are the laws of the State of Texas, and we have sworn to uphold and enforce the laws, and shall do so, and shall do so to the best of our ability. No person(s) is immune or excused from obeying the laws.

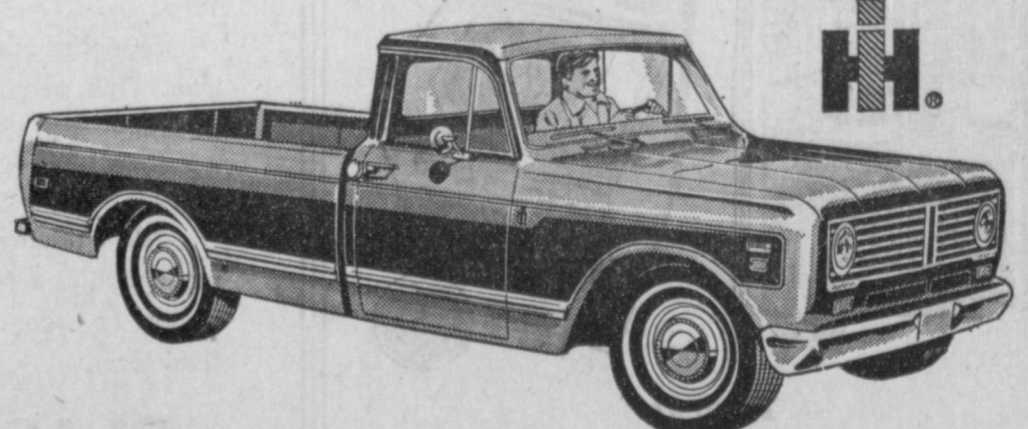

Fire Ant Survey Being Conducted In Cooke County

Surveys to examine the extent of imported fire ant infestation in Cooke County are being conducted by crews from the Texas Department of Agriculture, Commissioner John C. White has announced. Ten teams will be working throughout 52 counties this summer to document locations of the cone-shaped hard mounds of the imported fire ants.

Also samples of the insects are being gathered for positive microscopic identification from Texarkana to San Antonio, White said. "These counties are adjacent to known infested areas, and this information is necessary to determine future control programs

in the state.

"Millions of dollars in losses to farmers and ranchers have been confirmed because of ruined pastures, deaths of newborn animals caused by the sting of the ants, and damage to machinery in fields with the mounds," White explained.

If residents in the county think that there are imported fire ants on their property, they should call the Texas Department of Agriculture district office in Fort Worth. The phone number is 335-7992.

Imported fire ants are reddish-brown usually, measuring from 1/8 to 1/4 inches long. Their mounds are six inches to three feet high and can spread 15 to 18 inches in diameter. These pests have moved across the South, now infesting nine states, includ-

ing Texas. By early 1974, 25 million acres in Texas had confirmed populations. Now the known total stands at 27 to 28 million.

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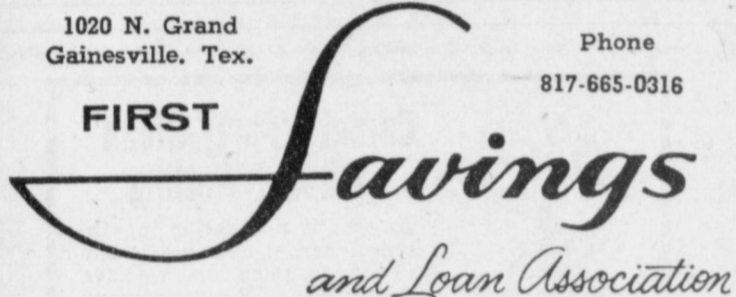

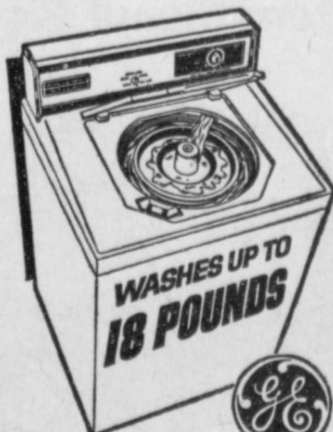

CCC Nursing Dept. Receives National Accreditation

Dr. Alton Laird, president of Cooke County College has

announced that the Division of Nursing at Cooke County College has received full accreditation from the National League for Nursing.

The Nursing Division admitted its first class in September, 1972, and has been in the process of seeking full state and national accreditation since that time. Full state accreditation from the Board of Nurse Examiners was obtained in February, 1974, before graduation of the first class. State accreditation is essential if graduates of a school of nursing are to be permitted to take licensure examinations and become Registered Nurses. National accreditation is optional; however, the process of achieving accreditation contributes toward the development of the program. Full national accreditation also makes it possible for graduates to be commissioned as Second Lieutenants in the Army and the Air Force.

The development of the nursing program has been made possible through the cooperation of hospitals, nursing homes, doctors, day nurseries, public health departments and other agencies in this area. Students began the actual practice of giving care to patients early in their program. Hospitals and nursing homes used include Gainesville Memorial Hospital, Muenster Memorial Hospital, Flow Memorial Hospital, Westgate Hospital, Wichita Falls State Hospital, Hillhaven Convalescent Center, Chaffin Nursing Home, Frontier Manor Care Center and Denton Nursing Center.

Additionally, students receive experience at Denton State School, the Public Health Department in Denton, the Child Development Center in Gainesville, and in physician's offices in Denton, Gainesville and Muenster. Through the cooperation of these agencies the student is able to obtain a well-rounded preparation for beginning Registered Nursing practice.

The accreditation has been received for a period of eight years. The Division of Nursing was commended for a well-organized self-study report.

Cystic Fibrosis Week Proclaimed

Mayor David Bright today signed a proclamation declaring the week of Sept. 16, 1975 as Breath of Life Campaign in Muenster.

The C/F Breath of Life Campaign is conducted annually by the Dallas Area Chapter of the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation which supports research, care and education programs for children suffering from lung-damaging diseases.

In signing the proclamation, Mayor Bright urged all citizens to support the campaign. "Most of us don't have trouble breathing," he said. "But for the millions of children with lung-damaging diseases, breathing can be a real struggle. These children need our support and understanding."

Mrs. Ted Henscheid, chairman of the 1975 Breath of Life fund-raising drive, stressed that all individuals, especially parents, should know the signs of lung-damaging diseases.

"Knowing these signs can lead to early diagnosis and early treatment of these diseases," she explained. "Especially with cystic fibrosis, early treatment can help prolong a child's life."

Signs of lung-damaging diseases are recurrent wheezing, persistent coughing with excessive mucus, pneumonia more than once, excessive appetite but poor weight gain and clubbing or enlargement of fingertips.

Other signs that are peculiar to cystic fibrosis are a salty taste of the skin, persistent and bulky diarrhea and nasal polyps.

Diagnosis and treatment of cystic fibrosis and other children's lung-damaging diseases are provided by more than 100 Cystic Fibrosis Centers across the country supported by the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation.

The most serious of these children's lung diseases, cystic fibrosis is the number one genetic killer of children. Cystic fibrosis affects one out of every 1,500 infants born each year and occurs when a child inherits two genes for the disease, one from each parent. The parents don't have the disease, but they are among the 10 million carriers of the gene for cystic fibrosis.

When the Foundation was founded in 1955, most children with cystic fibrosis didn't reach school age. Now, more than 50 percent of those with the disease live past age 18. And many of the treatment procedures developed for cystic fibrosis also help children with other lung-damaging diseases.
